



First, no untaught person may be baptized. "Go ye there-lore, and teach all nations, baptizing them**." (Matthew 28:19) Teaching precedes baptism. One must be taught before he may scripturally baptized.

Second, no unbeliever may be baptized. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." (Mark 16:16) Believing precedes aptism. One must also believe before he may be scripturally

Third, no impenitent soul may be baptized. "Repent and baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for remission of sins **." (Acts 2:38) Repentance precedes ism. One must also repent before he may be scripturally
