To make a long story short, Jack accepted my apology, didn't follow through with a civil action, and eventually seemed to have forgiven my error.

Sometimes, errors happen when you're wildly typing away at a news stories, and the human mind being what it is, it is often difficult for a story's writer to catch such an error. The writer's brain knows what is supposed to be on the page and overrules the eye later on when proofing the story.
