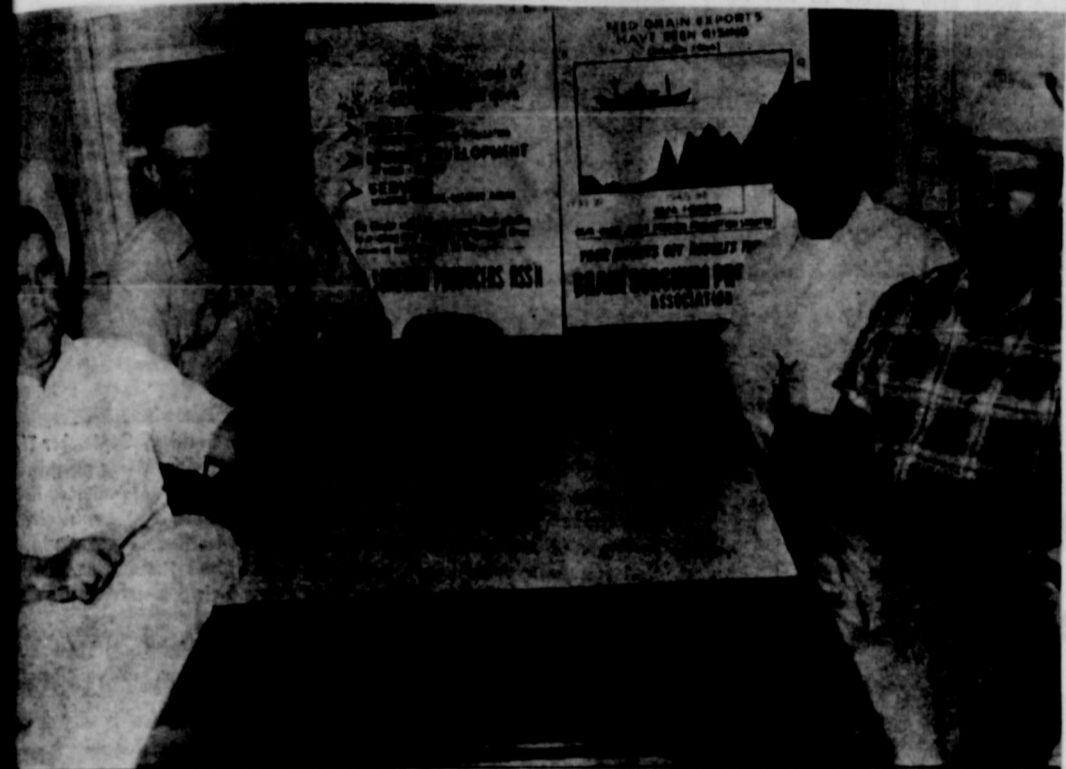


## Harley Redin Will Be H'Coming Speaker

## Grain Sorghum Producers Association Organized Here



In a meeting on Tuesday evening, September 4, in the District Courtroom in Silverton, a Grain Sorghum Producers Association was organized and officers were elected.

Elected to serve as president was Pat L. Northcutt. Charles Whitfill is vice president, Lem Weaver is secretary, and Glen Lindsey is grain representative.

Bill Nelson, executive vice president, and Nolen Chandler, agricultural assistant of the association, both from Amarillo, were here to assist with the organization of the local association.

On September 18, at 12:00 noon, the group will turn in sign-up cards in the conference room of the First State Bank in Silverton.

Membership in the Association program is made possible by producers through a deduction of two pounds per thousand from grain sorghum delivered at local elevators. Informing grain sorghum producers of activities affecting their welfare and reflecting their thinking wherever necessary, is a service which has resulted in a strong position for grain sorghum.

Northcutt and Charles Whitfill, newly elected officers of the local Grain Sorghum Producers Association discuss the three-phase program of the Association—Research, Market Development and Service. With these aims and purposes, GSPA was chartered in 1955 by farmers in order to realize increased opportunities for their number one acreage crop—grain

sorghum; this to be achieved through the stimulation of a greater exchange of information as to grain sorghum values as a feed grain, industrial raw material in the domestic and export market, and especially to gain its equal recognition on a feed value basis with other feed grains in farm policy matters. —Briscoe County News Photo

## Dallas Hurt Found Guilty; Gets Two-Year Sentence

### Farmers Union To Meet Monday Night

At a meeting of the Farmers Union, Monday, September 17, at 7:30 p.m. in the community room of Plainview Production Credit Association the film, "The Land", will be shown. All members are reminded of the meeting date and time and urged to be present.

Dallas Hurt, a Matador mechanic, was found guilty by the jury in District Court in Silverton last week, and received the minimum sentence, to serve two years in the state penitentiary. His nephew, Roger William Throneberry of Fort Worth, was

charged as an accomplice, and was out of jail on \$5,000.00 bond. He failed to appear in court and bond was forfeited. Officers are seeking this man for his connection in the case.

Hurt had originally been charged on two counts, hit and run and murder with a motor vehicle. The state dismissed the first count and the case was submitted to the jury on the second count.

After deliberating only one hour, the jury returned a verdict of guilty.

Attorneys for the state were District Attorney John Stapleton and County Attorney George W. Miller. The defendant was represented by Richard Stovall and Frank Stovall, attorneys from Floydada.

District Judge L. D. Ratliff of Spur presided over the court.

This case arose from the hit and run death of W. A. Stephens of Silverton on February 28, as he and his wife strolled arm-in-arm to church. Trial began Thursday morning with selection of jurors, and closed Friday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock.

## Sabin Oral Sundays Are Proclaimed Here

Mayor Charles Whitfill of Silverton has signed a proclamation setting aside September 16, October 28, and December 9, as Sabin Oral Vaccine Sundays. Those who do not take the vaccine—three drops on a cube of sugar—on these dates may visit make-up clinics September 23, November 4, and December 16.

Clinics at the Silverton High School Gym and the Quitaque High School Gym will be open from 12:00 noon until 6:00 p.m. on those days "so that every citizen of Briscoe County can obtain lasting protection from polio," the proclamation said.

The mayor further "urged that no citizen neglect this opportunity to insure the safety not only of himself, but of all other citizens."

No charge will be made for the vaccine although contributions of at least 25 cents will be appreciated to help defray costs.

Every family is requested to fill in a registration form (one is printed inside this issue of the News) and bring it with them to the clinic. If part of a family visits the first clinic and the rest visits the make up clinic, separate forms must be filled in for each visit. Extra forms will be available at

## Silverton Owls Roll Over Claude In Season Opener

"We looked good at times. Fumbles and penalties hurt us. Weak pass defense. Van Breedlove, back and linebacker, was outstanding. Quarterback Fred Stafford, who scored the first touchdown, also looked good," said Coach Robert Whelchel of the non-conference season opener in which the Silverton Owls defeated

Claude, 12-6. The first score came when Fred Stafford ran into the end zone from five yards out to tally for the Owls. At halftime the score was 6-0. In the third quarter Emmett Tomlin broke loose and ran 40 yards for the second Silverton score.

With about 10:50 remaining on the scoreclock in the fourth quarter, Denton Fox received a pass from Jim Hubbard and scored. The play covered seven yards, and the score was 12-6, favoring Silverton. As the game ended, Larry McWilliams had recovered a Claude fumble on about the Claude 45

yard line. The Owls made 19 first downs, as compared to 10 made by Claude. Being the first game of the season, fumbles were expected and both teams managed to take advantage of the opponent's fumbles. Claude and Silverton fumbled five times each. Penalties were frequent and Silverton lost

approximately 90 yards because of infractions, while Claude lost about 25 yards in the same manner. On the offense for Silverton Fred Stafford, Van Breedlove, Emmett Tomlin, Gregg Towe and Max Garrison played well. Credit must be given to every member of the line for opening holes in the Claude defense to let the runners

through for yardage gains. The line play an equally important role with that of the backfield, as without them the ball carrier would be taken back of the line of scrimmage. Jim Reid, Bill Schott, Gary Hunt and Van Breedlove played very well on defense. The Owls are idle this week after the cancellation of the Quitaque game which had been scheduled. The next game will be at home with Turkey on Saturday afternoon, September 22, during the school homecoming. Game time will be 2:00 p.m.

**WATER EROSION PROBLEMS BEING SOLVED IN CAP ROCK SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT**

Interest and activity remains high in the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District in planning and applying conservation practices, according to Virgil Henson of the Silverton office. Several farmers and ranchers have recently completed Great Plains Conservation Program plans for carrying out a complete conservation program on their land, he added.

Some of those who have completed Great Plains plans include Bob McWilliams of Quitaque, Dan Grady of Antelope, Mrs. Bray Cook of Memphis, Bud Richardson of Quitaque, Walter Graham, whose place is near Quitaque, and E. F. Payne of Quitaque.

McWilliams will install a drop structure, a waterway, and diversion and field terraces to solve a severe water erosion problem, the work unit director explained. Grady will install ponds for livestock water and will spray mesquite bush to improve his ranch. Mrs. Cook will construct diversion and field terraces to solve a

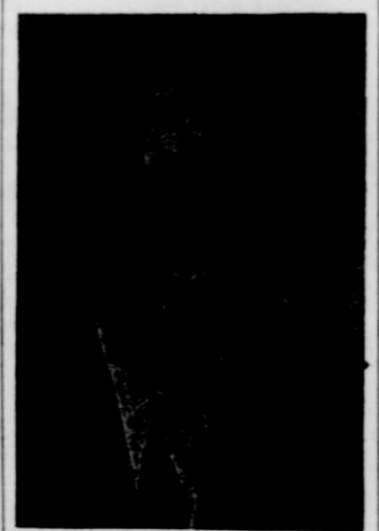

#### Sabin Oral Vaccine Polio Prevention Program

From: Hale-Floyd-Briscoe County Medical Society Polio Prevention Program  
The initials S O S signify "Sabin Oral Sundays." Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine will be administered at SOS Clinics in both Silvertown and Quitaque on these Sundays:

- FIRST ROUND—September 16 (Make-Up—September 23)
- SECOND ROUND—October 28 (Make-Up—November 4) 12:00 NOON to 6:00 p.m.
- THIRD ROUND—December 9 (Make-Up—December 16)

The Hale-Floyd-Briscoe County Medical Society URGES THIS PROGRAM . . . its members will direct and supervise the clinics and the administration of the vaccine, to ALL RESIDENTS OF THE BRISCOE COUNTY AREA. Visitors in the area can receive the vaccine, but will need all 3 types for complete polio protection. Your family can go EITHER Sunday for each round (but only ONE Sunday each round). If part of your family visits a clinic the first Sunday of a round, and the other part on the second Sunday, separate registration forms must be filled out for each visit. IMPORTANT: FILL OUT THE REGISTRATION FORM IN ADVANCE AND BRING IT WITH YOU TO A VACCINE CLINIC. CLINIC HOURS will be from 12 noon to 6 p.m. on each of the Sundays. Clinics will be in the Silvertown High School Gymnasium and at the Quitaque High School. Additional registration forms will be in the newspapers.

COST OF VACCINE is your contribution, whatever you can afford. Vaccine will be provided free of charge if you cannot pay. A different type vaccine will be given at each of the 3 times. Sabin polio vaccine provides lasting protection. In more than 283 million people taking the vaccine, there have been no ill effects. Sabin vaccine is licensed by the U. S. Public Health Service. Sabin is different from Salk vaccine. Salk vaccine is administered with a hypodermic needle and requires booster shots over a period of years. You should take Sabin vaccine EVEN IF YOU HAVE HAD SALK to insure your protection and to PREVENT YOUR BEING A CARRIER OF POLIO VIRUS.

Sabin vaccine is administered by mouth . . . 3 drops on a sugar cube (for infants, 3 drops in mouth with eye-dropper). Even diabetics can safely absorb the small cube of sugar. Pregnant women should be immunized.

If you are acutely ill, postpone taking the vaccine. Minor colds, sore throats or respiratory type flu will not prevent your taking the vaccine. A person must wait 2 weeks after tonsils or adenoids have been removed before taking the vaccine. It does not matter whether or not you eat before taking the vaccine.

### Additional Phone Lines Being Installed

Installation of 100 additional lines in the local office is 50 per cent completed, according to W. L. Frazier, Silverton's District Manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

"The addition is being made by our company's equipment installation crews, and will provide adequate facilities for expansion in Silverton's telephone growth, as well as provide for upgrades to private line service wherever our outside facilities permit," Frazier said.

The district manager added that service orders would be issued to

upgrade all customers who have made applications for private lines during the past few months. The orders will be worked at the earliest possible date after the line addition is completed.

General Telephone Company now serves over 490 telephones in Silverton out of a total of almost 7,000 in the Ralls District.
