Beef is something most everyone has regularly in his diet, therefore, later make their homes in agricultural communities such as ours, and any knowledge they have concerning livestock will be beneficial regardless of their occupation.

Most of our club calves cost about \$150.00, and usually weigh approximately 225 pounds. The calf should be fed 300 days to be fat enough to stay in a major show. If the member feeds and cares for his calf properly he can expect 675 pounds of gain from 4800 pounds of feed at a cost of \$132.00. Other expenses such as combs, brushes, soap, buckets and halters will amount to at least \$18. This makes a total outlay of \$300.

After the calf has been fed for 300 days, and has been well trained, brushed regularly, washed clean and properly groomed, he should be able to make the sale in an area show. 




