The Silvertown Owls went down in defeat at the hands of the Petersburg five last Tuesday night losing the conference game by a 35-34 margin. T. D. West scored 11 points for Silvertown, while Bobby Stafford and James Roy Brown each scored 6 and Bobby Crass made 5 points.

The Owlets fared better against the Petersburg girls, winning 48-23. Celene Lanham scored 18 points, while Jimmie Nell Reynolds made 15, to pace the Silvertown girls to victory.

On Friday night Silvertown met Ralls. The Owls won over the Ralls boys by a 62-34 margin, with Bobby Crass dumping a big 27 points for the Silvertown cagers. T. D. West made 10 points, James Roy Brown, Larry West and Dave Schott all tied with 6 points each.

In the girls game, Silvertown beat Ralls by a 34-29 margin. According to Coach Wheelchel, the guards playing for the Owlets did a very fine job and deserve much of the credit for winning this game. Celene Lanham scored 15 points, followed by Jimmie Nell Reynolds with 10 and Carolyn Frazier with 8 points.

This coming Saturday night, the Matador and Quitaque girls will meet in the Silvertown gymnasium at 7:30 p.m. for the district play-off.

Rural Motorcides Less In 1959

"Rural Motorcides in the 31-county Amarillo Highway Patrol district decreased 12 per cent from 1958 to 1959," Captain J. W. Blackwell said today. Captain Blackwell, well known commander of the Highway Patrol in this area said that during 1959 we had 104 killed in rural traffic accidents compared to 118 rural traffic fatalities in 1958. Our patrolmen investigated a total of 2,000 rural traffic accidents during 1959. This traffic accident experience not only caused the death of 104 men, women and children, but also injured 1,223 and caused an estimated property damage of \$1,607,992.00.

Twelve of the 31 counties in this Highway Patrol district showed an increase in the number of motorcides for 1959. The highest increase for any county was Hall County with five rural traffic fatalities compared to only one in 1958. Potter County had the largest number of deaths recorded with 14. Five counties, Collingsworth, Cottle, Hemphill, Ochiltree, and Roberts, did not record a fatality in 1959.

"The real tragedy in our accident picture is the fact that the causative factors are well known," Captain Blackwell said. In 1959, as in 1958, too much speed at the wrong time and too much drinking while driving were the major contributing factors. When people start obeying traffic law themselves and insist that other drivers obey the law, then we will see a reduction in our accident rate.

In Briscoe County in 1959 we had one fatal accident out of the 28 reported. An estimated \$23,555 property damage was reported.

In Hall County there were three fatalities in 43 reported accidents, for an estimated property damage of \$27,470.

Senator Yarborough Speaks to Tulia Chamber of Commerce

"Aroused Americans, who believe in putting the 'free' back in the free enterprise system, can cut taxes, trim the national debt and give thousands of families the opportunity to raise living standards," U.S. Senator Ralph Yarborough said in an address to the Chamber of Commerce banquet in Tulia last Saturday night.

"But to do it, we've got to work for dynamic national growth and development, not be afraid of it, Senator Yarborough warned.

"The most far-reaching economic study in many years—made by the Joint Economic Committee, comprised of Senators and Representatives, Democrats and Republicans—shows this: The so-called hard money-high pace—an annual increase in our gross national

product of only 2 1/2 per cent for the past seven years.

"Yet, by changing the ill-advised federal money control policies that are stifling our economy, we can—without inflation—expect a healthy, normal annual growth of 4 1/2 per cent. This 4 1/2 per cent rate of growth at current tax levels over the next 15 years would mean that by 1975 our annual government receipts would be double what they are today.

"This rate of growth would permit us within a few years to cut and more fairly distribute the tax burden, to make substantial payments on the national debt, and at the same better meet the defense, education and welfare needs of our people.

"Most important of all, it would

give the breadwinner of thousands of American families in low and moderate income brackets the opportunity to earn a higher standard of living.

"In considering national prosperity, it is interesting to note a study by Professor Robert Lampman of the University of Wisconsin. It said that one-third of our people own only one per cent of our nation's wealth.

"During a recent conference on America's rate of growth, and on the entire hard money-high interest rate question, one senator made this observation. No other issue means so much to our people as is understood by so few.

What does economic growth and inflated interest rates mean to you and your family right here

in Tulia?

"If you are a small businessman, whether our economy grows may well mean the difference between whether you can invest in your business and expand it, or whether it will stagnate and perhaps die.

"If you are the breadwinner of an average family—the basic unit of American life—whether our economy grows may well mean the difference between your having employment and a decent living, or knowing the humiliation and heartbreak of not being able to financially support those you love and who depend upon you.

"In discussing percentage of growth and high interest rate policies nationally, we are not con-

sidering some nebulous question far removed from Tulia, Texas. Instead, it should be clear, we are talking about what happens to individuals right here in Swisher County.

"Nothing is more important to national progress and prosperity. That is why some of us are fighting with every weapon within our grasp to break the unconscionable interest rate spiral.

"With interest rates at the highest point in our history, another increase in interest rates would amount to saddling the American people with the highest interest rate in the world.

Yarborough also brought out points on federal aid to education, adding that aid to education may be labeled by some as a give-away but it is considered by the govern-

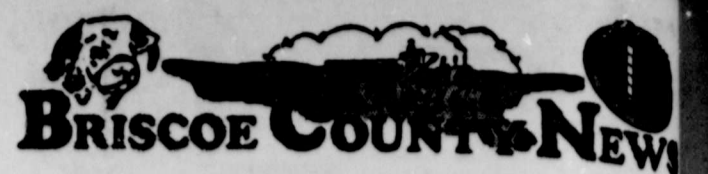

WHY NO MECHANICAL INSTRUMENTS OF MUSIC

Occasional people inquire, "Why do you not use mechanical instruments of music in worship?" This is not asked to reflect upon the fine congregational singing which we have, but comes from someone untaught.

We reply that our position regarding such is not due to our being so poor that we cannot afford such nor because we just choose to be different nor because we find a "Thou shalt not..." to that effect in the Bible. Nor do we object to mechanical instruments out of worship.

The position we occupy is, we believe, consistent with God's Word. The Bible teaches us to sing (Ephesians 5:19; Colossians 3:16).

We know that to obey God we must sing. And we do. But we cannot conscientiously go beyond this in worship to God. We believe that it is sinful to go beyond the Word. We believe there is no Bible authority for mechanical instruments of music in worship. We believe that playing upon instruments in addition to singing is comparable to praying in the name of Paul in conjunction with the name of Christ. It is true that no where does the Bible say, "Thou shalt not pray in the name of Paul." Yet since we are to pray in the name of Christ we are not to pray in the name of Paul.

To illustrate the matter further, consider Noah and the ark. Noah was told to build the ark of gopher wood (Genesis 6:14). This was specific. To build the ark out of any other material would have been disobedient since God named the kind of wood that Noah was to use. Had God commanded Noah to build the ark without naming the material to use Noah would have exercised his own choice in the matter. However the specific material was named.

Now we consider music in worship. Had we been told to "make music" we would be free to take our choice in the matter. But the specific thing is named. Therefore, we are restricted to the thing named.

We believe to go beyond that which is written is out of harmony with God's Word. Our practice is not to question for no one has any doubt about God's accepting congregational singing. All engage in it at times. The addition to our congregational singing is questionable.

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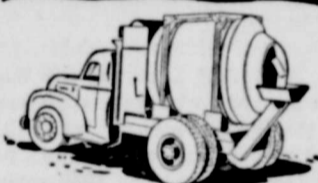
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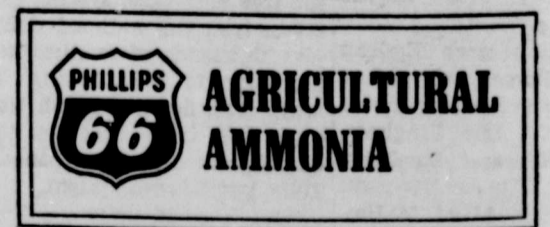

"I've used ammonia for the past five years and can certainly see a lot of difference in the yields. On 289 acres of maize, 100 pounds of Phillips 66 Ammonia per acre was applied . . . one-half pre-plant and one-half side dressed. Yield was 5456 pounds per acre," according to Floyd Copeland, who farms 880 acres.

He says, "A hundred pounds of Phillips 66 Ammonia was also applied pre-plant on 200 acres of wheat. With 43% hail damage, wheat averaged 39 bushels. Where you have plenty of moisture assured through irrigation, it's just plain logic to use ammonia and get maximum yields."

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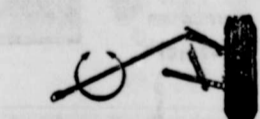
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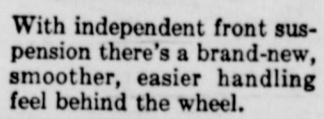

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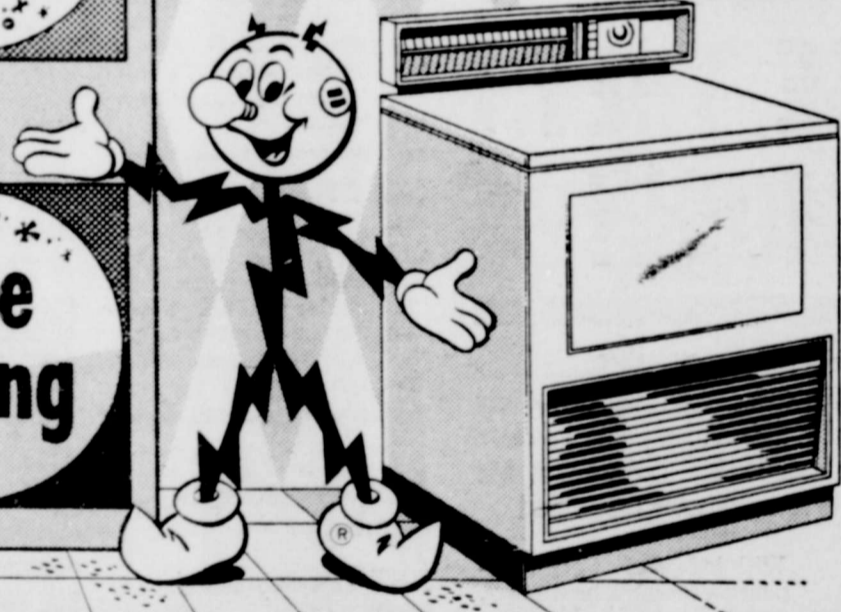
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
