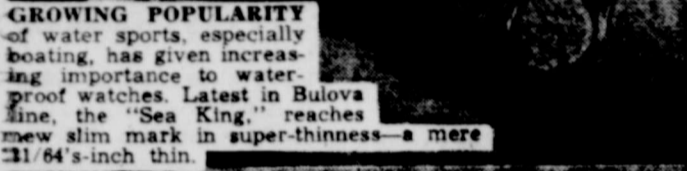

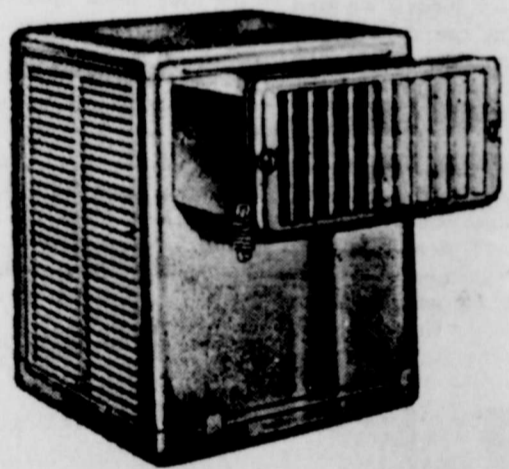

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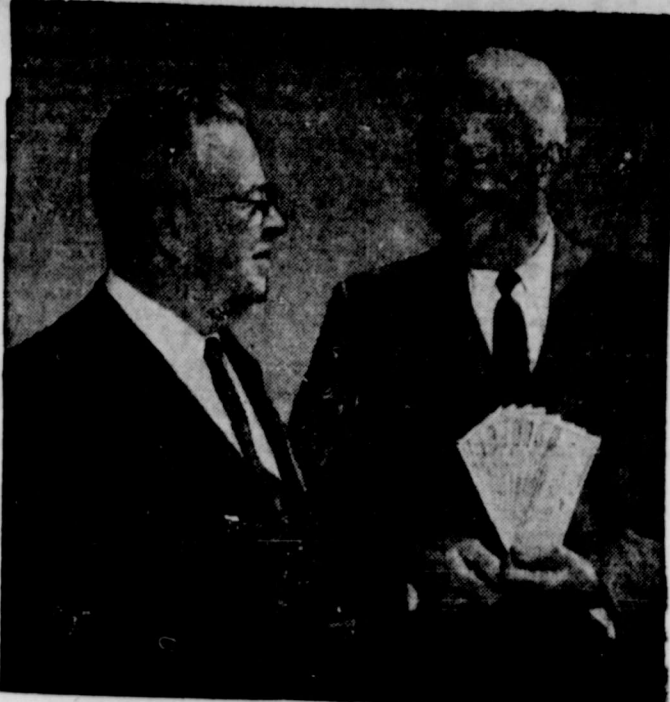

BRISCOE SUFFERS THRIP INFESTATION

Briscoe County cotton is suffering from light to heavy infestation of thrips. Thrips are sucking and rasping insects that attack the small cotton leaves causing them to roll up, split, and often cause the edges of the leaves to turn brown. Thrips are particularly bad in early planted cotton. The damage they do is delaying the growth of the plant. Often severe attacks they will kill the terminal growth.

When thrips are present and spraying is anticipated, addition of 1/2 pint Malathion to the standard recommendation of Taxaphene. If no Malathion is used, the heavier rates of the above two materials are recommended.

The Texas Guide for controlling Cotton Insects in Texas is at the County Extension Agent's Office. They should be consulted prior to any spraying as there are some new recommendations in this year's guide.

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How To "Dye" Happily



Ever try to give new life to an old favorite blouse, only to have it emerge from the dye solution streaked or spotted?

If so, don't be too hasty in blaming the dye or the blouse, advises Virginia Carney, home laundry specialist. Chances are the uneven dye penetration is caused by washing film deposits that have built up in the fabric during numerous launderings.

According to Miss Carney, hardness minerals in water and dirt combine with soap or detergent to form this sticky film. Once it begins to accumulate, it's difficult to stop.

First of all, it's rinse resistant, as you know if you've ever tried to rinse away bathtub ring—an equally disagreeable form of washing film.

Second, it's self-building. No matter how much soap or detergent and water are used, you only add to the embedded film, further waterproofing the garment.

Naturally a dye solution can't thoroughly penetrate parts which are heavily embedded with washing film, hence the streaking and spotting.

Take a tip from commercial laundries and dyeing establishments, and recondition or renew the garment before dyeing. It's easy. Simply soak and agitate the blouse in a solution of hot

water and water conditioner, such as Calgon.

Here's how it works. Calgon, neither a detergent nor a bleach, has far greater attraction for hardness minerals than soap or detergent. It penetrates the fabric, seizes the hardness minerals and loosens all embedded soap, detergent and dirt.

Professionals call this process "film stripping." At home, it can be done right in the sink, laundry tub or washer.

Just add 1/2 cup water conditioner to each gallon of hot water. Depending on the condition or discoloration of the blouse, it can be soaked from a half hour to overnight, then rinsed thoroughly, before drying or dyeing.

Who knows? Once the blouse is restored to its original brightness, tinting may be unnecessary.

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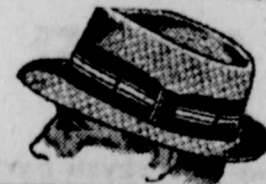
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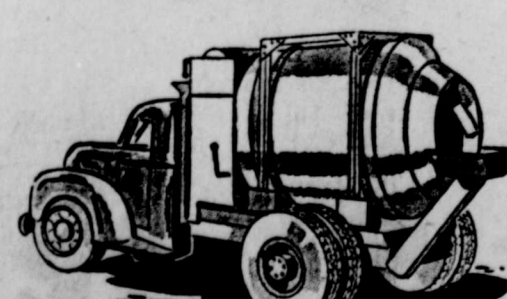
