H. G. Wells Seeks Re-Election

State Representative H. G. Wells of Tulia today announced as a candidate for his second term as Representative from the 89th District consisting of Briscoe, Floyd, Hale and Swisher counties.

Representative Wells, who was elected to his first term in the legislature in 1958, is a senior law student at the University of Texas. He is a graduate of North Texas State College in Denton and did graduate work at West Texas State in Canyon.

"I will continue my efforts in behalf of the people of the 89th District in these and other fields," Representative Wells declared. "It is particularly important that this area have a representative in Austin who understands water problems and who will guard against state encroachment on private water rights. I pledge to the people of the district that I will continue to represent them to the best of my ability in the way they want to be represented."

H. L. Stewart Rites Held In Tulia

Funeral services for H. L. Stewart, 65, who died at 5:20 a.m. Monday in the Veteran's Hospital in Amarillo, were held yesterday in the Crosby Street Church of Christ with H. L. Gipson, Amarillo Church of Christ minister, officiating.

Mr. Stewart was born Nov. 16, 1894, in Gainesville. He had lived in Tulia since 1941, and operated a tailor shop until his failing health forced his retirement.

He was a member of the Crosby Street Church of Christ where he served as minister during the war years. A veteran of the First World War, Mr. Stewart was a member of the American Legion and the VFW.

Among the three daughters who survive him are Mrs. Kenneth Sharp, of Silverton, and Miss Marilyn Stewart, of Tulia. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery under the direction of Wallace Funeral Home of Tulia.

New License Plates On Sale This Week

New license plates for 1960 are on sale at all county courthouses this week, says State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer. The plates have white letters and numerals on a black background. 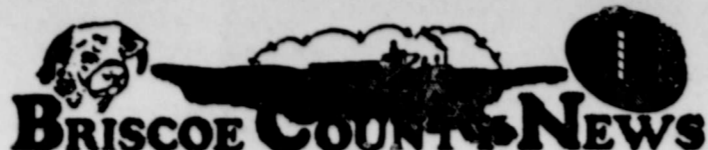

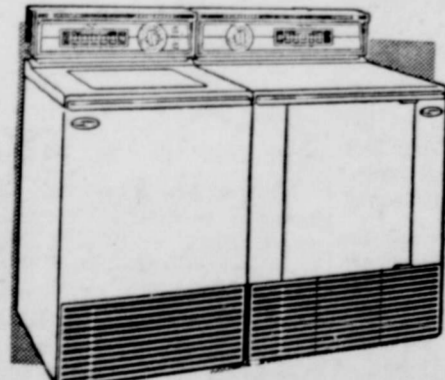

Tips for Frozen Foods
 In selecting frozen foods, you'll get more for your money by following these simple, common-sense rules:

1. Read labels. They tell you the weight, how to store, how to prepare and serve. Labels also help in terms of price. A brand which costs more than another, for example, may weigh more or have a more expensive ingredient.
2. Put the frozen food items last on your shopping list and pick them up immediately before going to the checkout stand.
3. If there are insulated bags at the frozen food cabinet, pop your purchases into them. If not, ask the clerk to put them in a separate bag. They'll keep colder.
4. Take frozen foods home without delay and store them in the freezer or ice-cube compartment of your refrigerator at once.

If you want to dress up plain stationery, do this: Cut out motifs from old greeting cards and paste them at the top of the sheets of writing paper.

Puzzled about when and where to insert a meat thermometer when roasting meat? About 90 minutes after you begin roasting, insert the thermometer into the center of the thickest part of the roast.

For extra tasty pancakes or waffles, add a tablespoon of syrup to the batter. The effect? A yummy toasty brownness!

THE FUTURE FOR JOBS IN AGRICULTURE

WHAT'S THE FUTURE for jobs in agriculture? USDA Undersecretary True D. Morse, says: "Some 40 percent of all jobs in U.S. are in

Last year, land-grant agricultural colleges reported they graduate 7,000 students each year in agricultural sciences —7,000 persons to fill 15,000 jobs that were estimated to be opened every year to college graduates with agricultural training."

The Lubbock County Farm Bu-

reau this week criticized Charles B. Shuman, national president of the bureau, for supporting many of the policies of Sec. of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson.

A. B. Allen, Lubbock, County FB president, and directors of the organization here wrote Shuman that "we believe you have taken undue authority in offering your support of Mr. Benson in the political field."

The group said that the county membership of 1,300 "does not appreciate your efforts to protect the secretary of agriculture from public criticism by volunteering the support of the American Farm Bureau Federation to Mr. Benson."

"We believe that if you would take time to poll all county Farm Bureaus in the U. S., you would learn that Mr. Benson does not have their support," the group added in the letter to Shuman.

That was all the rather brief letter contained, but discussion with Allen and Farm Bureau leaders here have brought out several reasons for criticism of Benson and group's dislike for Shuman's support of many of his policies.

Two reasons often mentioned were Benson's "failure to defend farmers in the furor over farm programs" and his philosophy of cutting price supports with the goal of bringing supplies in line with demand.

Farm Bureau leaders here charged: "Benson, in fact, has been pleased with—if indeed not fostered—the biased furor over farm programs to make his own proposals look more attractive."

They admit that some charges in the present farm programs probably are needed, but they said that much of the unreasoning condemnations of farm programs is due to an uniformed or misinformed public.

And they said that Benson should have worked more aggressively "to bring the true facts bring before the public in order to create more understanding among city dwellers of the pro-

blems confronting farmers."

As for the second reason, the directors said that lower price support won't necessarily bring supplies in line with current and future demands, as Benson and some others contend.

Benson's philosophy, they said, seems to be that lower prices will reduce production and increase consumption. But they said that lower prices tend to force farmers to turn to increased production to gain a higher total income.

To substantiate their arguments, the directors pointed out that farm prices have been declining steadily while production has been soaring to record heights.

At the same time that farm prices have been dropping to new lows, they added, the prices of things that farmers buy keep going up. They said that the price of a farm product to the consumer doesn't have as much relation to what the farmer gets as many people believe.

The Farm Bureau here emphasized that it doesn't "want to see farm commodities pile up in government storage anymore than Benson or anybody else."

And there has been some sentiment expressed here favoring Benson's philosophy of "getting the government out of agriculture." But the FB here said it "doesn't like the way Benson's going about it. If it can be done, it can't be done overnight."

The FB here said that it doesn't want to see "urban people organizing against farm people, which is the direction in which we're moving under Benson."

Obtaining constructive, basic, new farm legislation admittedly faces many difficulties. Some have cited as two difficulties the disunity of farm organizations and the non-cooperation of Benson.

But Congress is charged with the responsibility of compromising group differences to write constructive of a veto isn't a legitimate reason for failing to meet that responsibility.
