## Wheat Quota Vote August 30

Wheat farmers will vote in a referendum August 30 this year to decide whether marketing quotas will apply for the 1963 crop. The Secretary of Agriculture has proclaimed quotas and set the referendum date in accordance with the present law, which requires such action whenever wheat supplies are more than 20 percent in excess of "normal." The supply for 1962-63 is estimated to be 66.5 percent more than normal—2.4 billion bushels.
