ADDITIONAL GREAT PLAINS CONSERVATION FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE

Until recently funds under the Great Plains Conservation Program have been exhausted in Briscoe County and this area. Recently, however, more funds have been made available for our use. Several people have recently completed plans or are in the process of completing plans to be cost-shared under the Great Plains Program. These include E. A. Birdwell of the Luther Ranch, Walter Graham, Orval Cobb and the Kelley farm, Alga Turner, operator.

All of these people plan terraces, diversions, farm ponds, brush control and other practices. Birdwell plans one erosion control dam plus all the other practices mentioned.

The Amarillo area, which includes eleven counties, got \$120,000, which was supposed to have been obligated by March 1. However the bad weather has slowed things down and we still have part of the money. We do want to get this obligated as soon as possible or it will be lost to other areas or states.

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SALES PRICE FOR CCC COTTON SET

Minimum sales prices for Commodity Credit Corporation stocks of upland cotton have been determined for the 1960-61 marketing year, according to Fred Mercer, Chairman of Briscoe County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The new sales prices are intended to emphasize farmers' marketings. The announcement at this time will provide farm operators with information on CCC's sales prices before the March 16 deadline for electing Choice (B) allotments and price support for the 1960 crop.

For 1959 and prior crops of upland cotton in CCC inventory, the new minimum sales price will be the higher of (1) the market price as determined by CCC, or (2) 115 per cent of the 1960 Choice (B) loan rate. (This compares with the current 110 per cent of the loan rate.)

For 1960-crop cotton, the minimum sales price is as follows: When the cotton is sold by local sales agencies, the minimum sales price will be 110 per cent of the Choice (B) loan rate; when the cotton is sold by the New Orleans CSS Commodity office, the minimum sales price will be the higher of (1) the market price as determined by CCC, or (2) 110 per cent of the Choice (B) loan rate.

Mr. Mercer pointed out that carrying charges will be added to the sales price, beginning with 10 points in October 1960, and increasing 20 points per month for each month thereafter to a maximum of 190 points in July 1961. The current monthly increase for carrying charges is 15 points per month for each month after October 1959.

Farm Sale Postponed Due to Weather

The Farm Sale originally scheduled for Thursday, March 3, has been re-scheduled for Thursday, March 17, according to John Martin, owner.

Due to bad weather and icing conditions all last week, it was decided to postpone the sale until such time as conditions would possibly be more favorable.

Potatoes Added to Research Program

Potatoes will be added to the 1960 vegetable research program at the High Plains Research Foundation. This experiment to find varieties better suited for chip production will be conducted in cooperation with Allen Bros., Halfway, and the International Potato Chip Institute of Cleveland, Ohio. Dr. T. C. Longnecker, Director of the Foundation, announced today. Mr. Henry Allen of Allen Bros. stated in making the research request on behalf of Allen Bros. and the Institute, that "there is a great need for a potato that meets the specific gravity and other quality

requirements of the potato chip industry." The Foundation is conducting this testing program as a part of its search for crops which will aid the area income and permit greater diversification of farm crops and in developing industry. Eight varieties of potatoes will be included in the testing program. One-half acre will be assigned to each of the varieties. The Foundation will conduct the tests and the quality analysis will be made by the Potato Chip Institute's Laboratories at Ithaca, N. Y. The Institute is searching for an area where quality potatoes can be grown on a large scale to supply the potato chip industry. Local potato enthusiasts are hopeful that the High Plains can be that area.

Jesse Stuart, a noted school teacher, farmer, poet and short-story writer, possesses a stronger moral fiber than that of many other people. Mr. Stuart, who has the features of an All-American football player, was reared to work hard and to exemplify honesty.

As a result of Mr. Stuart's background, that of a poor Kentucky farm boy, he has striven doubly hard to obtain his objectives. He attended a one-room country school in Plum Grove, Kentucky, where he was born in 1907. He later walked five miles to and from a country high school. Despite the added burden of walking to school as well as doing his chores, he did well. He was a scholar and also the school's best football player.

During Mr. Stuart's high school career, he had many vivid experiences. While on a science field trip, he and five other boys broke down a cherry tree. He was punished by having to help the janitor after school to raise the money to pay his share of the cost of the broken tree. His instilled desire for fair play made him submit to his punishment without a whimper. Although he made a few mistakes, he was extremely popular, especially with the girls.
