> "One of the fairly common injuries in the spring, or in the warm weather breaks like we've had lately, is dogbites in children, and a word about the proper treatment in such cases seems appropriate,' says Dr. R. N. Muckleroy.

> "Treatment of the injury is simple; take the child to your physician. Proper handling of the dog is very important also, and the first rule to remember is DON'T KILL THE DOG IMMEDIATELY.

> "The dog should be penned and observed for a period of at least 10 days. If he is well at the end of that period he did not have transmissible rabies at the time of the bite and anti-rabies vaccine is not needed.

"If the dog dies, his head should be sent to the State Health Department in Austin, where rabies or the absence of it, may be diagnosed. Early in the course of the disease the diagnosis may be difficult," he added.
