If your family has not been contacted and asked to fill out the census report, please contact the School Office before January 31, 1961.

Children starting to school in September, 1961, are invited to come to school on Friday, January 20, for a "Round-Up Day." Parents are asked to report to the first grade rooms at 12:30 on that day to pick up the children and they will be given advice as to getting the children ready for school next September.

This year's First Graders will not come to school on January 20.

All parents that have birth certificates for next year's beginners should bring them along when you come to get the children at 12:30. If you do not have the certificate, begin now in order that it may be presented when the child enters next September.

A child must be six years of age before September 1, 1961, in order to enter school on that date. The

Silverton Boys Make Rare Find

Two Silverton boys, Mike Baird and Dean Butcher, have made a find which may have had an influence on world history. It is a 9'11" guillotine, and it appears to be in working order.

It was found last week seven miles south of Amarillo on McCormick Road when the boys were loading scrap iron and old lumber which had been purchased by Ware Fogerson for Fogerson Lumber and Supply in Silverton. According to the boys, it was lying in some high weeds with a lot of scrap iron against it.

Fogerson had purchased all the "junk" in one section of the lot on which the guillotine was found from a new-defunct amusement manufacturing company. Therein may lie a clue to the origin of the guillotine. It might have been used as a stage prop or for amusement purposes. Or, it could have been an original imported from somewhere and abandoned. The pegs holding it together tend to discount the possibility of its being a stage prop, due to the fact that props usually tend to be more temporarily constructed.

The guillotine is constructed of soft wood, possibly pine. It is nine feet, eleven inches high, with a platform six feet, three inches long and thirty inches wide. Two parallel posts support the 18-inch, oblique blade, which drops about eight feet. Four leather straps are attached to the platform, supposedly to discourage any protesting body from fleeing the course of justice.


CELENE LANHAM IS BETTY CROCKER HOMEMAKER OF TOMORROW

contraption are the blade and the metal "dee" rings holding the straps.

One of the straps secures the ankles, one the bend of the knees, another goes across the back and one secures the shoulders. It is put together with three-quarter inch wooden pegs. Not a single nail was used in its construction.

It can be described as the poor man's model of the guillotines used frequently during the French Revolution. The fancier models had stocks for the head, while this model has only a five inch wide, three inch deep indentation for the throat.

The guillotine is now located on the Baird yard here. It has caused quite a stir around town among folks who are wondering what its history is and from where it came.

It is possible that this guillotine was at one time stolen from a museum, and abandoned.

It is possible that it came from Louisiana, which was a French colony most of the time from its founding until 1803, when the United States bought the territory. It may have come to the Texas Panhandle by the northern route, as a Canadian model, relic of Canada's French past.

All these theories leave a wide gap between point of origin and arrival in a junk yard near Amarillo.

The guillotine was originally used in France before the period of the Revolution. First recorded executions by guillotine according to Encyclopedia Britannica, occurred during the late 16th century.

Prior to 1789, only criminals of noble birth were executed in this manner. At that time, one Guillotin (for whom the device was named) introduced legislation in the constituent assembly to adopt the guillotine for all executions. An interesting note is that "guillotine" is feminine in gender, Madame Guillotine.

Dr. Ima C. Barlow, professor of European History at West Texas State College in Canyon, had the guillotine described to her. She stated that it appears to be a typical French guillotine. However, she was astounded that one could have been found in the Texas Panhandle if it is an original.

The guillotine was used as late as the 19th century in some cases, she related. Once in a while a person would be condemned to be guillotined, just as criminals in the history of this area were sentenced to be hanged. In general, it was not used after 1799 except in isolated cases.
