



HOME REMEDIES FOR DOG'S MINOR INJURIES

Don't think that accidents in the home happen only to humans. Our canine friends run into trouble, too. They'll get obects stuck in their teeth, take tumbles, and get cuts or bruises. it's wise, therefore, to be familwith some first-aid remedies If he has a bone splinter, a nink or needle stuck in his ongue, teeth, mouth or threat.

ou'll soon know about it. He'll try to cought it up or rub his muzzle with his paws and shake his head. If in great pain, he may become hysterical. With one hand, palm over muzzle, press the side upper lip against he teeth to open his mouth. Use the other hand to explore letween the teeth and the bottom and top of his tongue. Pull his tongue out as far as you can, using a cloth for grip and look down his throat. If you see the object and it's within reach, zemove it gently with your fingers or tweezers. If it's in too deep, or there's a chance that may break off or if nothing is visible, take him to the vet-

erinarian. If he falls or is hit by a car and then limps or refuses to walk, you can suspect a broken bone. Be careful if you feel around, for a dog in pain may bite. A halter muzzle made of cloth strips or soft rope will prevent him from biting. Place wo half hitches over his muzgle with the knot under his jaw, pull the ends back of his ears, and tie to make a halter muzzle. He could be injured in. ternally, too, and not show any symptoms for twenty-four hours. Thether he shows any signs of injury or not, a bad fall can he serious, so keep him quiet for a couple of days and feed him very little for twenty-four

If he gets cut, clean the inchild.

Feeding tip: The best time for city dog owners to walk their dog, and country dog owners to put their dog out, is directly after he's eaten. Play time for your pet, however, is better scheduled at least an hour away from dinner.

Fred Elliott, Cotton Work Specialist for the Texas Extension Service, was very emphatic that cotton should not be defoliated when When crop driers or dessicants are used, the percentage open should go up in the 70 to 80 per cent range, County Agent Ledbetter said.

A brand new defoliation guide is available in the Agent's office in the Courthouse. Farmers are urged to pick up one of these guides and consult with the Agent about defoliation.



Combine egg whites, sugar water, corn syrup, and y in top of double boiler. Reat 1 minute until thoroughly nixed. Cook over rapidly boiling sturdy egg beater (or at high speed of electric beater) 7 minites. Remove from boiling water. Add vanilla and beat 1 minute or until thick enough to spread. Frost cake and sprinkle with flaked coconut. Makes 51/4 cups frosting or enough to cover generously tops and sides of two 9-inch layers.
