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These Men Need Never Re-Tire



When it comes to rough-riding, the nation's champs still are in the southwest. The cowboys around Truth Or Consequences, New Mexico, have converted the old-time bronco rides into an annual International Jeep Derby in which the husky four-wheel drive vehicles plunge over arroyas. through dry river beds and up uncharted mountain passes.

They race against the clock, on off-the-road courses bulldozed out of the backcountry. This goes on for three days, racing some 18 miles each day. By the third day of the annual event, the tired cowboy drivers have spun about 54 miles over the roughest terrain in the land, with standard passenger car tires made of Chemstrand nylon cord protecting against the sharp rock edges and giving traction in sand and loose fill.

The Jeep Derby contestants this year came from several western states and one team entered from Mexico. Drivers wear special helmets and most of the Jeep vehicles have stout rollover bars. The vehicles haven't rolled over yet, but the bars come in handy for hanging on as the co-driver

leans out to furnish extra "ballast" on rough turns that are taken at high speed.

Fastest time for any of the 18-mile segments of the grind was 51 minutes, with the husky little Jeeps in fourwheel drive literally every mile of the way. The area had not had rain for some five months. Spectators peering from hill-tops could see each Jeep threading its way along the upland canyons by its cloud of dust.

Despite the rugged terrain the drivers are proud of one fact: not a single blow-out or flat tire! One driver ran out of gas and had to walk to the finish line, but the husky nylon cord in the tires carried the rest of the competition squad to the finish line with nary a casualty.



Quality A Must In Eggs

College Station, July 23-Egg producers and handlers may expand their outlets and volume of sales if they meet the demands of many buyers representing such firms as wholesaders, national supermarket chain stores, local chain stores and independent stores, stated F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist. In most cases, he said, these buyers are asking for the things that will satisfy their customers, and will therefore give them the greatest possible chance for repeat sales.

Buyers generally want eggs of high quality, and they want them to conform to known grade standards, he said. And they also want them to be of uniform quality throughout the year. Many people buy eggs on the basis of known grade standards as a means of getting uniform high quality throughout the year, Beanblossom added.

Care in handling eggs can mean much to the producer or wholesaler, because most buyers know the value of proper handling and the effect it has on the shell life of the eggs: also the effect on maintaining satisfied customers. said the specialist.

While cost is always a consideration in the sale of eggs or any product, many buyers do not consales as quality and proper handling. This does not mean that price is unimportant, because many business firms must be competitive with respect to price and other considerations such as availability, uniformity, condition of product, service and others, the specialist

Availability of eggs when needed ranks high on the list of buy-

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
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
