

Dryland maize yield increases 1100 lbs. per acre



KENNETH BROSEH of Lockney, Tex. reports that 60 lbs. of Ammonia helped make 3200 lbs.maize per acre

"A test was conducted on 250 acres of dryland maize to help determine the benefits of ammonia. On 30 acres, 60 pounds of Phillips 66 Ammonia per acre was applied pre-plant. 
