All Around the Town

Who will be the next President of the United States—Mr. Nixon or Mr. Kennedy? This question is on the lips and minds of practically every citizen of the United States.

In our area the question of Kennedy's religion has cropped up, as well as doubts as to whether Richard Nixon will be able to come up with a solution to the farm problem. Due to the fact that the livelihood of a community such as ours depends very much on the welfare of the farmers, we predict that the man whose promises seem to hold the best solution to the agricultural problems facing our nation today will be the candidate who carries Briscoe County.

Our county, and state for that matter, is considered to be one which will vote the Democratic ticket, especially so this year with the Vice Presidential candidate coming from the great state of Texas.

Johnson has definitely lost political prestige by risking nothing to enter the race for Vice President. We have strong doubt that it is really constitutional for a man's name to appear on the ballot in two places as is the case with Johnson running for Vice President of the United States and for this seat in the Senate on the same ballot. We feel that it would be just as foolish for Democrats to vote for Johnson twice on the ballot as it would be to vote for Johnson as the Vice President and for the Republican opponent simply because no other candidate is listed.

This situation will cost Kennedy votes in Texas, and it is my strong suspicion that some Texans will vote against Johnson in both slots because of the principle of it.

Nixon seemingly has gained valuable experience while serving in the Vice Presidential office. We know he gained prestige on some of his foreign trips and he has openly disagreed with some of President Eisenhower's controversial decisions. One with which he hasn't disagreed enough, we think, is on the subject of agriculture. In two televised debates with Mr. Kennedy, Mr. Nixon fared very badly. In the first debate it was obvious that Mr. Nixon was "scared stiff." Though Nixon did come up with some pretty good answers, Kennedy did have more information on history or of actions and decisions of the parties. However, Nixon does seem to have a good training mate in Mr. Lodge.

Who will it be? Will our voters choose the platform set up by the Democratic Party or will they give a vote of confidence to that of the Republican Party? Will YOU vote for the team of Nixon-Lodge or will you vote for the Kennedy-Johnson team?

Amarillo Man Is Electrocuted Near Here

James Arville Green, 45, of Cliffside, north of Amarillo, was electrocuted Monday in northwest Briscoe County as he attempted to climb onto a rock crushing unit to repair defective electric wiring.

Green was part of the crew working on a road project under contract to Ivan Dement, Inc. of Amarillo. There were two other men on the machine as Green came up the side. He grabbed a cable to pull himself up over the side and was thrown to the ground by the force of the electrical shock.

The other two men on the machine were not aware anything had happened to Green, though they both received slight shocks. The crew's foreman saw Green on the

ground and called others to check. They found him already dead. His body was removed from the scene by Wallace Funeral Home of Tulia, and funeral arrangements were with Stickley Funeral Home in Canadian.

He was survived by his wife; two daughters; three sons; his mother, Mrs. J. Ballard of Canadian; two sisters, Mrs. Marvin Dickson of Borger and Mrs. Ray Downs of Borger.

TURKS TOO STRONG FOR OWLS

The Turkey Turks, strong contenders for the district 9-B crown, proved too tough for Silvertown's Class A Owls in last Friday night's grid clash.

A very exciting first half kept all spectators on the edge of their seats, as the teams battled through a scoreless first quarter.

Turkey's first penetration came after Conroy Lacy intercepted an Owl pass and carried to the ten yard line. Lacy carried for five yards on the next play, but the Owls held them scoreless for three downs at the five yard line.

The first score of the evening came about mid-way in the second quarter after Turkey completed a pass down to the twenty-five yard line. After an incomplete pass, Conroy Lacy, big 190-lb Senior Fullback, charged over for the touchdown, and snagged a pass for the conversion points.

Seconds before the first half ended, Turkey recovered an Owl fumble, and Don Guest, 147-lb Sophomore Quarterback ran forty-five yards for the second tally. Conroy Lacy kicked the extra point

and the Turks moved ahead 15-0. Turkey's third touchdown came when Conroy Lacy received the second half opening kick at the Turkey twenty yard line and raced eighty yards to score. Lacy also kicked the extra point, making the score 22-0, favoring the visiting Turks.

Only four plays later, Keith Lane, big Senior End, intercepted an Owl pass and scampered fifty yards for another Turk touchdown. Early in the fourth quarter, Jerry Westberry, who had been benched earlier with an injury, scampered forty yards for another Turk tally.

Silvertown's only score came very late in the game, with less than a minute on the time clock, when Larry May drove over from the one yard line. John Jowell ran into the end zone for the two extra points, and the final score was Turkey 34, Silvertown 8.

Statistics prove that the Turks received a lot of lucky breaks throughout the game. Turkey made only three first downs, while Silvertown made only one. See TURKS TOO STRONG—Page 2

Attend District ESA Meeting

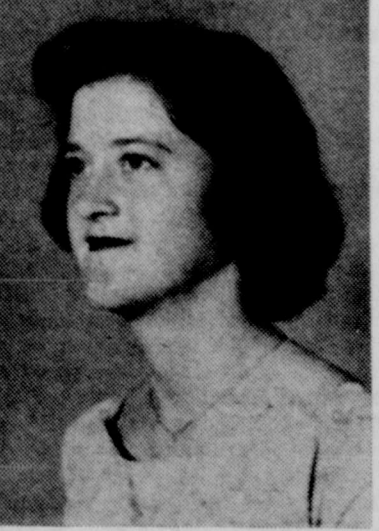

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THE VIRGIN BIRTH

"Therefore the Lord Himself shall give you a sign; Behold a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." Isaiah 7:14.

Seven hundred years after Isaiah spoke these words, Gabriel, the trusted angel of God, appeared in the little Galilean city of Nazareth. He bore the now famous message of annunciation to a faithful Jewish maiden named Mary. We imagine her consternation and surprise that she had been granted the highest favor ever bestowed upon a woman. She was to bear a son, begotten within her virgin body by the miraculous power of the Holy Spirit; his name was to be "Jesus"; he was to be a King upon the throne of David from whom Mary was descended; and he was to be known as the Son of God.

The inspired pens of Matthew and Luke record the story of the virgin birth of our Lord in the first chapters of their gospels. They offer no explanation, but with sublime simplicity use only the words of the divine messenger. The substance of this angelic message and its fulfillment forms the cornerstone of the Christian faith. It is the first gospel truth most of us learned at the knee of our blessed mother, and many have said that it has given greater depth and reality to the Christian religion than any other event, not excepting the resurrection. The incarnation of Christ, inaugurating a new life, itself to be created in the lives of men, implies a new kind of birth. His birth by the power of the Holy Spirit with the blessed virgin adequately supplies the means for the pre-existent Christ to assume a fleshly form. As he was ever the Son of God, living a sinless life and a Savior from sin, the virgin birth appears more reasonable than if were said to be natural.

Upon the integrity of this gospel record of the virgin birth rests Jesus' divinity - and upon His divinity depends our salvation. Blessed and worthy is the gospel preacher who proclaims "the whole counsel of God" exactly as the Book of God reveals it. The greatest enemy of Christianity is he who would supplant any revealed truth of God with the opinions or doctrines of men. Come worship with us at the Silverton Church of Christ.

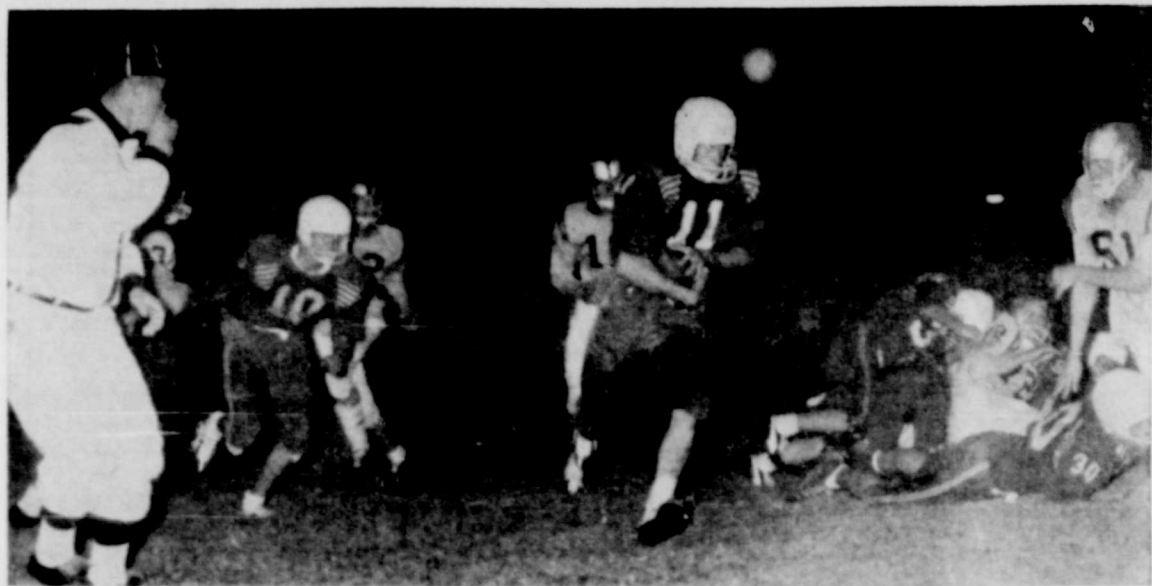
