A presidential message has been sent to Congress requesting feed grain legislation for 1961. In order to be prepared for the program in the event it goes into effect, it is necessary to make an immediate survey of feed grain producing farms in order to carry out a 1961 feed program.

A feed grain acreage report will be required for each feed grain farm in Briscoe County by March 16, 1961. On this report we must secure the corn and grain sorghum history acreage, and other farm data required in the establishment of farm feed grain base acreages n which such grains were produced in 1959 and 1960. In order to acount for all cropland on the farm, the acreage devoted to other crops and uses will also be obtained. We have data available for cotton and report for the farm, it will be necessary that the producer report the land use of all other cropland on the farm the date of the sign up.

The acreage may be reported from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the following dates and places for producers in Briscoe County.




