

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize the Legislature to provide for trial de novo on all appeals to the courts from actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions.


BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That the Constitution of

ministrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions, under such provisions and limitations as the Legislature shall deem necessary and desirable; and the courts of Texas shall have no power or authority to refuse, deny, or change the manner of such appeals, if brought in the manner provided by general law, even though such appeals shall be provided de novo as that term is used in appeals from Justice of the Peace Courts to County Courts; and should the Legislature provide for such appeals to be tried completely de novo and independent of any administrative or executive action, ruiling or decision thereon, the courts shall comply with such general law and shall hear and determine such appeals in the manner and under the





Secrets of the newspaper reader have been laid bare in an haustive research project recently sponsored by the Newsprint Information Committee with the cooperation of the Bureau of Advertising, American Newspaper Publishers Association. Five thousand interviews were conducted with randomly-chosen citizens at 622 sampling points throughout the nation. Evidence was gathered which advertisers are

Crops — Like Cars — Need The Right Kind of Fuel

When your car fails - you can't always blame the weather. Chances are, it's either something wrong under the hood, or you've run out of gas.

Similarly, when farm production drops, or the products aren't up to par, or the plants appear to be diseased, very often the cause is under the soil or due to a shortage of some vital nutrients. some vital nutrients.

In recent years, more and more problems have been traced by research agronomists to deficiencies of magnesium. But symptoms of the deficiencies have for years been blamed on

DISEASE OR DEFICIENCY? "Sand drown" is a good example. This "disease" of tobacco plants was commonly as-sociated with acid sandy soils, but in 1922, scientists estab-lished the fact that the problem was actually due to a magnesium deficiency.

Potatoes are another example, where a number of maladies have been traced to magnesium deficiencies. Both firmness and texture of potatoes are affected by the amounts of magnesium available to the growing plants.

One important function of magnesium that has been illustrated in potatoes and other vegetables is that it makes phosphorous more readily available to the plant, says Dr. J.
C. Engibous, manager of agricultural services for International Minerals & Chemical

MORE PEAS PER POD Researchers at the University of Wisconsin found that magnesium was the only nu-trient element that tended to influence the number of peas in a pod. They followed this with the explanation that in-creased phosphorous uptake was probably responsible for the increased yield, and that the magnesium made the phosphorous more readily available to

Among them is the Soil Science Department at Michigan State University, which has added a magnesium test to its standard soil analysis program. This laboratory tests more than 75,000 samples

Apples, citrus, corn, alfalfa, wheat and grapes and legumes such as soybeans have been benefitted by increasing the



supply of magnesium in experi-mental cultures and later in commercial orchards, gardens and on farms.

In many areas, dolomitic limestone is used to sweeten the soils, but in this material, magnesium is in an insoluble form, and often takes a long time to get to the plant.

A more immediately available form—that can be applied di-rectly or in a mixed fertilizer is sulfate of potash magnesia

Magnesium compares to the oil or gasoline in automobiles because it is the central atom of chlorophyll—the green material that enables plants to grow.

Most important aspect of sul-

fate of potash magnesia is the fact that it offers an immediate cure for deficiencies, much as a quick trip to the repair shop or another gallon of gas-oline will for a car.

American farmers, individually and collectively, hold the balance of power in this nation's current all-out effort to eradicate hog cholera, a disease causing an es-

timated \$50 million loss annually. The starting place, and the great need now, is vaccination. The immediate goal is to have at least 75 per cent of the herds in each area vaccinated against the disease. This will help build solid walls of protection and help prevent fresh outbreaks of hog cholera from spreading to disas-



Cholera is causing heavy losses again. The only safe pig is the one that's vaccinated in advance.

The present all-out effort to eradicate cholera is being sponsored by government agencies, livestock groups, veterinary groups and affiliated organizations and was sparked by a new wave of this fast-killing disease. Not enough herds have been vac-cinated in recent years, and cholera has now been making a strong comeback. Since there is no cure for this disease, the only safe hog is one that has been immunized in advance of an outbreak.

Proper vaccination is the key to solid immunity. Vaccination should be done by a veterinarian, after he has checked the herd and made sure the animals are in proper condition to develop im-munity, and after he has chosen the right type of vaccine to fit the circumstances and local condi-

Farmers should be familiar with the symptoms of hog cholera, so if suspicious signs appear an immediate diagnosis can be obtained and perhaps an area-wide outbreak prevented.

Among the recommended steps in the present drive against the nation's No. 1 hog killer are: 1. Have all pigs vaccinated. 2. Don't bring in replacement pigs that have not been vaccinated

3. Isolate replacement pigs for 10 to 30 days. 4. Avoid all contact with cholera-infected herds and keep visitors out of hog lots. 5. Do not feed raw garbage or buy re-placement stock from garbage fed herds. 6. If signs of hog cholera appear; call a veterinarian at once.

A dairy cow is a highly complex production unit which, unfortu-nately, breaks down occasionally. Many of the problems causing cows to break down can be traced to the constant efforts to boost production. Among the most important problems of these valuable, high-producing animals are milk fever, ketosis and mastitis.



Cows stricken by milk fever can be saved if treated promptly

Milk fever, which often occurs 12 to 72 hours after calving, causes the heaviest death losses. staggering and weaving. Later, the cow becomes prostrate with head and neck drawn sharply to one side. If a veterinarian can get to the stricken cow promptly, he can often save her. But time is an important element and the veterinarian should be called immediately if signs of milk fever

Ketosis results when there is not a proper nutritive intake or utilization. When this occurs, the cow's body begins to tear itself down by converting fat into sugar and leaving "ketones" free to circulate in the cow's system.

Symptoms of this disease include loss of appetite, decrease in milk production, excitement, staggering, swaying, biting or drooling. Ketosis also can be treated and the animal often saved if the veterinarian is called in soon enough

Mastitis is the most costly of all diseases of dairy cows. It can be caused by several different types of infective organisms which get into the delicate udder. To treat the disease successfully one must know which type of organism is causing the problem, and the source and measures for invasion. That takes careful diagnosis and then specialized treat-ment, plus close follow-up.

Mastitis is no disease to be "tinkered" with, and the farmer should be on guard against sureshot, easy treatments. It takes long, careful, thorough work to clean mastitis out of a herd. But the rewards in profits can be large, once the disease has been whipped.




