The family, which also consists of a 10-year-old boy and a 4-year-old girl, lives in a \$23-a-month apartment, and their total income from welfare sources is \$100 a month.

The Star-Telegram ran a story about Tommy's picture, pleading for help for this lad whose life would be snuffed out shortly without the operation for which there was no money.

Within a few hours after publication, the \$800 to \$1,000 needed for Tommy's hospitalization in Fort Worth was assured.

The boy's transportation to Houston had been taken care of by Fred Patton, oil man, who offered the use of his eight-passenger private plane and pilot "any time the boy is ready to go."

James C. Wright, of Weatherford, father of Congressman Wright, was the first to offer to underwrite hospitalization expenses of the Fort Worth boy.

The East Fort Worth Lions of the young married couple at Riverside Christian Church, Fort Worth pharmaceutical salesmen and countless others offered to help.

First Lt. Ray E. Bining, stationed at Camp Wolters at Mineral Wells, phoned to say he would be willing to pay part of the whole bill by monthly installments.

It does our hearts good in these times when most of all that we read in the newspapers is of violence, crime and corruption to find how much the life of one little boy means to people who have never even seen him.

Encephalitis Cases Reported at Lockney

A Lockney doctor reports that an outbreak of encephalitis or sleeping sickness in the Lockney area is approaching epidemic proportions.

Six encephalitis cases have been recorded in the Lockney area. Three of the patients are farmers and three are Negro children. Five of the six are being treated in the Lockney hospital and one was sent to a Plainview hospital because of a shortage of hospital space in Lockney.

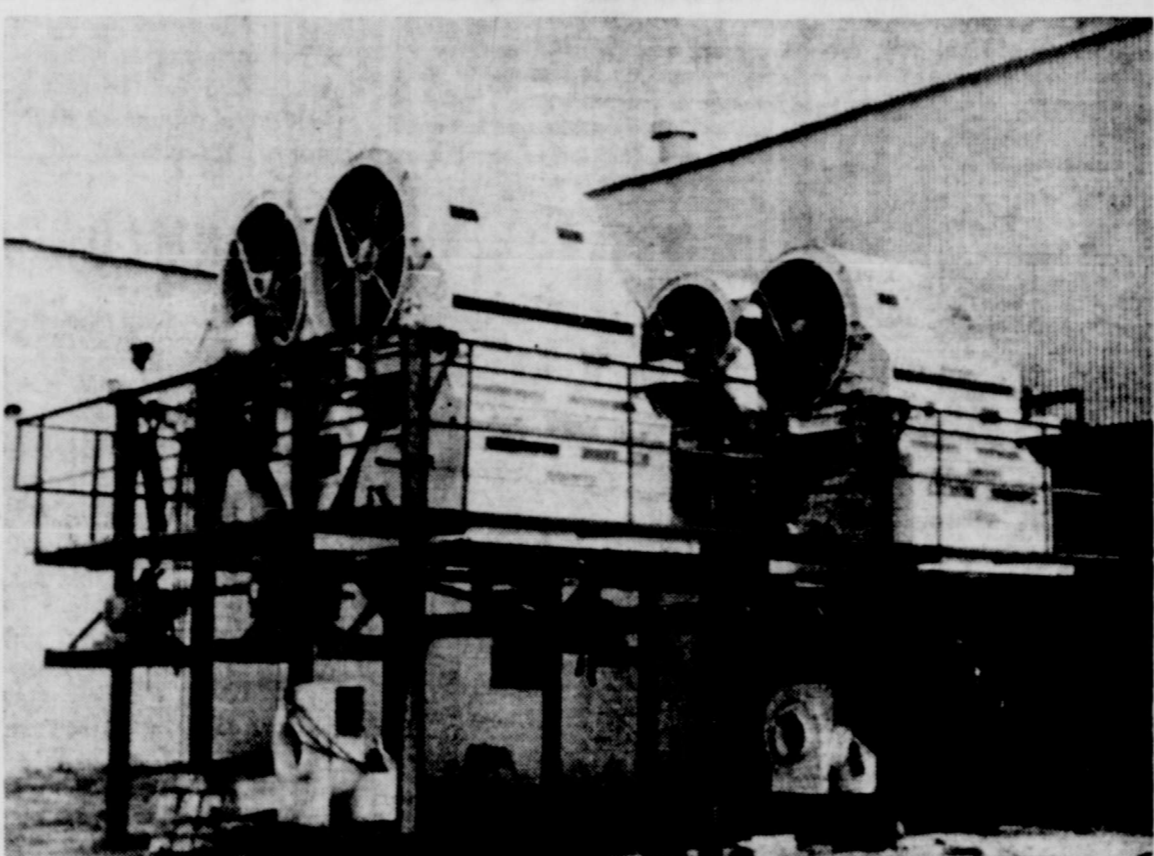
Spinal fluid examinations by doctors in the Lockney hospital showed positive tests. Samples were sent to Austin for examination to determine intensity of the disease. Results of the tests will be known within three weeks.

With the exception of a Floydada farmer, all persons stricken by the disease are workers in Lockney or in the immediate area.

The first case was recorded about two weeks ago.

Mosquitoes, the carriers of the disease, are reported to be thick at all hours of the day, and doctors have asked a state health department official to assist in destruction of mosquitoes.

It is reported that mosquito destruction has been hampered by some property owners who have refused to allow health department workers to spray lakes on their land.

4-H ENCAMPMENT TO BE HELD AT ROARING SPRINGS

Briscoe County 4-H Club members will attend their annual County 4-H Encampment at Roaring Springs on August 3 and 4. The Briscoe County 4-H Council announced that there are 91 members eligible to attend this year's encampment. To go, the Council has said each member must have either completed a project or demonstration this year or have one under way now. 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Texas Children May Be Denied Nine Months School

Texas public school children may get a long vacation during 1959-60 if the Legislature fails to provide state funds for the schools.

Without state financial aid provided by the Legislature, schools would be limited to local financial support. Some districts would be able to operate for only three, four or five weeks. Others could be maintained for a semester, while few schools might be able to complete a nine-month term.

The stark reality of this possibility apparently has not dawned upon the parents whose children attend the Texas public schools. Legislators report that they have received very few communications from their constituents.

Here are the facts: If the Legislature should fail to pass a general appropriations bill and enact a new tax bill to finance that bill, the State Treasurer would be unable to write a single check for any purpose. The public schools would not receive any state funds, and their financing would be left completely to local property taxes, many of which are already at the legal limit.

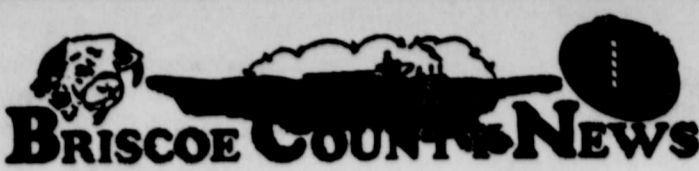
September 1 is the deadline date. If the Legislature has not solved these problems by that time, the public schools and all other state services will cease receiving state funds.

Since the state guarantees 80 per cent of the Minimum Foundation Program and the local district 20 per cent, the loss of the state share could result in denying Texas students educational opportunities for the next school year. This would be a step backward, at a time when Texas schools need to move forward.

In addition, old age pensioners could not receive their checks which are so vital to their existence. No state employees could be paid. State supported colleges and universities would be unable to pay their teachers and other employees. No food could be purchased to feed the inmates and patients of the various institutions. Prison guards could receive no remuneration. The highway department would default on payments to contractors, who in turn might have to curtail operations which would result in widespread unemployment. The state highway department would cease to function. Every state service would come to a stop.

This is the situation which confronts the proud state of Texas. Its solution rests in the hands of the members of the 56th Legislature.

Members of the Legislature will welcome suggestions from their own constituents to prevent this financial catastrophe.

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SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

We often hear the question, "Why are we concerned about saving soil and water when taxpayers are spending billions for buying and storing farm surpluses?" The above question is asked especially by city people who have no real understanding of the farm problem.

Listed below are some factors that shed new light on the reasons for conservation as well as on the surplus problem. In the first place, the United States population is increasing at the rate of five persons every minute which is seventy-two hundred every day or two million six hundred thousand each year. Our present population is over one hundred and seventy-four million. Further, the Agricultural Research Service estimates that we will need an increase of thirty-five per cent in total agricultural production in the next fifteen years to meet our needs. American farmers are now keeping in production nearly all land now available for economic crop production.

We cannot look to new land to satisfy the nation's future needs. Every year we are losing in this country 1.1 million acres of cultivatable land to non-agricultural

uses as highways, urbanization, airports, factories, etc. Another 400,000 acres are being lost to erosion and other soil depletion. In 1950, we had 3.1 acres of crop land per person; by 1957, we will have only 2.2 acres per person or about 1-3 less.

As for our surplus commodities, it is estimated that the surpluses on hand represent only a fourth of one crop year. Some national planners report that safety and natural defense dictates as much as a one third crop year carry over.

The excess agricultural products we have on hand amounts to only about seven per cent of our annual food consumption. Over the last twenty-five years, during which surpluses have been almost chronic, a two per cent livestock increase would have eaten up the equivalent of all our surpluses.

We cannot tool up to produce more food after we find ourselves in a spot where we need it badly except at an appalling loss of soil. The conserving has to be done ahead. In event of national emergency, it is a boon to have a reserve of land to draw upon—land that has been kept productive and safe under a cover of grass and legumes and by other conservation measures.

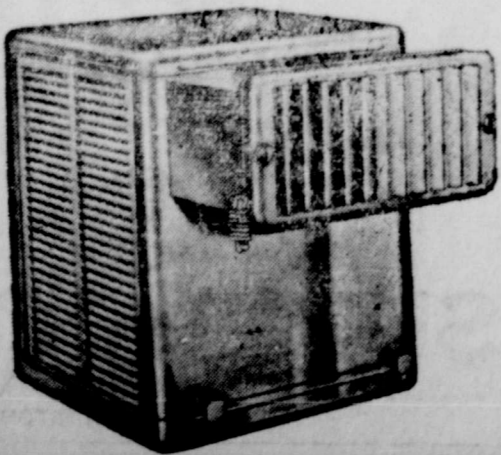
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
