ADDITIONAL FUNDS AVAILABLE FARM HOUSING LOANS

\$50 million has | ers Home Administration for farm An additional housing loans, Mr. Ralph E. Grifbeen made available to the Farm- fitts, the agency's county supervis-

or announced today. He said that the new loan funds assure an adequate supply of this type of credit for eligible farm families during the balance of the fiscal year. Loans made so far this year plus those being processed had practically exhausted the funds previously available.

Farm housing loans are made throughout the rural areas of the United States. The loans provide farm families with an opportunity to acquire an adequate house and efficient service buildings.

Applications for farm housing loans may be made at the local office of the Farmers Home Administration, Mr. Griffitts said. The loans bear 4 percent interest and are repayable over periods up to 3 3years.

The major demand in Briscoe County is for loans to construct and modernize farm houses, and most of the funds are for new construction.

Improvements financed with the loans include the installation of central heating, and pressure water supply systems, the addition of bathroms and the modernization of kitchens.





"DOWN INTO"

The challenge is out to any man who can take a candidate for baptism down into a container of water smaller than man himself and baptize him as Philip baptized the eunuch. "And they went down into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he baptized him" (Acts 8:38). Why did both Philip and eunuch go "down into the water?" Because Philip administered the same form of batism to the eunuch that the Romans and the Colossians submitted to (Romans 6:3-4; Col. 2:12).

The Son of God was baptized of John in the river Jordan. Both Jesus and John went down into the water, for the text says -"And Jesus, when he was baptized, went up straightway out of the water" (Matt. 3:16; Mark 1:10). He could not have gone "up straightway out of the water" without having first gone down into it.

We can see that to administer water that there must be enough water to go down into, and enough for a complete burial of the candidate. "And John also was baptizing in Aenon near to Salim, because there was much water there (John 3;23). All Bible scholars will admit that the word baptize means to immerse. In translating the Bible into English from the original Greek. the word "Baptiza" was given the English from "baptize" with no effort made at translation.

Theyer's Greek Lexicon is the best known in existance. He defines "baptizo" thus: "A word peculiar to the New Testament and ecclesiastical writings, immersion, submersion. Of Christian baptism; this according to the view of the apostles, is a rite of sacred immersion, commanded by Christ." Another lexicon by Liddell and Scott defines the Greek word "Baptizo" in the English Text as "to dip in or under water." This goes along with what the apostles said in Rom. 6:3-4 and Col. 2:12 as being a burial. Is there a question in any man's mind as to the meaning of burial?

Under the present law, the coopmy power to further its passage. eratives may provide electricity to an area, thereby contributing to the development of that area, prior to the area's annexation. With their poles and lines established, REA is now unable to service a structure that is built directly within the area annexed after annexation. The gist of this Bill is as follows: In annexed areas the rural electrical cooperatives would be able to service not only those houses of customers that they were servicing prior to annexation, but also any new customers with-in "the area" that they served prior to annexation

Opposition to this measure argues that the term "area" is nebulous and needs definition in order to make the bill workable. While I would support the bill with a definition of "area" included, it seems wise to me to leave the detmination of the meaning of word to the discretion of the cities. The Bill provides that in any event, the cities may or may not grant a franchise to the cooperatives and it seems consistent with this language to allow the cities to decide what "area" they prefer that the REA coperatives be allowed to serve. In my opinion this Bill is a very reasonable request by the REA cooperatives. I do not feel that it places the coperatives in an advantageous competitive position with


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


