

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WHEN ARE SINNERS PARDONED?

God's word points out the exact moment when men are pardoned. Sinners must not only make a decision to accept Christ (believe and repent), they must also confess their faith (Rom. 10:10, Acts 8:37) and be baptized (Mark 16:16) to be pardoned.

Imersion is the act of obedience (preceded by faith, repentance and confession) when sins are washed away (Acts 22:16). Thus, baptism is the line drawn between being lost and being saved. At baptism one is forgiven (Acts 2:38), he enters into Christ (Gal. 3:27), and from the water of baptism he is raised a new creature to live the new life (Rom. 6:3,4).

If one assumes he is pardoned upon making a decision then confession of faith and baptism are both non-essentials. However the New Testament teaches that confession and baptism are both essential to pardon. One cannot be pardoned the moment he makes a decision to accept Christ.

Believing one is saved on making a decision, then days or weeks later being baptized for some purpose other than to be saved has no scriptural foundation. Sinners are baptized to "wash away" their sins (Acts 22:16).


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
