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


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


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#### A Date With Darla



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

Of the FBI finger-printed arrests on file in Washington, 47.21 per cent were caused by liquor, according to the FBI Uniform Crime Reports. "In 80 percent of the cases coming through my court, liqour is involved in the crime. In nine times out of ten, alcohol is involved in a person getting into trouble the second time." (Judge Stanley N. Barnes, Criminal Court, Los Angeles County, California).

'Practically 90 per cent of the cases that come through the court, are as a result of drinking." (Phillip L. Griffin, chief probation officer of the Municipal Court of Minneapolis, Minn. Listen, October - December, 1948, p. 34).

"ALCHOL PLUS GASOLINE EQUALS BLOOD"

The National Safety Council states that between 50 and 60 per cent of all deaths and injuries on the highway are caused by drinking. A person does not have to be completely overcome by alcohol to be a villian on the highway; only a small amount of alcohol can seriously impair one's driving ability: "For years the National Safety Council, traffic officers, and those alert to the drinking situation have known and proclaimed it is not the drunk but the drinker who menaces the highway" (Emma Kidd Hulburt. 
