### Wildcat Staked In Briscoe County

Tule Drilling Company of Snyder and associates has staked wildcat in northwest Briscoe County, No. 1 Ritchie-Cogdell, ten miles northwest of Silvertown in the Matador arch area. Proposed to 8,000 feet, which is calculated to reach granite, the venture is about 45 miles north of the southwestern Hale County Petersburg - Arick production. The wildcat spots at 1,250 feet from south and 371 feet from west lines of Section 19, Block E2, D & SE Survey.

### ALL-PANHANDLE HOG WEIGHT GUESSING CONTEST

Amateur and professional hog weight guessers will have a chance to prove their skills at the All Panhandle Hog Weight Guessing Contest to be held in Quitaque the 8th of June. The Briscoe County 4-H Club Council representing all the County Clubs is putting on the contest. A meeting of the Council organized the contest Monday night. Rules and regulations will govern the contest. Any bona fide amateur or professional hog weight guesser may enter. There will be two divisions, one for junior guessers 16 and under and one for adults. Cash prizes will be given. Over \$50 in cash and trophies will be awarded the three high contestants in each division.

A total of eight or ten pigs of all sizes and classes will be used in the contest. These will come from 4-H and adult herds from around the Quitaque area. Guessers from all over the panhandle are being sent invitations to come and match their wits with Briscoe County guessers, who are some of the best self-proclaimed hog weight judges in the whole country.

Challenges and acceptances are in order for teams of guessers from all over the country. A team will be composed of 5 individuals who will pool their score to compete against five other individuals as a team. Entries from several communities and civic clubs are expected. Bobby Saul of Quitaque and Carolyn Garrison are co-chairmen of the Briscoe County 4-H Council. Robert Ledbetter is County Agricultural Agent.

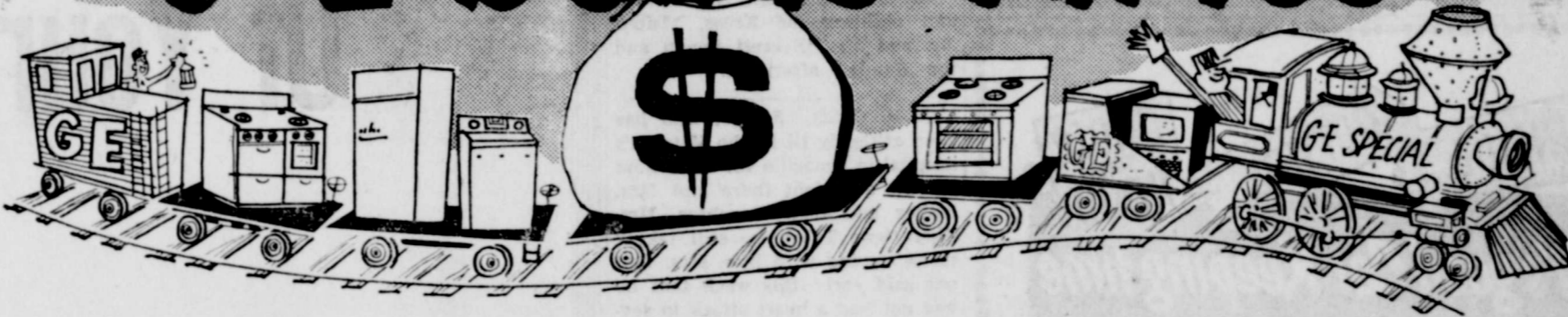

SAN ANGELO.—Labor contract negotiations between Communications Workers of America, AFL-CIO, and General Telephone Co. of the Southwest were concluded today upon full agreement being reached by both parties, according to a joint release issued by the Company and the Union.

The new Labor Agreement, arrived from these negotiations, is effective as of today, and will run for a primary term of one year. Approximately 2,700 employees are affected.

The negotiations, now concluded, cover changes, modifications, and amendments, to an existing labor contract dated April 25, 1958, the primary term of the original amended to include improvements developed throughout current negotiation sessions. Today's settlement was the combination of 8 weeks of negotiations that began March 25, 1959.

During negotiations, 42 bargain-

ing issues developed, nine of which were company proposals, and 33 of which were Union proposals. The proposals covered wages, working premiums, working conditions, and employee benefits.

**COMPULSORY ISOLATION CONTAGEOUS TUBERCULOSIS**

AUSTIN, May 19—An updating of laws pertaining to a disease almost as old as mankind was accomplished today in Texas by the signing of the Texas Tuberculosis Code by Governor Price Daniel.

The bill (House Bill 421) makes plain the enforcement of compulsory isolation upon those who have contagious tuberculosis and who refuse to isolate themselves and protect others. Such enforcement has been had in various parts of Texas for two years, but it was felt procedure for enforcement needed to be clearly spelled out. This act does that.

Also contained in the code is provision for penalty of fine or imprisonment of anyone—physician or otherwise—for failure to report a case known to them as contagious tuberculosis.

Also provided is that premises occupied by people with infectious tuberculosis shall be disinfected before the property is sold or rented to anyone else.

Draft of the act, sponsored in the House by Representatives Don Kennard and Don Gladden of Fort Worth, and Representative Robert H. Hughes of Dallas and Senator Crawford Martin of Hillsboro, was reviewed by various agencies concerned with TB control before its presentation in the House and Senate. Those agencies were the Texas Medical Association, the State Department of Health, the Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools and the Public Welfare Department, the Vocational Rehabilitation Division and the Texas Tuberculosis Association, a voluntary agency. The latter, and the Texas Medical Association, cooperated to aid the senator and representatives in

drafting the legislation, bringing together all laws having to do with tuberculosis—some dating to 1890—and making them up-to-date and adequate.

**4-H'ers STOCK PANTRY WITH VARIETY OF HOME CANNED FOODS**

Pantry shelves will literally groan under the weight of all kinds of canned foods when club members complete their 4-H canning projects this summer.

Not only does the entire family benefit as young cooks perfect their canning skills, but club members themselves stand to gain substantially, contends the Extension Service which directs the work. Along with learning the basic steps of food preservation, the 4-H'ers have opportunities to demonstrate, to exhibit their products at fairs, and last but not least, to compete for a variety of awards.

For the past 31 years, canning awards have been provided by Kerr Glass Manufacturing Corp., Sand Springs, Oklahoma. Perhaps the most exciting award is the expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Club Congress held at the Conrad Hilton Hotel in Chicago. There more than 1,300 champion boys and girls from every state have a chance to compare notes during the week-long event.

**NEWS FROM THE HIGH PLAINS**

**FOUNDATION AT HALFWAY**

Most of the 26 varieties of wheat being tested at the High Plains Research Foundation are fully headed. Some of the later maturing varieties are just beginning to head out. Farmers interested in comparing the wheat varieties are invited to visit the experimental farm at Halfway, Dr. Longnecker, Director, said today.

Eleven of the varieties are experimental. The fifteen released varieties are Early Blackhull, Wichita, Triumph, New Triumph, Crockett, Ponca, Commanche, Wheatheart Triumph and Kharof, Douglas Owen, Assistant Agronomist, stated.

In the barley research program, eleven varieties are being tested. They are Kearney, Dicktoo, Pueblo, Harbine, Wintex, Rogers, Cordova, Missouri Early Beardless and Kenbar. Two varieties are experimental.

The fertilizer experiments on wheat are definitely showing response to nitrogen.

The wheat and barley tests are being conducted in cooperation with the Texas A & M Extension Division. Seed was furnished by the Bushland U.S.D.A. Station.
