# Vote In Referendum Today

Briscoe County wheat farmers join with other producers throughout the nation today (August 24) to decide if marketing quotas will be in effect on their 1962 wheat crop.

The wheat stabilization program is authorized contingent upon the expressed voice of wheat producers. It will be available to all commercial wheat areas only if two-thirds of the eligible producers voting in the referendum vote "yes."

The overall objectives of the wheat program being very similar to the grain sorghum program are: (1) Increase farm income; (2) Reduce buildup of supplies; and (3) Reduce government storage costs.

If marketing quotas are approved for the 1962 wheat crop by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum, the following program will go into effect:

1. Price support at a national average of \$2.00 per bushel will

be available on the 1962 wheat crop to those producers who comply on their 1962 farm wheat allotments, and who participate in the special wheat stabilization program for 1962 to the extent prescribed by the secretary.

2. There will be a mandatory reduction of acreage by 10 per cent.

3. Payments will be made for diverting wheat acreage and for diverting it to a conservation use.

4. Additional voluntary reduction of 30 per cent may be made or a total reduction of 40 per cent.

5. Farms subject to marketing quotas for 1962 will be those on which the acreage of wheat exceeds the smaller of (a) 13.5 acres or (b) the highest acreage planted to wheat on the farm for harvest in any of the calendar years 1959, 1960, and 1961.

If more than one-third of the growers voting in the referendum oppose marketing quotas for the 1962 wheat crop:

(1) Price support at only one-half of the parity price will be available only to those farmers who

comply with their 1962 farm July 1961 parity price of a bushel of wheat was \$1.18.

(2) There will be no wheat stabilization program providing payments for diverting acreage to conservation uses in 1962.

(3) Lower acreage allotments will remain in effect for the 1962 crop as a condition of eligibility for wheat price support.

If growers approve marketing quotas for the 1962 wheat crop a special wheat stabilization program will be in effect for 1962.

The wheat stabilization program provided for 1962 briefly has these characteristics:

(1) A mandatory acreage retirement of 10 per cent

(2) Additional voluntary acreage retirement of 30 per cent or a total of 40 per cent may be made.

(3) Payments for diverted acreage may be made in cash or in wheat equal to 45 percent of the basic county support rate for the

10 percent diversion. Then a payment of 60 percent of the basic county support rate will be made for the other 30 percent.

(4) Diverted acreage may be planted to castorbeans, guar, safflower, sunflower or sesame in lieu of cash payment.

All farmers who have produced more than 13.5 acres of wheat in at least one of the last three years are eligible to vote.

Ballots will be cast at local polling places throughout the 30-State commercial wheat area.

Locations of polling places in Briscoe County are as follows: Com. A, C, E—Silverton Community, Courthouse in Silverton. Com. B, D—Quitaque Community, City Hall in Quitaque.

Com. E—San Jacinto Community, Home of Woodrow Bice.

Com. F—Antelope Flat Community, Home of G. W. Salmon

All eligible voters are urged to vote in this referendum. Wives are eligible to vote.

**Witnesses Attend Six-Day Assembly**

Local delegates to a 40-state gathering of Jehovah's Witnesses in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, are back home with instructions to step up their house-to-house teaching in this vicinity.

V. D. Tiffin, presiding minister for the Quitaque Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, said 10 delegates from this area were present at the six-day convention which ended last Sunday. Unity of worship as the key to survival was the assembly's theme, he said.

Principle speaker for the gathering was Nathan H. Knorr, who climaxed the sessions with a public address entitled "When all Nations Unite Under God's Kingdom." According to Tiffin, Knorr told a peak crowd of 12,744 that world unity will be attained only under God's kingdom.

"Mr. Knorr pointed out that the nations are hopelessly divided and that the United Nations organization is doomed to failure," Tiffin said "the nations have rejected God's kingdom at a time when, according to Bible prophecy, they must be ruled or ruined by God's kingdom. Mr. Knorr told us the time is near when the nations will be ruined."

The speaker declared that even though Jehovah's Witnesses are now active in 181 islands and lands they have united in the worship of the one God, Jehovah. He reasoned that the preaching of "the good news of the kingdom" by Jehovah's Witnesses is vital to helping others attain unity of worship, Tiffin said.

Other lectures, reports and practical demonstrations during the convention were designed to teach the Witnesses better ways of conducting their house-to-house ministry.

The assembly, held at the Oklahoma State Fairgrounds, was one of a series of 13 sponsored by the Watchtower Society this summer throughout the United States, Canada, and Europe. A mass baptism of 299 newly ordained Witnesses was a convention highlight in Oklahoma.

"As a result of this assembly we here in Silverton are better equipped to fulfill our scriptural commission to help others learn the Bible's answer to world problems," Tiffin concluded.

Considerable effort has been made by some religious people in the interest of UNITY. This is a laudable project, especially in the face of the prayer that Jesus prayed (Jn 17, "that we all might be one . . . that the world may BELIEVE that Thou didst send Me." It is no secret that the greatest cause of unbelief in the world today stems from the fact that Christianity is DIVIDED. In 1936 there were more than 250 major religious bodies in the U.S.A., each teaching a different doctrine; each claiming to be the teach the doctrine that Jesus brought—and all know that He only brought ONE DOCTRINE.

Nothing could be so fine as to see the unity of all who profess Christianity. Some of this effort toward unifying, however, seems doomed for failure. The REAL CAUSE of our religious trouble isn't our divisions; our division is the RESULT of the cause—a SYMPTOM, as fever is a symptom of something else in the human body that is impeding normal body functions, and until the REAL CAUSE can be eliminated, one may expect this symptom to continue. And should the symptom be treated, there isn't any reason to think the basic cause would be at all affected. In the same way, federations, alliances, mergers, etc., are only treating the symptom; the REAL TROUBLE, the cause of the division in the first place, hasn't been touched. There must be something more sound and concrete on which to base our unity than the compromise of our convictions.

Paul said (1 Cor 1:10) "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, that you all speak the SAME THING, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the SAME MIND and in the SAME JUDGEMENT." In Phil 2:2 he said, "Fulfill ye my joy that ye be LIKENMINDED, having the SAME LOVE being of ONE ACCORD, OF ONE MIND." Paul, inspired preacher of our Lord, commanded that we be ALIKE—even THINKING the SAME WAY. When people (Christians) don't think the same way, something is wrong—not with God, but with man. This isn't to say WHO is wrong, or HOW MUCH, or what it will COST to be wrong.

We need to consider that man is fallible and makes mistakes. The only thing we have today that is infallible, is God's word—the Bible. Only when we are willing to let God's word be our rule of faith—our guide in matters—can we know we are doing His will. We don't relieve our obligation to God when we say to our selves, I know I don't worship exactly as the Bible indicates, but no-one else does either." Our obligation is to do the BEST WE CAN, regardless of the failure of others. Possibly the greatest test of our faith lies in our efforts to free ourselves from selfish human thinking so that we may come to a knowledge of the truth, in order to enshrine God in our hearts. Failure of thousands of others to do so in no way relieves us of our own personal responsibility in this matter, nor does it change our obligation.

One thing we know, yet must admit: "Jesus brought ONE TEACHING, and that teaching is designed to lead one from this earth to heaven." All Jesus' teachings, miracles, parables, and conversations agree that He brought but ONE TEACHING. He didn't tell some to do one thing, and then contradict Himself when directing others. His teaching (gospel) is the ONE medium to save the souls of men (Rom. 1:16). It is God's power to save.

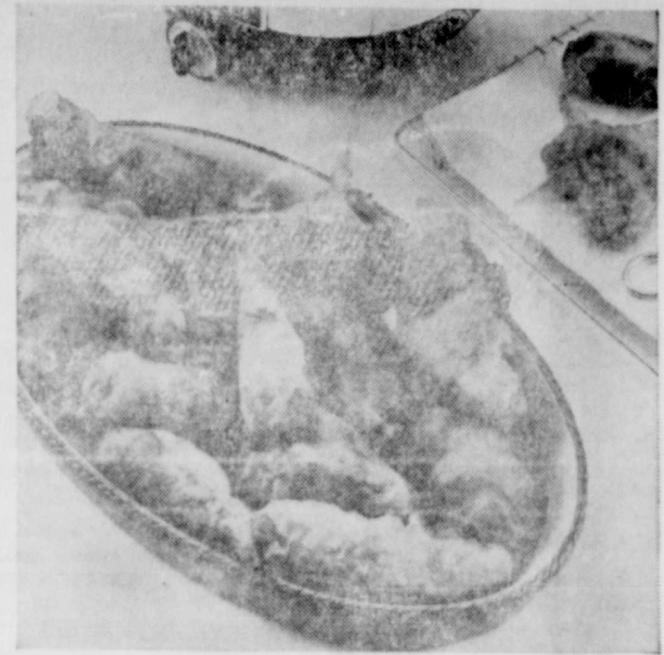

Whether you are planning a meal at home or a picnic to pack and carry, fried chicken should be high on your list this summer. The Eastern Shore of the USA is known for its food, the beauty, and in recent years as a thriving center of the poultry industry. We borrowed from Maryland their method of dipping chicken in a smooth creamy batter and then frying to a golden hue in corn oil. It's very little trouble; prepare the chickens, sprinkle with salt, let stand a few minutes, dust with flour, then into a creamy dipping batter; drain and fry. Serve hot or cold.

**Maryland Fried Chicken**  
2 broiler-fryer chickens, cut in serving pieces  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 recipe Dipping Batter  
Flour, for dusting  
Mazola corn oil, for frying  
Wash and dry chicken. Sprinkle with salt. Dust entire surface of chicken lightly but evenly with flour. With tongs, dip in batter; drain.  
Meanwhile prepare corn oil for frying. To deep fry, use a sturdy, flat bottomed kettle of adequate size, or an automatic electric deep fryer. Fill the kettle one-third full of corn oil, or follow manufacturer's directions for fryer. Heat corn oil to 375° F. Fry chicken pieces in hot corn oil 15 to 30 minutes, turning until all sides are a rich golden brown. Put in meatier pieces first and the liver and gizzard last few minutes.
