The term "Mule up" is borrowed from Eight Seconds, the movie about the life of bull rider Lane Frost.
In the movie, Frost and others talk about the need to "cowboy up," meaning if you get bucked off the bull you get right back on.
That's the situation Muleshoe High School is in now. The Mules are 0-4 heading into Friday night's game against Seminole at Benny Douglass Stadium (8 p.m.) in their final pre-district tuneup
Added to their woes is the loss of four players to academic ineligibility.
"We have six more ball games," Muleshoe head coach Randy Adair said. "We've got

The transfer of the farm lending programs, which took place Oct. 1, was announced by Harold Bob Bennett, state executive director of the Texas

Consolidated Farm Service

Agency (formerly the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service; ASCS) and George Ellis, director of Rural Economic and Community Development (formerly Farmers Home Administration; FmHA)

The USDA is in the process of closing or consolidating nearly one-third of its 3,700 field offices nationwide and establishing 2,535 USDA service centers The us der ser-
anization in USDA history began last year when athe number of USDA agencies were reduced from 43 to 29 , and staff cuts of 13,000 were initiated. The reorganization is expected to save taxpayers over $\$ 4$ billion.
For more than 50 years, farmers who could not obtain credit from commercial lenders used the FmHA farmer program loans to purchase and perate farms, while the former ASCS administered farm pro- transfer of the farm lending programs, all farm programs will now be administered by one agency, the Consolidated Farm Service Agency

The Rural Economic and Community Development Agency will continue to administer all rural business development progrmas, rural telecommunication, electricity water and wastewater disposal
