We might all gladly carry with us the Holy Bible in which Paul has fourteen epistles, but we should not expect to see in the hands of any of us a creed or opinion of man decreeing what the will of God shall be.

True, there are some deep sayings that no man may ever be able to fathom, but every revelation of His divine will to man is so simply revealed that the 12-year-old boy or girl may learn it perfectly. One great essential is learning the proper divisions of the Bible, for it is very systematically arranged. These divisions are clearly set forth by the Bible itself, but beginners need to know what circumstances the particular language was addressed.
