

They are checked for mutations, cross-pollinated plants, noxious weeds, diseases, isolation from other crops, and all sorts of other things, Bill Staffel, chief of the Texas Department of Agriculture seed division explained.

Even the harvesting and processing equipment is checked to make sure there are no seeds or other foreign material from previous field work left on or in them.

After harvest the seed is sampled and analyzed. If the seed passes all of these inspections, checks and tests, it can be packed and labeled with either the purple tag for Texas Registered or the blue tag for Texas Certified seed.



STARTING SEPT. 14 **ACREAGE SURVEY**

Postmaster Grady Martin announced today that Rural Mail Carriers will begin distributing 1960 Acreage Survey Cards to patrons on their routes about September

The Post Office and U. S. Agriculture Departments cooperatively make this survey each year. These reports, directly from farmers, are the basis for official estimates for Texas acreage of all crops harvested in 1960.

To be sure this community is well represented in the survey, Postmaster Martin urges each patron receiving a card to fill it out and return it to his mailbox.
