

Six encephalitis cases have been recorded in the Lockney area. Three of the patients are farmers and three are Negro children. Five of the six are being treated in the Lockney hospital and one was sent to a Plainview hospital because of shortage of hospital space in Lockney.

Spinal fluid examinations by doctors in the Lockey hospital showed positive tests. Samples were sent to Austin for examination to determine intensity of the disease. Results of the tests will

## **4-H ENCAMPMENT** TO BE HELD AT ROARING SPRINGS


