

### Charles W. Mayfield Makes Honor Roll At West Texas State

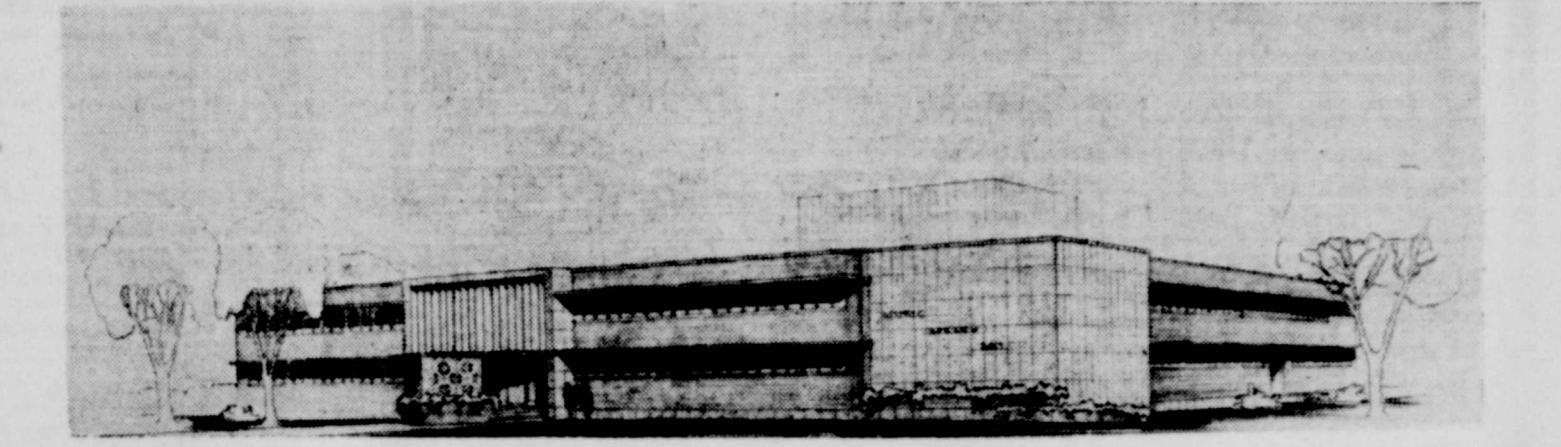

## Motor Vehicle Inspection Deadline Set As Midnight, April 15, 1959

Residents of Briscoe County were reminded today that the 1959 deadline for having their motor vehicles inspected is midnight, April 15.

Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, Texas Department of Public Safety, stated today there are 1,720 motor vehicles registered in Briscoe County; of these 20% have been inspected.

Drivers are urged to have their vehicles inspected early to avoid a last minute rush. This time of the year is noted for adverse weather conditions which may be predominant during the next two and one-half months. As a result the number of inspection days will be cut down since stations cannot inspect vehicles under these adverse conditions.

"Passenger cars are inspected for brakes, lights, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers; while commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus additional items required by law," said Johnson. "In 1958 approximately five out of every one hundred accidents were caused by a mechanical defect; therefore, owners are urged to have their vehicles inspected as soon as possible."

Relatives report that Brubs Bomar, who was seriously injured last Thursday evening when his pickup truck overturned, is doing as well as can be expected on Tuesday. His wife stayed with him until Tuesday when she returned home to her place of business. His mother, Mrs. Wiley Bomar, Sr. went to stay with him in the Tulsa hospital.

Brubs has seven ribs broken on one side and some on the other. Several of the ribs are said to be broken in more than one place. His collar bone is also broken.

America's livestock producers are now taking a financial licking of more than 100 million dollars a year due to causes related to faulty nutrition.

Animals lose weight, milk production is reduced, young animals are born blind, deformed or dead, and mature animals may have defective bones... all this caused by faulty nutrition alone.



Vitamin deficiencies can cause calf problems.

One of the most important nutritional problems at this time of year is Vitamin A deficiency. It causes such severe losses that the national committee in charge of Livestock Loss Prevention Year is making a special drive against it this month.

For the farmer, it is important that he know key symptoms of Vitamin A deficiency, so he can be alert for them and get prompt help when they appear. In young calves, symptoms include watery eyes, nasal discharge, cough, wrinkled skin, staggering, and weakness. Mature cattle may develop night blindness or have swollen legs and forequarters. Cows may produce weak, blind, or dead calves.

In swine, Vitamin A deficiency may cause blindness, muscular incoordination, respiratory difficulties, and production of weak, blind, or malformed pigs.

The first thing an owner should do if any of these tell-tale signs appear in his livestock, is to have a proper diagnosis made, to be sure of the cause. Some of these troubles can also be caused by things other than Vitamin A deficiency.

If lack of Vitamin A is the cause, the answer, naturally, is to bolster the ration with corrective amounts of the vitamin. Sometimes, special supplementary treatment may also be needed.

The best plan, of course, is to prevent such deficiency problems. This can usually be done by feeding green, leafy legume hay or yellow corn.

Most swine producers have probably noticed that baby pig anemia is becoming more of a problem these days. This is probably due to two factors. First, with today's continuous farrowing programs, more pigs are born during colder weather, are more closely confined, do not get out on pastures where they can get needed iron and copper from the soil. Second, our soils are becoming more lacking in these elements. That also means further increase in anemia.



Baby pigs should be watched for signs of anemia.

Today, as a result, this is one of the most widespread killers of baby pigs. Anemia is costing farmers such heavy losses that it has been selected as one of the prime targets for National Livestock Loss Prevention Year in 1959.

What can the swine producer do about the problem? First, he needs to recognize its symptoms early. If anemia progresses too far, the veterinarian may be unable to save the affected pigs. And, often those which do recover are unthrifty.

Treatment needs to be started promptly. Symptoms include listlessness, weakness, pale membranes in the mouth, lips, snout and around the eyes and loss of appetite.

One method of preventing anemia is to put sod in the pigs' pens. However, this is unsanitary, and many soils are becoming deficient.

In some cases, iron and copper tablets are given by mouth. The newest method is to have a veterinarian inject a special, long-acting iron solution directly into the pigs' muscle tissue. Many authorities now favor this because corrective dosages are controlled, and results seem dependable.

Anemia as a potential baby pig problem is going to be with us from now on. The wise farmer will plan to cope with it as a regular part of his operations.

### Nitrogen Applied To Grain Sorghum Land Proves Profitable

One hundred and twenty pounds of nitrogen applied to grain sorghum land produced a yield of 6,056 pounds per acre while the non-fertilized plots showed a yield of 3,523 pounds. The net return after paying fertilizer cost was \$30.05 per acre from the application of 120 pounds of nitrogen over the non-fertilized plots. One hundred and sixty pounds of nitrogen produced a net profit of \$30.71 per acre. Dr. T. C. Longnecker, head of the High Plains Station, reported these results on the 1958 grain sorghum research this week.

The tests were made on 4-row plots 100 feet long with each fertilizer application repeated four times in different parts of the field. Fertilizer treatments were made with nitrogen and phosphorus alone and in combinations. Nitrogen was applied at rates of 40, 80, 120 and 160 pounds per acre and phosphorus at three rates of 40, 80 and 120 pounds. Phosphorus at 40 and 80 pounds with higher amounts of nitrogen showed some increase in yield but not enough to pay for the added cost of the phosphorus.

The yield data on preplant and side-dress applications on grain sorghum indicated there was no difference between the two methods of application for the same amount of fertilizer. The same results were obtained in combinations of preplant and side-dress applications.

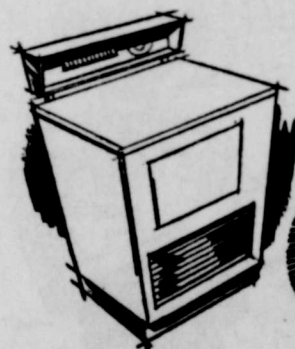
