

In addition to the cultural features, the maps will show the elevation and topography of the land by means of contour lines at vertical intervals of five, ten and twenty feet.


Topographic maps are used as a base in planning the development of our natural resources. Local, county and state engineers use them in planning and locating highways and roads, airports, power and pipe lines. They will also be used in studies on water conservation, flood control, irrigation, drainage, geology, and oil and gas exploration.

When the maps are published in 1961, they will become a part of the standard topographic atlas of the United States. Copies will be available from the map distribution Unit, U.S.G.S., Federal Center, Denver, Colorado.

When the new birth of water and the spirit is complete, the word becomes a life-sustaining word to the babe in Christ as "desire the sincere milk of the word that ye may grow thereby," and as God's word abides in his heart, he is a new creature, destined to a life eternal


