All Around the Town

It has been pointed out to me during this past week that in my effort to interpret how I believe the trend to be running in the Presidential election, I have leaned over backward. I have tried to refrain from expressing my personal political leanings for several reasons. The first and foremost of these reasons is that not only am I not an authority on the subject, but also, I am only in my second year in newspaper work and feel I have much to learn.

I did express the opinion earlier that two poor candidates have been selected to run for the Presidency of the United States. Either of the Vice Presidential candidates would have suited me better; my mind was committed to Lyndon Johnson the President long ago. However, Mr. Kennedy is a brilliant man with a beautiful command of the English language, and Mr. Nixon is the man whom the Republicans have been grooming for the job for the past eight years.

A number of things have been pointed out to me during the past few weeks, and I have tried to keep an open mind for new facts. One of the things I seem to have been in error on is the reason behind Mr. Johnson's running for two offices on the same ballot. I have had it explained to me and now understand that this is being done to hold his seat in the Senate for a Democrat whom Governor Daniel will appoint when Kennedy and Johnson are elected to the highest offices in the land. In all probability, the man appointed to fill the Senate position will be a man recommended by Johnson. This will help hold the Democratic majority which will be so important to a Democratic administration.

My reason for choosing the Democratic party in this important election is very simple and selfish. I have lived my entire life in a small radius of an agricultural section of the Panhandle of Texas—some of the nicest places on earth, I think.

The income in Briscoe County is, I would estimate, more than 95 per cent from agricultural products. We do not depend on dollars earned elsewhere to be spent here. The money in circulation here is only what is earned from the sale of farm products. We sell advertising with the local merchants, and the more the merchants advertise in the local newspaper, the more the merchants have to import goods from afar to sell in their shops, but the monies they receive are from the farmer.

Therefore I feel a strong dependency on farmers—small farmers—who also live and work and trade in Briscoe County.

The only page left in my question book is this: "Who will do the most to help our local farmer?" The answer cannot be in favor of the Republicans who appointed Mr. Benson and have for the last number of years praised his policies. Mr. Nixon has called Mr. Benson "one of the greatest Secretaries of Agriculture in our history."

All who favor that and are in agreement with the administration of the last eight years should go to the polls to elect Nixon-Lodge. I am convinced that Senator Kennedy is dedicated to his bill of rights for American farmers. This bill carries ten points which get right down to the issue, and Senator Kennedy's own words:

1. A fair share of the national income is the right of every farmer.

Local Insurance Co. Raises Benefits

By order of the Commissioner of Insurance of the State of Texas, approval was granted at a Public Hearing held in Austin, Texas, on September 26, 1960, for the name of the former Douglas-Daniel Association of Silvertown to be changed to Roberts Service Insurance Company. The Company's charter is also converted from a burial association to a local mutual aid association, whereby a larger policy can be issued.

As a burial association, the largest policy that could be issued was \$150, but with these changes, up to \$600 maximum benefits can now be written.

Ralph Roberts, President of the Roberts Service Insurance Company, announced today that all policy holders of the former Douglas-Daniel Burial Association will receive endorsements from the new Association, assuming full liability for the Douglas-Daniel policies now in force.

through protective price supports, loans, commodity agreements, and marketing orders is the right of every farmer.

5. Production adjustment by majority choice is the right of every farmer.

6. Conservation assistance to help him save land, water and forest resources is the right of every farmer.

7. Low cost credit is the right of every farmer.

8. Scientific protection against plant disease and pestilence is the right of every farmer.

9. An expanded cooperative movement to help farmers escape

the cost-price squeeze is the right of every farmer.

10. An expanded REA, with low rates, is the right of every farmer.

Senator Kennedy's farm program calls for "parity of income which gives average producers a return on their invested capital, labor and management equal to that for comparable resources in non-farm employment. My belief is that for the first time in eight years farmers the nation over will be able to look to an administration in Washington determined to use all the resources of government to preserve the small, family-type farm which has been the foundation of our agricultural economy.

These are my reasons.

The New Testament Scriptures

The advent of Jesus Christ on earth as the Savior brought into the world a new system of religion, known as the new covenant or new Testament. It was very different from the Law of Moses given exclusively to the Jews, which law was taken away by the death of Jesus on the cross (Col. 2:14). The New Testament scriptures are an unfolding of the gospel system or plan of salvation by grace through faith in Jesus Christ as the son of God. The New Testament alone reveals the way of this great salvation. We now present a brief outline of these scriptures with their special significance.

The four books of the gospel - Matthew, Mark, Luke and John give the history of Jesus as an example, of His teaching and instruction, and His death as the atonement for the sins of the world; all this for the purpose of creating faith in Him as the son of God. Act of the Apostles gives a history of the organization of the church; the coming of the Holy Spirit and its purposes the preaching of the apostles under the great commission of Christ, beginning at Jerusalem and continuing throughout the world. In Acts alone, of all books of the Bible, we are told how people came into the church; of what they must do to be saved and the many examples of conversion to Christ.

The twenty-one epistles were written to organized churches and individuals, to Christians, instructing them in everything pertaining to life and Godliness, that these children of God, by receiving "the sincere milk of the word," might grow strong in all the Christian graces, thus preventing their falling away. Fourteen of the epistles were written by the Apostle Paul, the great apostle to the Gentiles, and in his writings as in no other, is developed the distinction between the gospel of Christ and the Law of Moses which Judaizing teachers sometimes sought to bind upon Christian.

The Revelation by the old Apostle John gives a prophetic history of the church, foretelling great calamities which were to come upon the earth, the struggles and sufferings of the saints and their final victory.

It concludes with a word picture of John's vision of heaven that beggars the language of the ablest writers of all human literature.
