SNOWFALL GIVES AREA A CHRISTMAS - Y LOOK

The Silvertton-Quitauque area has experienced one of the most beautiful snowfalls in a number of years. In Silvertton, Ray C. Bomar measured 12 inches of snow which produced .98 of an inch of moisture.

To the east of Silvertton in the Caprock country and in the city of Quitauque a slightly larger amount of snow was received.

Snow began falling last Friday, and some five to six inches measured. Friday morning some of the largest flakes that even the old-timers can recall seeing piled more snow onto the ground. Friday night another five or six inches fell. It continued snowing off and on Saturday.

By Sunday afternoon, highways were completely clear of snow and ice, and though only scattered flakes fell on Tuesday, skies were foggy and gray and much snow remained on the ground. Temperatures have remained in the middle to upper 20's and lower 30's during the entire spell.

Cattlemen have been grateful for the lack of wind that would have drifted the snow and made it difficult for them to continue their feeding. Cotton men need about two more weeks of sunny weather.

Briscoe County Pioneer Is Buried At Quitauque

Funeral services for Oscar William Stroup, long-time Quitauque resident, were held at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday, December 13, in the First Baptist Church of Quitauque. The Rev. Robert Beck officiated at the services, assisted by the Rev. W. M. Draper, a retired Baptist minister, of Plainview.

He was one of the early-day residents of Briscoe County, coming here from South Dakota over 60 years ago. He worked for the F Ranch at one time, a branch of the Goodnight Ranch.

He acquired his own ranch west of Quitauque in 1903 and was active in farming and ranching until his illness. He was a member of the Quitauque School Board for a number of years during its early days. He served as an inspector for the Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association for more than 15 years. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife, three sons, Jim of Quitauque, Charlie of Fort Morgan, Colorado, and Jack of Shamrock; a daughter, Miss Gladys Stroup of Amarillo; and four grandchildren.

Eleven and a half months have passed, and here we are again running down the shopping list to make sure that everyone will have Christmas gift under the tree by December 25, which comes on Sunday this year. With only nine shopping days left in which to finish the shopping, you had better make the final decisions right now.

Christmas time is one of the most enjoyable seasons of the year. The beautiful snow which we have had this past week has helped us realize that Santa is on his way.

Installation buying and borrowing reach a peak in December as the result of a spurge of gift buying. On Christmas morning Americans will open an estimated \$7.3 billion worth of presents, according to a survey conducted by Market Facts.

Families with an annual income of less than \$7,500 will spend about \$100 for such gifts while those with incomes of \$7,500 and over will spend close to \$200. The average family will spend about \$147.

Women make 83% of all Christmas purchases, but men are likely to spend more money. This is because a man's single gift to his wife may be a new refrigerator, car or an expensive fur coat.

Gifts most desired by women include coats, sweaters, watches, sewing machines, perfume, rings, sets, sofas, dresses, jackets, electric mixers, and toasters, according to the survey which was based on comprehensive interviews with 250 women in three major cities.

Typical gifts that these women wanted to give their husbands were sweaters, shirts, tools and photographic equipment.

Some of the gifts that are remembered the most cost very little. Few things are more welcome than goodies from the kitchen.

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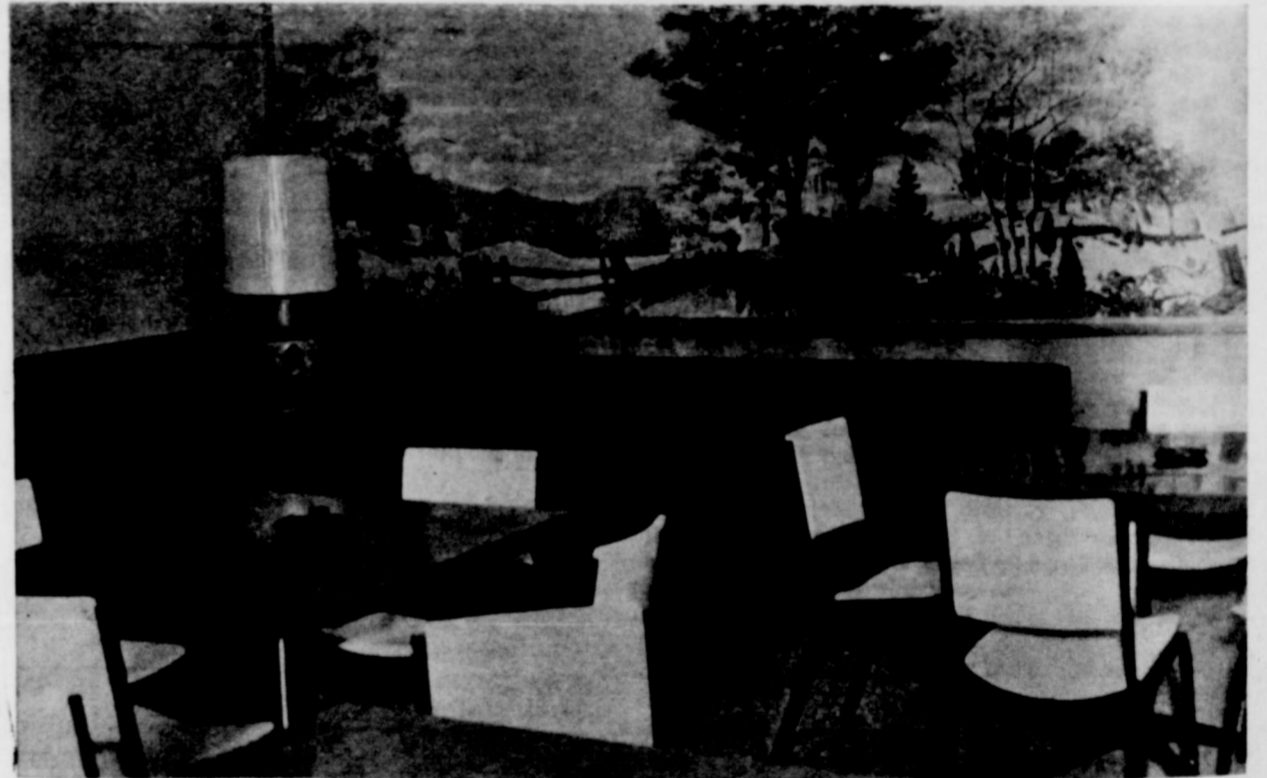

(From State Health Department) Mistletoe is fine when cast in its traditional Christmas role, but brewing a tea of mistletoe berries is not—repeat—is not—part of that role.

The National Clearinghouse for Poison Control Centers has a re-

cord of death following the drinking of mistletoe berry tea. It came ten hours after the victim drank the brew.

There are more than the usual hazards to life and health around the American home during the Christmas season, all capable of putting a damper on festivities.

Holly, for example, is widely used as a Christmas decoration. Its berries are reportedly toxic when eaten, producing violent nausea and central nervous system depression.

Christmas tree bubbling fluid is lethal in certain dosages. Cases have occurred where very young children have swallowed or inhaled the fluid.

Fireplace colors are made of metallic salts. When thrown into a blazing fire, they create multi-colored flames. Youngsters have been made severely ill after accidentally eating the salts.

It isn't the snow but the gas propellant which makes snow sprays dangerous. Pressurizing gases can be toxic when inhaled in sufficient doses.

Perhaps you've heard about how children can be amused with "dancing mothballs," made by putting mothballs in colored water with vinegar and sodium bicarbonate. They're billed as a harmless diversion for children, but they are not. Mothballs are poisonous in or out of soda water.
