Her name is Jocelyn McAlpine and she is quite a personality in the cutting horse world. Treasurer is Beulah Morton from Ajo, Arizona. NIRA reporter is Gerry Bishop, an RCA cowboy from Tucson. Business manager for the rodeo is Harry Kruse from Cashion, Arizona. Our Rodeo Club and team also have an advisor, Dr. Bill Van-Arsdale, who devotes nearly all his free time to the club, the team and the rodeo sport in general. Down here we don't rodeo just during the spring, but try to get to as many shows as we can on our own time during the fall and winter. Nearly everyone expects to get bucked off a bull or horse or see his calf run off down the arena and hear the announcer say "no time." 

APPROVED GOSPEL

But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed. As we said before, so say I now again, if any man preach any other gospel unto you than that ye have received, let him be accursed." (Galatians 1:8-9).

(1) The gospel preached by Paul and divinely inspired men of the New Testament was the only approved gospel. It consisted of facts to be believed (1 Cor. 15:1-5), commandments to be obeyed (as Mark 16:16), and promises to be received (As Acts 2:38).

(2) This approved gospel was first preached by the Apostles on Pentecost (Acts 2), later in Judea, Samaria and the world (Mark 16:15; Acts 1:8). When Paul wrote to the Galatians he said, "***We have preached unto you, """" (the gospel), and """ye have received." (the gospel).

(3) However, there were other gospels preached then (Gal. 1:6-7). But the "other" gospels were not just as good. There was no substitute. Nor was there a changeable gospel. Those who preached contrary to the truth were accursed (condemned). Honesty, sincerity and education made no difference

The danger today is little different from the danger in Paul's day. Men are still seeking to cut loose from the Bible. To abey but not to carry on religious work but after man's choosing. This danger is present today largely because of a lack of individual investigation coupled with an unconcern for the truth and an uncompromising prejudice against those who teach the one gospel. And a few through false notion of superior knowledge openly defy the Word and carry on in their own way. All who preach a different gospel come under the condemnation of God.
