

#### Plans Completed for Hog Weight Contest

Final plans were made Monday Panhandle Hog Weight Guessing Contest sponsored by the Briscoe County 4-H Clubs. The guessing will start Saturday the 6th of June in the south side of the Quitaque City Park. Time will be from 2:00 to 6:00 p.m. A large crowd is expected to be there to try knowledge at the old established art of guessing the weight of hogs. There will be eight or ten hogs to guess on. There will be two separate

divisions for adults and juniors. The official weighing committee of Jake Merrell, Lynn McDonald and Dellis Monk will weigh each animal separately down to the nearest pound. This committee will be "bonded" and they only will know the official weights.






