Even before the people of the tornado-devastated community of Sunnyside had given much thought to building back or replacing their lost possessions after the storm there recently, the people of this area opened their pocketbooks and began pouring money in to soften the economic blow.

Significantly the largest contribution received was from the people of Silverton. They sent \$5,000 to the stricken community and gave \$1,000 toward rebuilding the Sunnyside Baptist Church. It was in the spring of 1957 that a similar tornado ripped into Silverton, about sixty miles from Sunnyside, inflicting tremendous devastation and leaving in its wake many homeless, dead and injured.

Briscoe County Sheriff Johnnie Lanham said in helping make the check presentation that "Money is one of the most desperate needs in a community hit by a tornado. There are hundreds of things that have to be done and nearly all of them cost. The money everyone in the Panhandle sent us was a tremendous help — I don't see how we could have gotten along without it."

The Silverton donation will be administered by a committee of people from Sunnyside who will pay out of the funds on a basis of need.

The film titled "CAPTURED" is the first ever made on the subject and tells of a family which moved to a new town and finds the public schools there run by a religious body.

The movie is a semi-documentary based on court records in Missouri, New Mexico and other states where "captive schools" have existed. According to a recent survey made of 48 state school boards of education, there are numerous public schools in 21 states, employing at least 2000 sectarian teachers dressed in the distinctive garb of their religion.

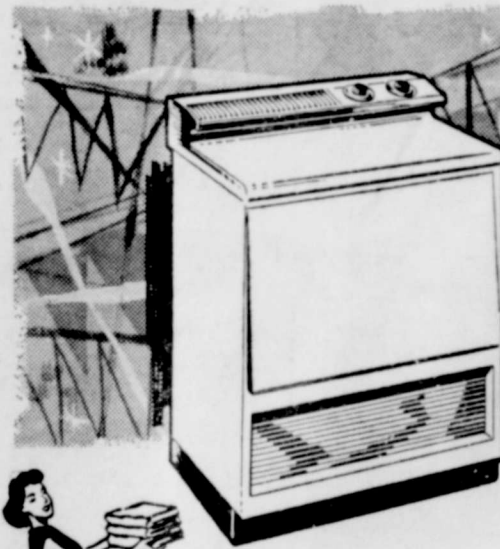

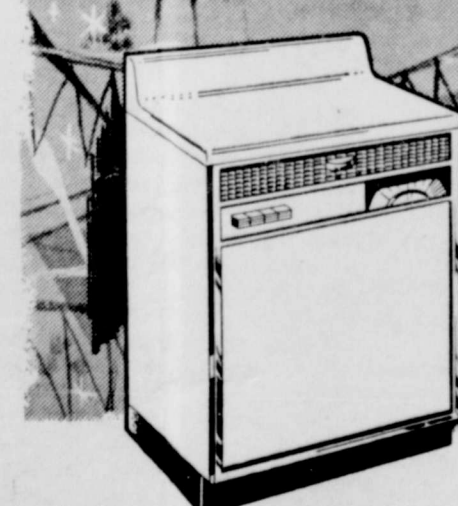

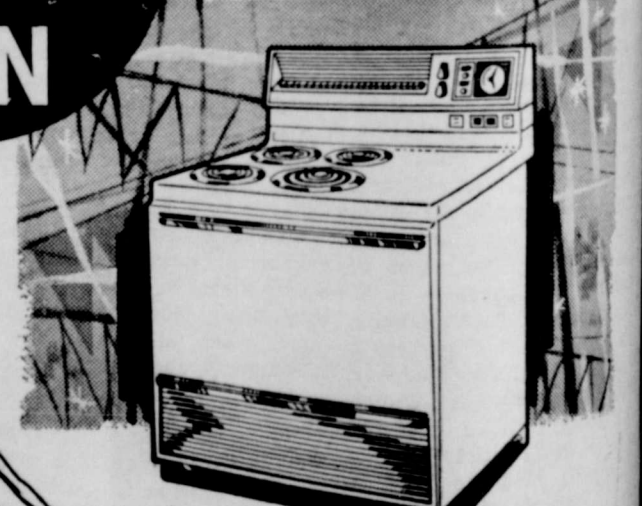

SCHOOL NURSE ATTENDS CONFERENCE AT W.T.S.C.

More than 40 school superintendents, administrators, science teachers and health educators considered cancer education in senior high schools and colleges at a day long conference at West Texas State College in Canyon, April 23. Attending the meeting from Silvertown as representative of Silvertown Independent Schools, was Mrs. L. G. Kleman, R.N. The conference was held under the auspices of Texas Division of the American Cancer Society, the Texas Education Agency, the Texas Medical Association and the State Department of Health.

Delegates to the meeting explored ways in which the school can help to provide knowledge which will protect students against cancer in later life, to reach adults indirectly through students, who often discuss school studies with parents and others, and to encourage students to develop career interests in the fight against cancer.

Dr. James P. Cornett, President of West Texas State College, welcomed the delegates to the conference. Mr. Charles Wright and Mrs. Scott Cowning, both of Canyon, were in charge of conference arrangements.

Homemaker's Scrapbook

Tips on Sewing

Allow the skirt to hang at least 24 hours before marking the hem line. Cut the hem allowance evenly and hem. Always press a bias skirt with the grain of the fabric to help retain the original shaping. If you press on the straight up-and-down you will stretch against the grain and make the hem uneven. . . . Top stitching reinforces the waistline seam and helps to keep it from stretching. It also gives a trim smooth finish in case the dress is to be worn without a belt. . . . To guard against clipping into the stitching, place a pin directly on the stitching line. Cut toward the stitching until the scissors hit the pin. This way you cannot cut too far. This pin guard can also be used at corner points to eliminate cutting the stitching line. . . . Most fabrics will shine if pressed on the right side, and construction details such as darts, seam allowances, and hems will become more prominent. Therefore it is always advisable to press on the wrong side of the garment, place a piece of brown paper under the edges of the darts, seam allowances, etc. If it is necessary to press any details on the right side of the fabric, be sure to use a press cloth.

ANOTHER DENOMINATION

Many erroneously regard the churches of Christ as just another denomination that had its beginning a century or so ago. However, members of the church of Christ think quite differently. They all heard the same gospel (Gal. 1:8,9). They all believed the same things, obeyed the same way and worshipped the same way.

As the years passed, men began to write their own creeds thereby placing themselves in a new category. Leaders gathered followers and organized themselves into denominations. This requires different names, different doctrines.

But when people began to read the New Testament and to learn for themselves what it taught about the New Testament church they became concerned. They searched God's Word and discovered that innocent people were following the teachings of men and were thereby divided. Rather than create another denomination they threw away their own man made books and abandoned all human names and took the Bible as their only creed, resolving to be everything but nothing more than the Bible commanded them to be.

But who "started" this organization? The man who takes of the same rule book does not "start" the church. He is not its founder. He is a member of the church which began on Pentecost. The organization is not a denomination. It is the New Testament church in the 20th Century.


