



### MR. COTTON FARMER:

This information is to all farmers regarding the delinting of your cotton seed. In delinting and treatment of the seed it is necessary to add water to the solution that we treat them with. Therefore when sacked it will take quite a period of time for them to thoroughly dry out.

For this reason I would like to urge you to have your seed delinted as soon as possible and not wait until just before planting time; otherwise, you may have difficulty in planting them on account of their being damp. If they are damp they will not feed out of the planter box.

If you will attend to this as suggested above, I feel it will eliminate a lot of trouble for you, and us, when cotton planting time comes around
