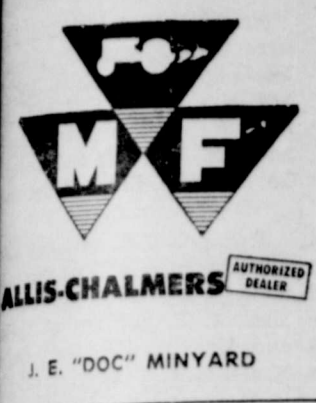

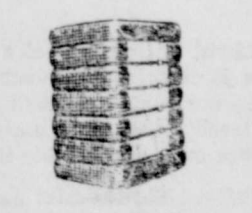

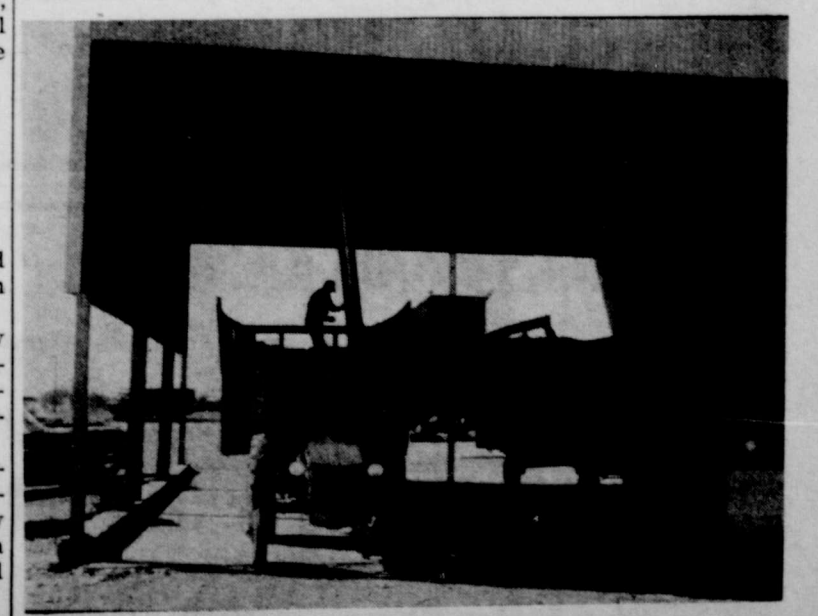

RESOLUTIONS TO BE CONSIDERED AT FARMERS UNION CONVENTION

County organizations of Texas Farmers Union from throughout the state are flooding the state office at Denton, with resolutions to be considered and possibly adopted, by the convention delegates at the 57th Annual Convention of the Texas Farmers Union at Abilene beginning December 9th.

These resolutions are indicative of the concern of farmers throughout Texas in declining farm income surpluses as results of come and the building up of the disastrous Benon-Eisenhower farm programs. These resolutions also indicate the confidence farmers have in the new administration of Kennedy and Johnson.

Farmers feel more secure under a Democratic administration than they do under Republican administration. Kennedy and Johnson have pledged parity of income and stated that they would allow the farmer to write their own program. This program to be put in front of farmers in the form of a referendum giving the farmers a choice of the method of reaching a parity of income.

President Alex Dickie, Jr. has

indicated that these resolutions encompass dozens of questions including all phases of government price supports and acreage control programs and many other matters affected or controlled by Federal, State, and County government. The tenor of the resolutions indicate that the 57th Annual Texas Farmers Union Convention will be one of the most vigorous, exciting and certainly one of the most important conventions in Texas Farmers Union history.

Lists of delegates which are being received in the state office now indicate that the official delegation will exceed 300 delegates and additional hundreds of Farmers Union members are expected to attend one or more of the convention sessions which will be held at the Windsor Hotel in Abilene.

One of the main speakers will be the National Farmers Union President, James G. Patton, who is also President of International Federation Agriculture Producers, an organization of farmers of the free world.

DO THE CHURCHES OF CHRIST HAVE A CREED?

Churches of Christ have a creed, but they do not have a human creed. They do have a book that sets forth what they believe and practice, but they did not author it and it never needs to be revised. This creed book among churches of Christ is the Bible itself.

The word "creed" means simply what one believes. Many religious bodies have written their own creed books stating what they believe and practice. These are human creeds in that God did not author them. These often conflict with one another. The Churches of Christ believe the Bible is sufficient as God gave it. Preachers of the Churches of Christ must prove all things by the bible. Members are not told to believe anything except the teachings of the bible.

Members of the Churches of Christ reason that if a creed book contains more than the bible it contains too much. If it contains less than the bible it does not contain enough and if it contains exactly what the bible teaches then it is useless for it would be nothing more than another copy of the bible itself.

Hence, members of the Churches of Christ insist on being called "Christians" (Acts 11:26). They refer to the churches as "Churches of Christ" (Romans 16:16). They believe this is first God's will and second that it is broad enough for every soul who sincerely seeks to obey God's commands to be saved (Mark 16:16). The bible is the only creed book among Churches of Christ.
