Briscoe County has lost another oldtimer in the passing of William Newsom Bullock. A resident and retired farmer in the county for forty-nine years, he had lived in the same house since 1930.

gram. White was one of the first in the area to demonstrate the pumping of water from surface lakes onto cropland. The practice of irrigating from surface lakes since has become a major factor in the economy of this area.

Working through the Briscoe County Livistock Association, White carried out a livestock improvement program, brush control. prairie dog eradication and other practices aimed at improving the county's livestock industry.

He has continued his fine work in Yoakum County since leaving
