Screwworm Program Underway In County

The Screwworm Eradication program is well underway. Efforts during the months ahead will be directed toward further reducing the screwworm population in order to take full advantage of next winter's cold weather. To this end the principal tools of the eradication program will be brought into fullest use.

- These include:
1. Screwworm Detection and Reporting . . . use of systems designed to provide extensive daily information about the incidence and abundance of screwworms. If you have any screwworm cases, I have in my office containers in which the worms can be sent to the foundation for positive identification. This is very important so the sterile flies can be released in an area where an outbreak has occurred.
 2. Sterile fly release.
 3. Control of animal movements and related animal inspection and treatment to prevent introduction and spread of worms.
 4. Encouragement of intensive use on the part of livestock owners of measures for prevention and treatment of worm cases; periodic preventive spraying of livestock.

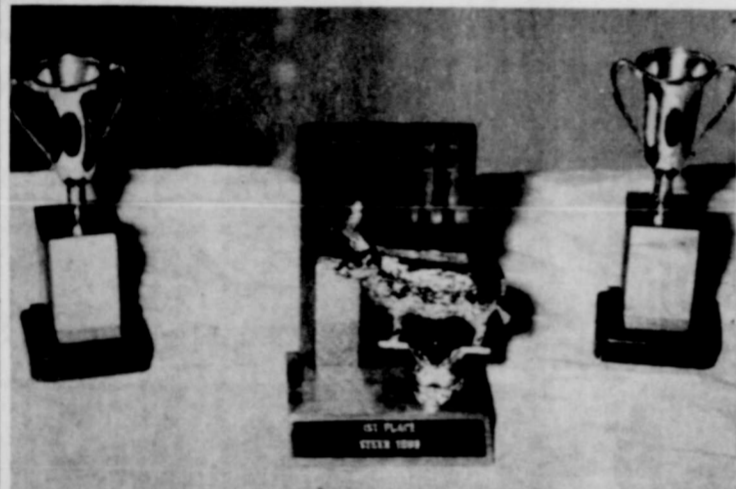
The estimated cost of the three-year eradication program is \$12 million. As of this date the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation has raised \$1,700,000 of its \$3 million goal for support of the program. This has been raised through gifts from stock owners to the foundation at a rate of 50¢ per mature cow or whatever the producer is willing to give. If you would like to contribute to the program, you can see me or deposit your gift in the First State Bank of Silverton, in the Briscoe County Screwworm Fund.

Talking to a number of livestock owners in the county has caused me to think that the worm cases are fewer this year than in the last few years.

I have received information from Cecil Lewis, Floyd County Agent, that sterile flies were released in Floyd County two weeks ago.

Throughout the county the fly population has increased greatly since the rains. House, stable and horn flies cannot be controlled by spray alone. A good spraying program, using recommended spraying and destroying breeding areas, will decrease numbers.

All flies lay eggs in moist manure where larvae hatch and live until going into the adult stage. Good drying on lots of breeding areas will kill eggs and larvae. Sometimes this is not possible, and then lots can be treated with a mixture of equal parts of calcium cyanamid and superphosphate. Apply this mix over the ground in a thin sleet similar to applying fertilizer to lawns. This will kill the fly eggs and larvae.

She expects to be in Turkey in September for a visit with her parents before her departure for mission work in Bolivia.

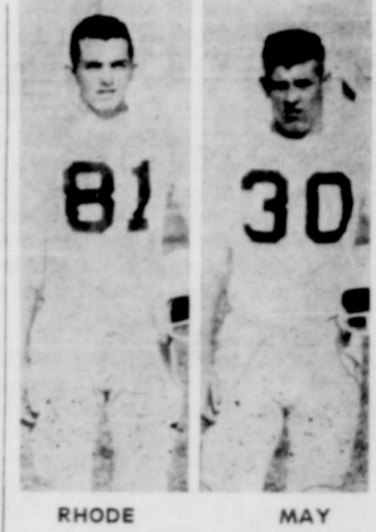

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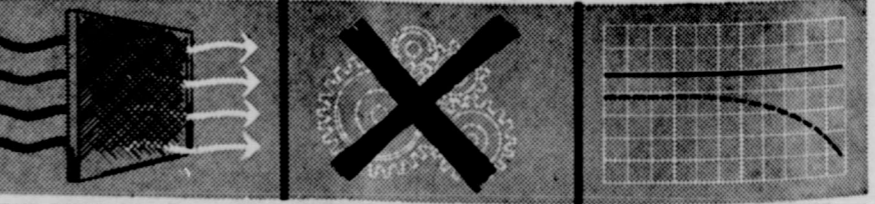

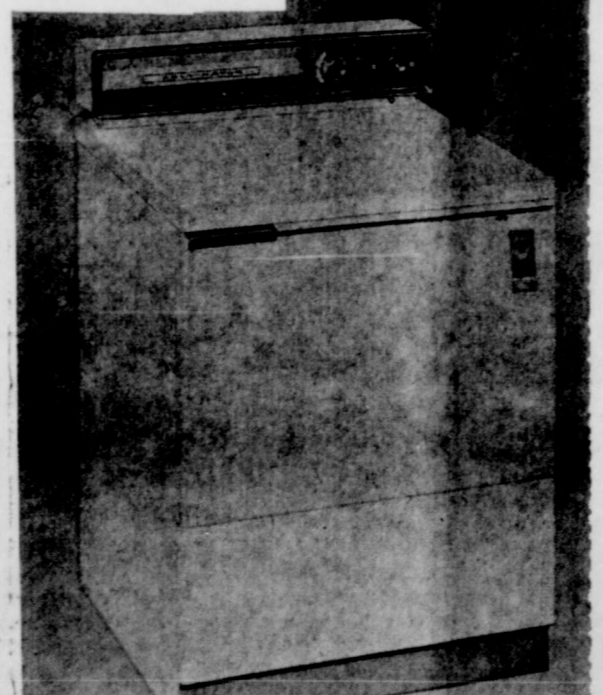
