



HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 70 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section authorizing the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Berasoria County, one to include all or part of the West Columbia. Avocados for Elegant Eating

Potato salad, all-American favorite, goes elegant in "Sumptu-ous Salad." Cubed potatoes, diced red apple, luscious avocado halves and sour cream dressing make hearty, "he-man" eating.

Avocados are usually very firm when they come to market. Because they can be used so many ways, it's wise to buy several at a time and keep at room temperature until eating-ripe. Smooth-skinned varieties of California avocados are ready to eat when they yield to gentle pressure in the palms of your hands. To test dark, pebbly-skinned varieties, insert toothpick at stem end; if it slides in easily, the avocado's ready to serve. Cut length-wise completely around, twist halves apart gently, whack seed sharply with knife blade, twist and lift out, then strip off skin.




