Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article X of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto new Sections to be known as Sections 6. 7, and 8, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of Hospital Dis-ricts co-extensive with Lamer County, Hidalgo County, and Coun y Commis-tioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche Dounty, having certain stated powers and duties and subject to certain stated imitations; providing that any enab-ing Acts shall not be invalid because if their anticipatory character; pro-riding for an election; prescribing he form of ballot and providing for he necessary proclamation and pub-lection.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

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


