4-H promotes global growth

It's National 4-H Week, and almost a half a million Texas youths are involved in the program.

Bailey County has two 4-H Clubs. The Muleshoe club usually enrolls about 85 youths during the month of September, while the Three Way club usually enrolls from 30 to 35, according to Bailey County Extension Secretary Pat Moore.

Dr. Nelson Jacob, 4-H youth development specialist, says the program offers "an educational process tied to practical experiences, which captures the minds of young people."

Members nationwide are assisted by more than 50 thousand volunteers. Members can choose from over 40 science, technology and life skills projects.

In the South Plains District there are more than 16 thousand members in 234 organized clubs. The Panhandle has almost 10 thousand members and 106 organized clubs.

Latest figures show that 4-H appeals to a wide range of

youth-preschool through 12th grade, rural and urban, plus all ethnic groups.

Young participants from various backgrounds have an opportunity to communicate with each other.

Jacob said more than 34 percent of 4-H members live in central cities; 18 percent in cities and suburbs; 13 percent in towns and cities, 17 percent in towns like Muleshoe, with populations under 10,000; and 18 percent on farms and in rural areas.

Older members and teen leaders are able to teach younger members, as families work together "to make the best better."

Jacobs records show that children eight and younger make up 31 percent of the membership; 48 percent are between the ages of nine and 11; 11 percent are 12 or 13; and 10 percent are 14 and older, according to Jacob.

Dr. Lynne Thibodeaux, assistant director of the 4-H and youth development program, said the organization gives young people opportunities to

During Monday morning's rain and lightning storm, the Southwestern Public Service substation recorded 17 "good hits" between 3 and 6:30 a.m. from 16th Street west, according to Mike McDearmon of SPS.

He said lightning strikes power lines because "it seeks the tallest point." But someone is on call 24 hours per day, he said, in case an outage occurs.

Mike Roberts was on call for Bailey County Electric Coop Monday morning while four circuit trips were caused by lightning around 5:55 a.m.

He also found two bad insulators. The power outage in town affected him because the lights went out while he was trying to call for assistance.

Vicky Gonzales, manager at the Pizza Hut said she was late for work Monday because her clocks were wrong due to the early morning outage.

Richard Murphy, administrator at Muleshoe Area Hospital, said the hospital is not affected by power outages for more than 5 seconds, because of backup systems which kick in.

Although the electricity went out at Murphy's home, he was not late for work because he noticed the VCR was blinking at him and knew he needed to


