Frequently this excuse for inactivity is stated:

"Why, I know some of those eachers up there. They don't know as much as I do and believe me, they're being paid too MUCH!" In a few cases, we may agree.

This isexactly the reason why we should be promoting a pay raise. To that large group of competant and capable teachers we should certainly grant more pay and more prestige

And to the other group, small, but still present, we sincerely plead eliminate them.
