

# Hail Storms Continue To Plague Briscoe Farmers

Marble-sized hailstones driven by high winds from the west and northwest harvested crops for many Briscoe County farmers on Monday afternoon of this week at about 4:30 o'clock. The small hailstones covered the ground and drifted into banks in many places. Several hundred acres of wheat received 100 percent damage, in addition to the more than one thousand acres which were lost in a similar storm only 17 days earlier.

Many of the farmers who received 100 percent damage Monday were the same ones who had lost their wheat and young cotton on May 19; they had replanted and just had gotten a stand, only to see the weather give a repeat performance and completely wipe out their second new crop of the season. Some of them lost their third plantings.

In several cases farmers had purchased crop hail insurance and lacked only a day or so being eligible for benefits. The rainfall received in Silverton over the past week has been .41 Thursday; .46 Friday; .15 Saturday; .37 Monday and a trace on Tuesday, as measured by the official gauge kept by Grady Martin. Measurements have ranged upward of these in the rural areas, and many have received two inches or more. Quitaque and the area south of Quitaque received a heavy rain

Monday afternoon. Some of the individual reports indicate that just about all the ones who were hurt so badly in the May storm were also the ones who suffered Monday. Oscar Weeks lost 150 acres of cotton and 200 acres of wheat. In the first storm he had crops hailed out on another place he farms, and the one Monday took the crops on the place on which he lives.

Joe Brooks farms two places, one west of Silverton and the other east of Silverton below the caprock. In the May storm he lost the cotton on the place near Quitaque because it was washed out and at the same time he was hailed out on the other farm. Last Saturday the Quitaque place was hailed out and Monday afternoon the crops on the other place were lost.

John Turner had 100 percent damage on 70 acres of cotton and 40 acres of wheat. Claude Allison lost 250 acres of wheat. Also receiving damage were Jack Harris, Don Garrison, Elton Cantwell, L. D. Griffin, Bailey Hill, and many others.

Reports from the local grain elevators indicate that the number of bushels being harvested per acre is much less than has been produced in the past several years. Dryland wheat is yielding about 10 bushels to the acre, with the irrigated wheat yielding about 25 bushels to the acre. Harvest Queen Grain has handled about 500,000 pounds of grain so far this season, and Silverton Co-Op has handled almost 700,000 pounds. Most of the wheat is ready, but daily showers have idled combine crews. More severe weather is not predicted this week, for which farmers look forward with new hope.

## Yarborough Carries Briscoe by two Votes

Don Yarborough, candidate for the Governorship of Texas, led in the light voting in Briscoe County last Saturday with a two vote margin over John Connally. Connally, who carried over the state, received 283 votes as compared to

285 polled by Yarborough. In the Lieutenant Governor's race, Smith polled 449 votes and Turman took 11.

Waggoner Carr received 439 Briscoe votes while Reavley garnered only 121, in the race for Attorney General.

Woodrow Wilson Bean carried Briscoe County with 280 votes as compared to 250 for Pool in the Congressman-at-Large contest. Briscoe County followed the trend set over the state in all races except that for governor. Connally led Yarborough 281 to 261 until the San Jacinto box reported Saturday evening. San Jacinto gave a heavy margin to Yarborough to give him the lead in the county.

## Contract Let for Highway Construction

A contract for 13 miles of construction on FM Roads 145 and 2733 in Briscoe County has been awarded to an Amarillo firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Ivan Dement, Inc. submitted the low bid of \$190,668 on the project. Grading, structures, base and surfacing from FM Road 378, 5.0 miles south of SH 86, east to FM Road 2464 and from SH 86, 2.5 miles west of Hall County line, south to FM Road 599 is expected to take 120 working days, according to Palmer Massey, District Engineer at Childress.

O. V. Johnson, Resident Engineer at Quitaque, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

## State Director Emphasizes Success Of Loan Program

L. J. Cappleman, State Director of Farmers Home Administration, recently stated, "The Rural Housing Loan Program was started in Texas some twelve years ago and the records show the success of the program. Up to December 31, 1961, some 2,730 loans have been made and not one penny has been lost or written off as uncollectible." More than \$20,440,000 has been advanced in Texas in Rural Housing Loans and the principal and interest payments made total over \$6,845,000. Over 24 per cent of these loans have been paid in full. Payments of principal and interest on the 2,064 loans outstanding total over \$4,561,000, or 104 per cent of the amount that has become due," Cappleman said. "This is a remarkable tribute to the financial integrity of rural

families and their ability to manage their financial affairs," the State Director said. "Loans under this program are made only to those who cannot obtain financing from conventional sources. As a result, the 2,730 Texas families who obtained these loans have had to be extra diligent in meeting their repayment obligations."

"This repayment record of rural housing loan borrowers is also a tribute to the judgment of the 654 Texas FHA County Committees who assisted in evaluating the soundness of these loans, Cappleman said.

"This program provides benefits throughout the entire rural based small town economy and the overall economy of these counties," he added. "Contractors, small businessmen supplying contractors,

and building trades workers all benefit through increased business. Their stepped-up activity in turn stimulates the entire rural economy. The approximate \$4,800,000 the Farmers Home Administration in Texas will make available this year is the equivalent of several new industries in terms of more jobs and greater purchasing power."

A survey made in an Alabama County showed that the \$281,906 loaned to 28 borrowers under the Rural Housing Program in 1961 provided 37,324 hours of work to local labor, and \$195,270 for the purchase of electric supplies, bathroom supplies, and other building materials. Of this amount, \$81,620 was spent for materials produced or manufactured in the county, such as lumber and cement blocks.

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




