Some varieties produce poor quality wheat under most conditions. Others may produce good wheat under favorable conditions, but the grain is not satisfactory for bakery-flour when grown under unfavorable conditions. Still others produce wheat which makes desirable flour under most conditions. The Texas Agriculture Experiment Station recommends Tascosa, Concho, Crockett, Bison and Westar for the High Plains area. THE BIBLE AND SCIENCE

A great deal has been said in recent years on this Some have been ready to cast the Bible aside because they heard that it disagrees with scientific truths. But there has been no disagreement found between the teachings of the Bible and real science.

Two points stand out in a discussion of the Bible and science. The Bible contains no scientific errors. Ot first thought this may not appear to be strong evidence for the inspiration of the Bible, but when we remember the errors that prevailed in the days when the Bible was being written we must acknowledge that the omission of all of those errors from that book is nothing short of miraculous. I believe the Bible because of what it does not contain! If the writers were not inspired, how did it happen that the glaring and foolish ideas that were so prevalent in their day did not find their way into their writings in even a single instance. The idea that has been advanced by some critics that the Bible writers recorded the wisdom of their day is refuted by this point.

The Bible writers also recorded scientific truths which had not then been discovered by the human mind. The round earth, the law of gravity, and the empty place in the north, are instances of such (Isa. 40:22; Job 26:7).

We are again forced to the conclusion stated in I Peter 1:21. These men could not have known these thing unaided by divine inspiration! They were moved by the Holy Spirit! Some may have feared a study of the Bible in the light of science. But the Bible has nothing to fear. It emerges from such a crucible more precious to us than before.

These and other reasons have combined to make the Bible the world's best-loved book and the best seller. Men have died for it. But it has also ben violently hated and its enemies have predicted its annihilation. But # is indestructible. It has survived the attack of fire sword and all other forces that have pitted their powers against it. And it does not become obsolete. It never needs a supplement. It is a full-grown book, designed for all men of all times. This is another strong proof of its supernatural origin. It is always new and modern. Though heaven and earth pass, God's word will stand! 
