Among other items, the Southern commissioners warned against the delegation of too much administrative power in putting any Federal farm program into effect.

It was pointed out that "the experience of the past seven years has clearly demonstrated the danger of allowing too much administrative leeway in farm legislation - in effect, delegating powers to the administrative branch of the government. During this time all of the administrative powers have been used negatively to wreck the farm program.

"As a result it has been unnecessarily expensive, with too little benefit to the farmers, and surpluses have piled up in certain commodities to the paint of the ridiculous. This has been by design, not mere bungling, and by making the farm program unpopular with the people has enabled the administration to hack away at farm legislation. This could not have happened if our farm program had been more broadly based in concept and legislative provisions to carry out its intent had been more rigidly drawn.

"The time has come when we should seek to avoid pieced-on. patched-up or piece-meal legislation for agriculture. The urgent give it stability.

> Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today announced the official prediction that 29 persons will be killed next weekend in Labor Day haliday traffic in

Garrison said some 125 extra patrolmen from the department's tionally other uniformed services will join the regular Highway Patrol force violations - which figure in most fatal accidents.

"We hope the driving public will help this Labor Day weekend to prove that we have over-estimated the number of traffic fatalities that will occur in the three-day period.

"Department patrolmen and all other law enforcement afficers in our state will do everything possible to make the streets and highways safer by removing lawless drivers -but the statistics prove the main job is up to the individual behind the wheel.'

"It is significant to note that in each of the 14 fatal accidents which occurred outside city limits last Labor Day weekend, at least one law violation was involved."

N. K. Woerner, manager of the department's statistical services, reported that excessive speed over the posted limits was involved in 10 of the 14 rural fatal accidents during the holiday last year and that drinking was involved in seven of the 14.

tized and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lard The Lord told Annaias to go to Saul and tell him what he wa to do (Acts 9:10, 11; 22:10). Upon meeting Saul he affectionate addressed him as "Brother." This was before he told him what he was to do (Acts 9:6, 17). After restoring Saul's sight miraculon he commanded Saul to "arise, and be baptized, and wash awa his sins (Acts 22:13, 16).

Consider some interesting facts about Saul. (1) He had for merly persecuted Christians (Acts 9:1,2). (2) He had seen a brid light and had been stricken blind (Acts 9:3,9). (3) He had talke with Jesus (Acts 9:4-6; 22:8). (4) He was to be tald in Damaeu what he was to do (Acts 22:10). (5) He had gone three days fasting and praying (Acts 9:11). (6) after all this he had not had h sins washed away (Acts 22:16).

The commandment to "arise, and be bajtized, and wa away" his sins implies first, that Saul was a believer and then fore ready to be baptized and second, that atlhough a believer, h sins were not washed away.

The question "why triest thou?" suggests the urgency being baptized since he believed. In the Bible men were baptized the same hour they learned the truth. See also Acts 16:33 for "Wash away thy sins," is an expression referring to the p


