## Martin Elected President Of Ex-Students Association

During the business meeting of the Ex-Student Association held last Saturday morning, Grady Martin was elected to head the association as president, and Donaleta Seaney Garrison was elected to serve as secretary for the coming two years. It was decided that the Homecoming will be held at Silverton High School every two years, on the even-numbered years, on the third Saturday in September.

The meeting was opened with W. E. Schott presiding. The invocation was given by O. C. Rampley, an ex-student and present principal of Silverton High School.

A report on the school today was given by J. S. Hinds, Superintendent of Schools. In his report Mr. Hinds noted that there are 22 teachers in the system this year. The administration, he said, is striving to make this one of the best schools in the area.

Silverton graduates who enter colleges are able to be grouped with the accelerated classes, he continued, which points to the fact that our schools rate with the best of them. The school system is rapidly gaining teachers. Usually it is expected that a school will gain one teacher on the basis of increased population about every three years. We have been able to gain a new teacher each year, and this past year lacked only six students in the average daily attendance of being eligible for two new teachers.

A group of high school girls, Sharon Weaver, Paula Turner, Jerry Garrison, Sandi Rhode, Jealeta Eddleman, Mary Monroe, Brenda Martin and Dianne Davis, were accompanied by Mrs. Bill Edwards at the piano, as they sang "School Days" and "May The Good Lord Bless And Keep You."

Grady Martin, president of the graduating class of 1941, reported to the ex-students and ex-teachers in attendance that his class has met obstacles raised by growing up during the depression and graduating just before World War II, and all thirty-eight graduates have come through in good condition. All are living, and the whereabouts of thirty-seven of them is known.

Harley Redin of Plainview, another ex-student, gave the homecoming address. He stated that it should be the aim of all to "encourage our high school students to finish school and go on to college. The approximate monetary value placed on a college education is \$180,000," he continued.

He concluded his remarks by telling the group about his visit to Russia as coach of the United States Womens AAU basketball team.

Recognized for traveling the furthest to attend the homecoming were Mrs. Edna Christianson of Kingman, Arizona; Mrs. Dean Lowe Fitzgerald of Deming, New Mexico, and Mr. and Mrs. Walter Bain of Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Early students who were recognized included Mrs. Ed McMurtry, who attended Silverton Schools as early as 1898, Mrs. Frank Gerdes, Kenneth Bain (1900), Mrs. Otis Wilson (1894), Winnie Wimberly (1906), Theo Cowart Wise (1905), Chris Seaman (1898), Jennie Seaman Richards, Prentis Richards (1912), Louis Francis (1907), D. T. Northcutt (1903), J. W. (Ted) Reid (1903), Mrs. Dave Alexander (1892), and Mrs. Gertrude Braidfoot Arnold (1892).

Mrs. Dean Lowe Fitzgerald was elected Homecoming Queen and was presented a corsage. Mrs. Doris Griffith Marler, Amarillo, of the Class of 1941, was also nominated as Homecoming Queen.

## William Malone Dies In Tulia Hospital

William Malone, a long time Briscoe County resident, died shortly after 6:00 o'clock Wednesday morning, September 26, in Swisher County Hospital at Tulia where he had been a patient for treatment of injuries received in a farm accident early this month.

Mr. Malone was born in Parker County on January 13, 1891. He moved to this area with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Willis Malone, when he was only three months old.

He was married to the former Miss Eula Renfro, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Renfro, on Sunday, January 31, 1811, at the county courthouse in Tulia.

Mr. and Mrs. Malone had lived their entire married life on the two sections they farm across the Tule Canyon north of Silverton.

They were parents of one son, Eugene, who with his family lives in a house they built early this year on the home place.

Mr. Malone is also survived by two brothers, Earl and Eric Malone, both of the Swisher-Briscoe area.

Funeral arrangements at press time were pending with Wallace Funeral Home in Tulia.

## Turks Take Owls 28 - 18

The loss of Van Breedlove from the lineup with a knee injury early in the first quarter coupled with the illness of several other of the Silverton Owls was more than the home team could overcome as they went down to the Turkey Turks, 28-18, before a large Homecoming crowd last Saturday afternoon.

In pregame ceremonies, Miss Sharon Weaver, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Shafe Weaver, was crowned Football Queen. Other candidates were Sue Lanham, senior; Brenda Martin, junior; and Alice Holt, freshman. The candidates were escorted by co-captains Jim Reid, Butch Norris, Bill Schott and Van Breedlove.

Statistics show that the ball game was less one-sided than the score indicates. In the rushing department, the Owls gained approximately 231 yards as compared to 206 gained by the Turks. In first downs, Silverton made 15 to the 9 racked up by Turkey. Silverton was penalized 95 yards, while the Turks had 125 yards marched off against them.

In the passing department, Turkey's Don Guest was the deciding factor in the game, completing 9 out of 19 attempts with only one interception. Silverton attempted 17 passes, completed six and had two intercepted.

Turkey opened the scoring in the first quarter of the game when Don Guest passed to Derrell Fuston. The play covered 15 yards for the touchdown.

Only minutes later, Silverton broke into the scoring column as Fred Stafford galloped 35 yards for a touchdown, tying the score

at 6-6. Don Guest took Silverton's kick after the touchdown, handed off to David Hutton, who ran 70 yards to score for Turkey, moving a-head again 12-6.

In the third quarter, Don Guest passed to Derrell Fuston, covering 45 yards for another Turk tally. Guest passed for the two extra points. Minutes later Guest scored for Turkey from three yards out after the Owls fumbled away the after-touchdown kickoff. Guest also passed for the two extra points, making the score 28-6.

Silverton bounced back with a 20-yard run by Fred Stafford to score. This was repeated shortly in the third quarter when Emmett Tomlin drove into the end zone from three yards out, bringing up the final score of 28-18.

As revealed by the critical eye of the camera, most of the Owls made mistakes in the game. The film also showed that the boys played very hard and kept trying to win until the final second of the game. On offense, Max Garrison, Fred Stafford and Emmett Tomlin did most of the work of carrying the ball. Travis Gilkeyson received a pass and ran about thirty yards to the Turkey five yard line, from where the Owls were unable to score. Hard workers on defense were Butch Norris, Max Garrison, Jim Reid, Larry McWilliams and John Baird.

It should not be underemphasized that all of the boys played hard. Several of the more inexperienced players saw action when it became necessary to substitute for the injured and for the players who were sick with flu.

### Residents Report Animal Poisonings

Several local residents have reported the poisonings of cats and dogs recently. Mayor Charles Whitfill says that many residents fear that young children are being endangered by the use of poisons to dispose of animals. The animals which have been killed for the most part have not been strays. They have been family pets that were licensed and had received their shots. The proper procedure to be used for disposing of strays is to call the City Hall for removal of the animals. The animals are taken to a cage behind the City Hall and are kept three days before their disposal. The three-day period allows time for the owners to claim family pets.

The marking of every Confederate grave in Texas is a main objective of the Confederate Memorial Program. The Texas Civil War Centennial (1961-65) is the proper time to do this. Graves of any Union men buried in Texas should also be marked. J. E. (Doc) Minyard is requesting your assistance in locating the graves of Civil War Veterans. This project will include the erecting of markers which can be obtained at no cost (except for cost of erection) from the United States Government. Anyone who can give Mr. Minyard information regarding graves of Civil War Veterans should do so as soon as possible.

### Gas Tax Refund Deadline October 1

County Agent Clarence Kerns issued a reminder this week to county farmers that claims for gasoline tax refunds need to be executed and mailed before October 1. The claim may be filed by the owner, tenant, or operator of a farm. Gasoline purchased after June 30, 1961, and before July 1, 1962, for farming purposes may be included.

Claim forms may be secured at the county agent's office in the basement of the county courthouse.

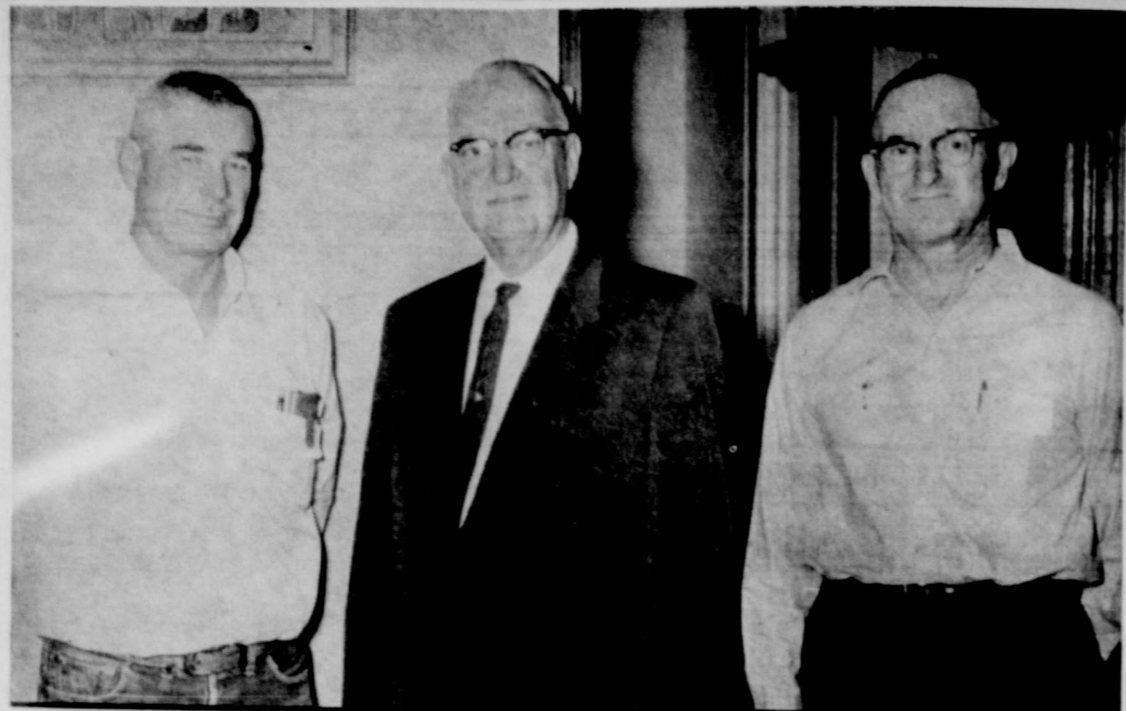
## Briscoe GSPA Sign-Up Underway

### Four Rural Accidents Reported In August

The Highway Patrol investigated four rural accidents in Briscoe County during the month of August according to Sergeant D. R. Dowdy, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$2,730.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for Briscoe County from January through August of 1962 shows a total of 19 crashes. As a

result of these crashes there were two persons killed and 10 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$12,005.00. The veteran patrol supervisor stated, "With fall and winter approaching, now is the time to have vehicles checked in preparation for the cold winter ahead."

The Vehicle Inspection Program in Texas has proved itself to be a valuable tool in reducing accidents on Texas streets and highways. All vehicles registered in this state are required to be inspected once a year, he added.

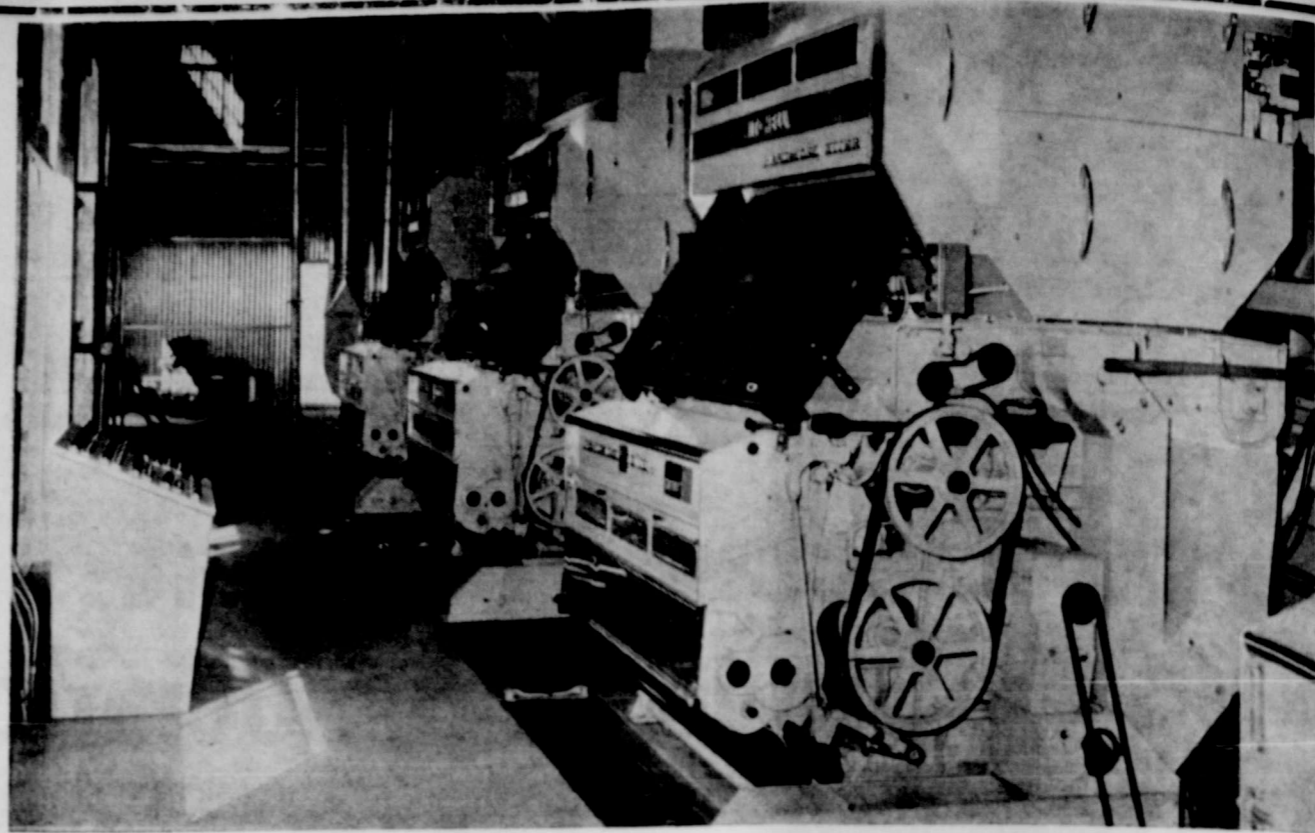
The new motor vehicle inspection year began September 1. However, the only thing new about the inspection this year is the sticker

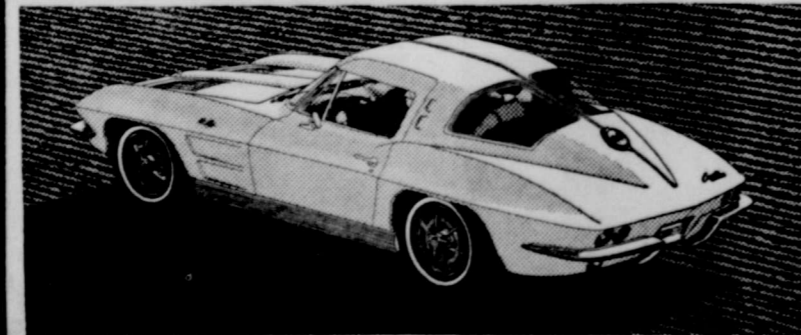

The Silverton Owls were outscored 28-18 by the Turkey Turks before a large Homecoming crowd Saturday afternoon.

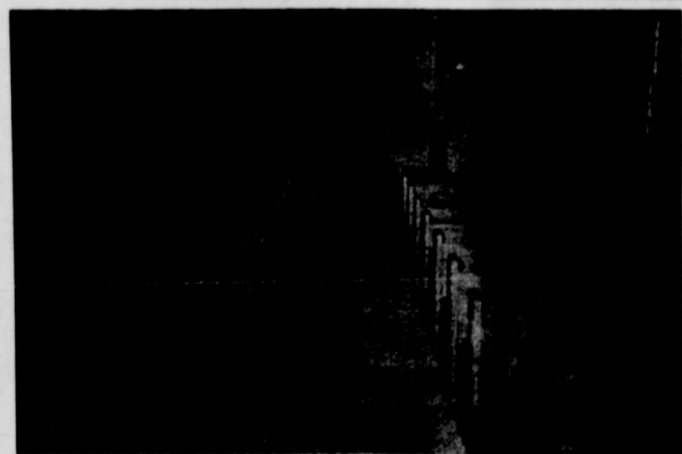

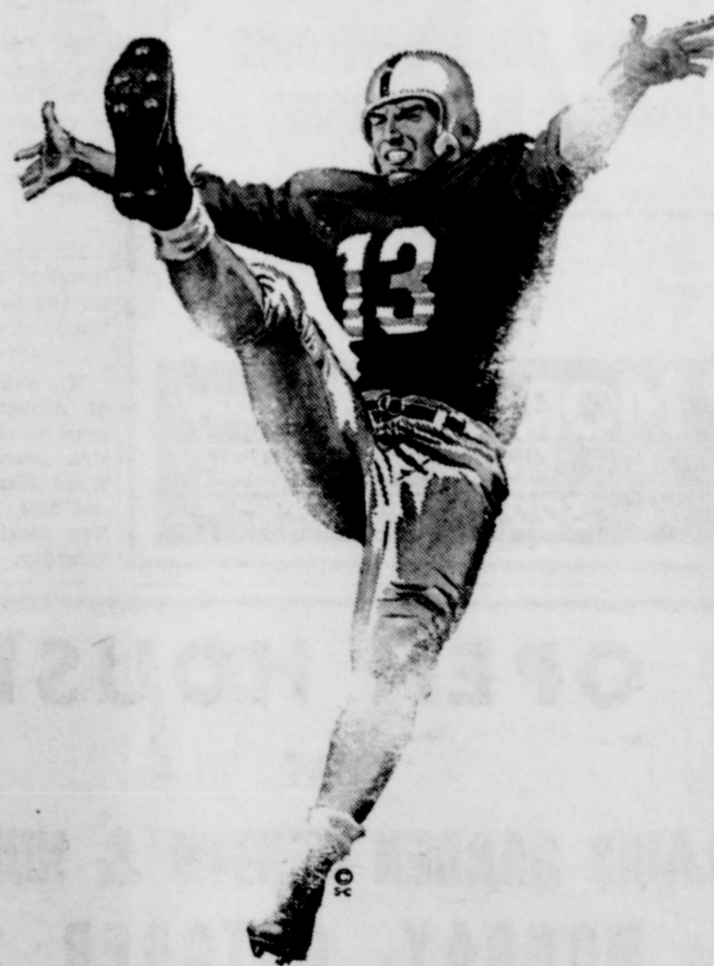

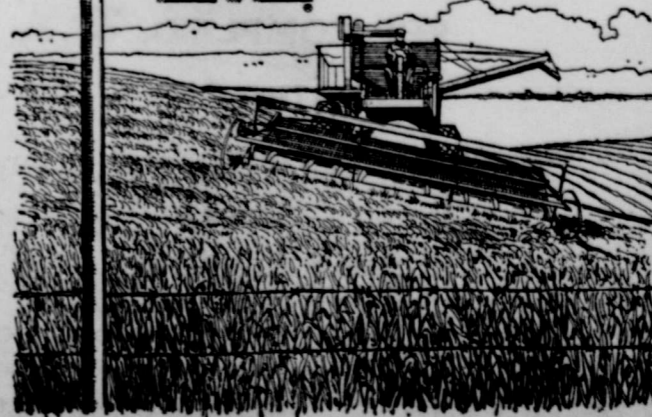
