This week we would like to tell our readers about our Driver's Education Department. This is the second straight year for this subject, although we had it a few years ago when Buddy Travis was here. Last year Driver's Education was taught by Raymond Adams, this year the teacher is Robert Whelchel. Coach Whelchel gives us the following information:

Thirty hours of classroom instruction entitles students to take the written test for their operator's license. If they pass the written test, they receive their license; having a restriction of having a qualified licensed operator in the front seat. By passing the written test they then have to have eight hours of driving ad sixteen hours of observing others drive. This entitles the students to take the driving test given by the Highway Patrol. Passing driving test removes the restriction of having a qualified licensed operator in the front seat.
