"When you can go into a man's home county and outscore him to one, it surely ought to mean something.

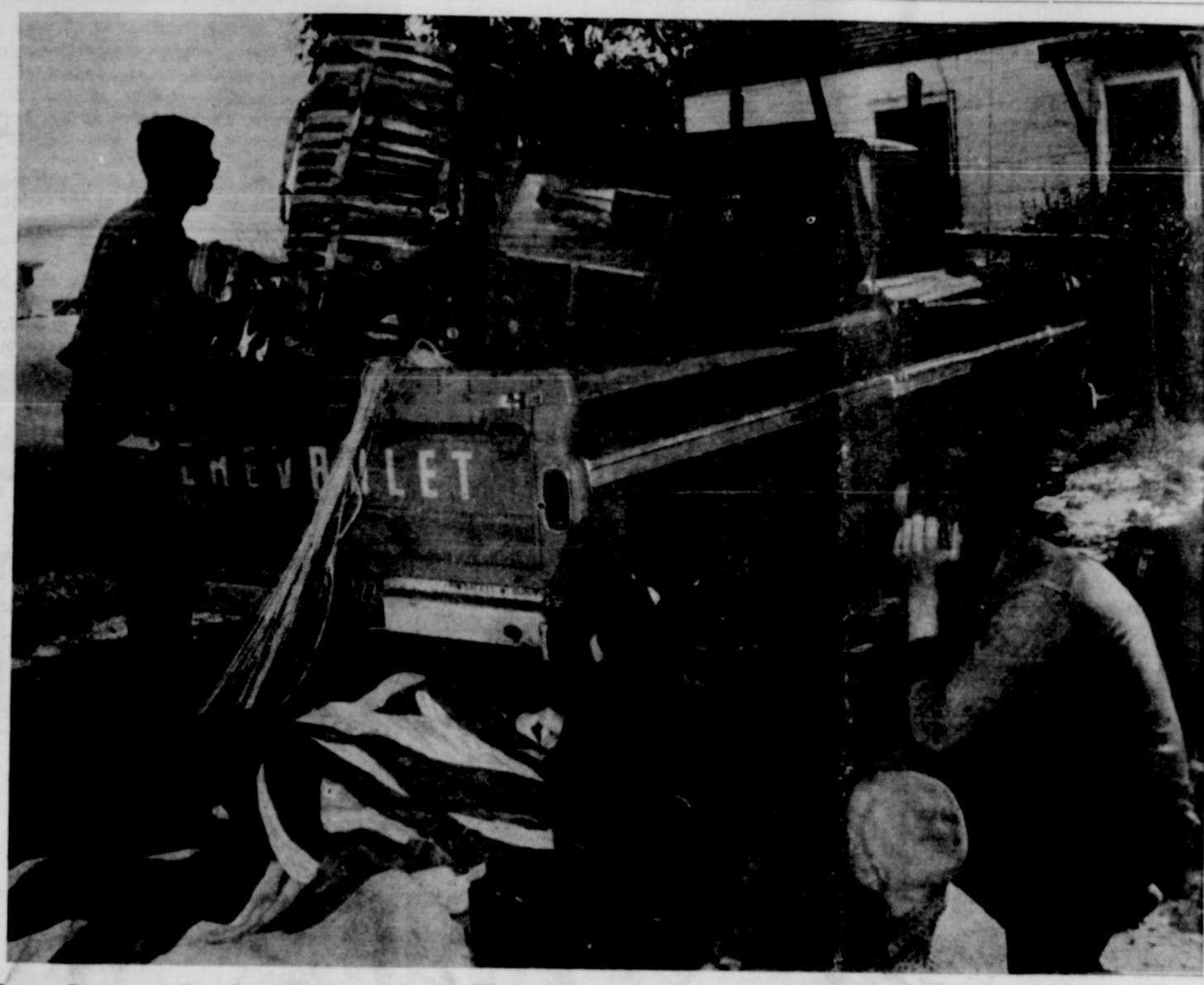
"We believe it will mean something this November: That Democratic John Connally will be the next Governor of Texas."

James Davis and Ken Sarchet look on as Airman 1/c William Kerr and Airman 1/c Hobert King disassemble and load the contents of a research balloon which Mr. and Mrs. Davis retrieved from a field seven miles east of South Plains at about 10:30 a.m. Thursday. The barrel and two boxes were suspended by a harness-type apparatus from an eight-foot bar which was suspended from a parachute which measured sixty feet in diameter. The barrel contained research instruments and one of the boxes contained the power plant for the balloon which was rigged with lights as well as the automatic triggering device.

Silverton Farmer Recovers Research Instruments

Silverton residents were joined by others over a wide area of the Panhandle on Thursday morning of last week in watching a huge white balloon traveling on the airways. At 9:00 a.m. the balloon burst and its contents drifted earthward under a huge orange and white nylon parachute.

Mrs. D. H. Davis had been watching the balloon as she hung clothes on the line, and when she went into the house she telephoned her son, James Davis, to ask if he had seen it. The James Davises began watching the balloon and saw it burst and begin its descent.

Feeling sure that it would land close by, they got into their pickup and began following the package, which drifted on the unstable air currents to a field seven miles east of the community of South Plains before coming to earth and tumbling end over end before it was brought to a stop.

Davis was assisted by the farmer on whose land it fell in loading the objects into his pickup. The contents of the balloon were more burdensome than Davis had thought they would be, weighing near 500 pounds.

On their arrival back at their farm home, Mr. and Mrs. Davis telephoned the U. S. Weather Bureau in Amarillo, thinking it was a weather balloon's contents they had. They were told that it was a balloon containing research instruments that had been sent up the day before from Holloman Air Force Base at Alamogordo, New Mexico, and that "it was very valuable."

Shortly after their conversation with the weather bureau, the Davises received a call from Holloman AFB to advise them that they had a truck in the area which would arrive shortly for the package.

The truck, which had been receiving telephoned messages of direction from the radar center at Alamogordo, had been directed to Claude. Airman 1/c William Kerr and Airman 1/c Hobert King arrived at the Davis farm shortly after 12:00 o'clock noon, and carefully loaded the instrument package, lashing it to the side of the truck to avoid further jarring of the contents.

Airman Kerr told the Briscoe County News that the balloon had reached an altitude of 128,000 feet on its journey. The balloon, he said, was filled with 1.5 million cubic feet of helium, and was released by the Air Force Cambridge Research Laboratory, Holloman Air Force Base.

He laughed and added, "The last of these that we chased came down on Mount Baldy near Ruidosa, New Mexico."

The label on the barrel indicated that the package was from the Cosmic Ray Lab. It was thought that the research might be in connection with the atmospheric radiation tests.

A second release in the series was scheduled for 4:00 a.m. last Friday.

Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ, the Rev. Carlos McLeod, pastor of First Baptist Church and the Rev. Marvin Fisher, pastor of Silverton Methodist Church, officiated.

Mr. Pavlicek died at 1:15 p.m. Friday in a Plainview hospital after a short illness.

Patrick Pavlicek was born September 3, 1913, in Baylor County, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Adolph Pavlicek, who survive him. Mr. Pavlicek had lived in Silverton for the past 23 years and was employed as a mechanic. He was married to the former Bertha Thomas of Plainview on August 7, 1938.

He is survived by his wife, of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Adolph Pavlicek of Bomarton; two brothers, Bernard A. 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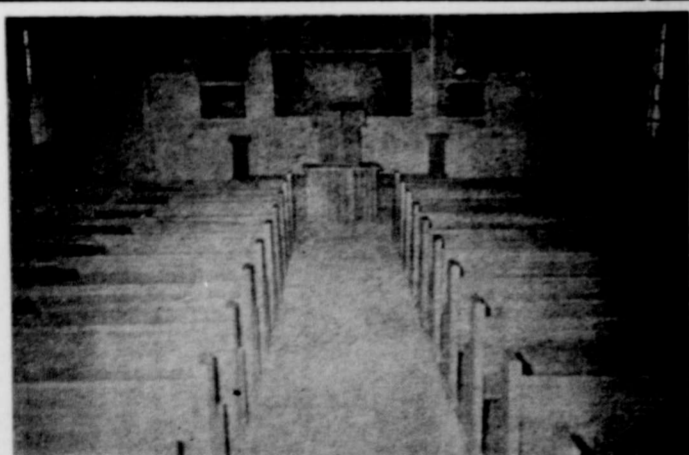

THE REVOLUTION IN MATHEMATICS

PART TWO

by Mrs. Alvin Redin

Last week we gave mathematical research as the first cause of the great changes in mathematics teaching. In the second place, the revolution in mathematics was caused by automation. There are machines that control machines,

and the consequences of the use of such machines has led to an intensive use of mathematics.

Long distance telephone dialing, the automatic pilot for jet airplanes, and guided missiles are a few examples of automation. The use of mathematics in the construction and operation of machines of enormous size, complexity and cost has eliminated much expense by the trial and error method, or simple experimental methods, that were quite successful in the day of designing simple and economical items. This approach to the gigantic problems concerning something of the size and complexity of the B-70 airplane would be absurd. The design and development of a B-70 requires that the analysis—much of it mathematical—be carried to such a point that the first one built flies and performs according to specifications. It is essential that we know how to solve complicated design and development problems.

STUDENTS VOICE OPINIONS ON DRIVING DURING SCHOOL HOURS

In a poll taken last week several students were asked this question: "We have a ruling that prohibits students driving their cars during school hours. Do you feel that this ruling is justified? Defend your opinion."

One of the OWL'S HOOT reporters, Mary McWilliams, received the following statements in reply.

If people will use a little sense and take their responsibilities, I think this rule would not be necessary. But a few, a very few, won't. Therefore, I believe the ruling is best as it is."

ANN SMITH—"No, if we could drive our cars during school hours and at noon we could at least have time to eat our dinners. I think that they should give us another chance."

FRED STAFFORD—"I think it should be changed because we have such a short dinner hour and we have to rush dinner if we go home to eat, so we will have time to walk back to school."

JERRY GARRISON—"Answering a question with another question: why should students need to use their cars at noon everyday? The noon period is hardly long enough to even eat, anyway."

SHARON WEAVER—"I agree that we shouldn't be able to ride around anytime we get ready; however, I think we should be able to go home for lunch in our cars."

Grassed Waterways Ease Problems

Excessive amounts of runoff water this year have aroused an interest in grassed waterways. The purpose of such a waterway is to carry runoff with little or no erosion. Where water concentrates it needs to be handled so as to prevent erosion. Natural waterways or depressions may require very little shaping and establishment of a grass cover. However, there may be no natural depression or it may be more desirable to build the waterway somewhere else. Experience has shown that it is more difficult to establish and maintain adequate vegetative cover in relatively deep, narrow waterways than in the much broader waterways where very little topsoil has been removed in construction.

Unprotected gullies and road ditches should not be used to dispose of excess water.

Waterways should be made large enough to carry the runoff from a storm that would be expected once in ten years. The most satisfactory location is in a natural drain. Here, the slope of the channel is usually the flattest in the watershed. Natural slopes tend to confine the flow and soil and moisture are usually most favorable to vegetative growth. Waterways located along a field boundary have the advantage of interfering least with tillage operations, but they are usually more expensive to establish because more shaping may be required.

Experience has shown that it is hazardous and expensive to attempt to establish vegetation in a waterway when it is being used for the disposal of runoff. Newly

prepared seedbeds, fertilizers, young plants and newly placed Bermuda sprigs offer little resistance to erosion and are frequently washed out. If possible, divert the runoff into a temporary bypass until the vegetation is established. The type of grass would depend on whether irrigation water is available. Where irrigation water is not available western wheatgrass is good in this area. Bermuda grass is good, but will need some irrigation.

A waterway should be inspected after each heavy rain. Minor repairs done then may prevent failure later on. Damaged sod or washed out seed or plants should be replaced immediately. Overgrazing must be avoided. Proper mowing or grazing of vegetation tends to develop a cover and root system that is more resistant to erosion than rank vegetation.

Soil Conservation Service technicians assigned to assist the local Soil Conservation District are available to assist with your waterway problems.

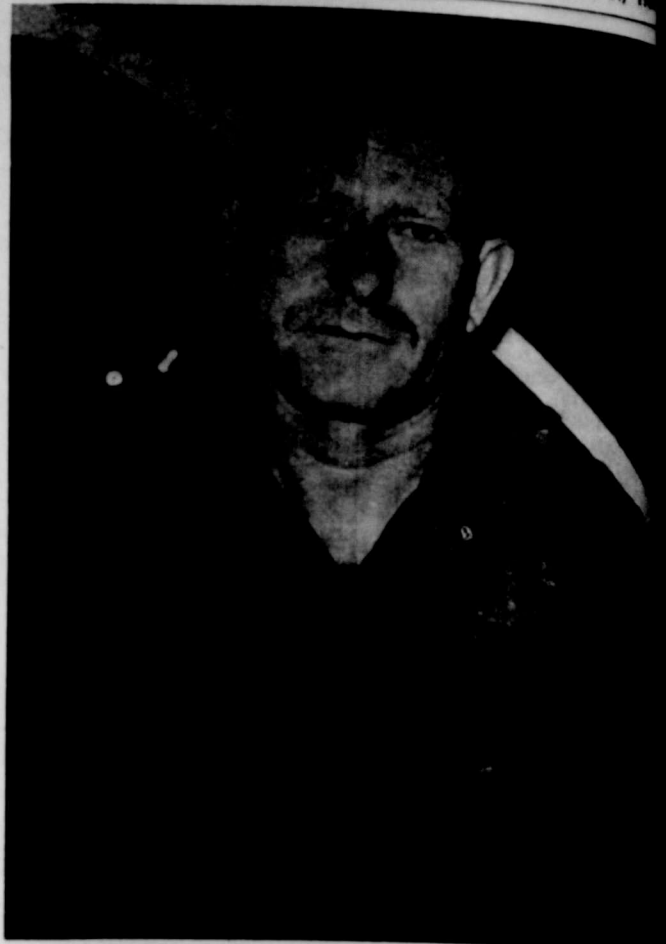

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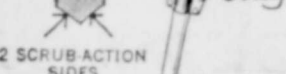

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE COMMITTED TO COMMUNISM?

A letter a young Communist wrote to his friend will help us to understand. This letter was first printed in the Presbyterian Survey, and later in the "Congressional Record"; Here are some excerpts:

What seems of importance to you is to me either not desirable or impossible of realization. But there is one about which I am in dead earnest and that is the socialist cause. It is my life, my business, my religion, my hobby, my sweetheart, my wife, and mistress, my bread and meat...

I can't carry on a friendship, a love affair, or even a conversation without relating it to this force which both drives and guides my life... I have already been in jail because of my ideas, and if necessary, I am ready to go before a firing squad. A genuine Communist lives in virtual poverty. He turns back to the party every penny he makes above what is absolutely necessary to keep him alive...

Communists don't have the time or money for many movies or concerts, or T-bone steaks, or decent homes, or new cars... Our lives are dominated by one great, overshadowing factor—the struggle for socialism... We have a cause to fight for, a definite purpose in life. We subordinate our petty, personal selves into a great movement of humanity. We have a morale, an "esprit de corps" such as no capitalist army ever had; we have a code of conduct, a way of life, a devotion to our cause that no religious order can touch...

Christian, what is YOUR COMMITMENT?? If you are the AVERAGE Christian then your commitment to Christianity is about like this: "What is important to you is important to me, and I'll do my best to realize it. Christianity is IMPORTANT, not important enough to effect my home, family, love affairs, hobbies, business, or job!!"

I can't let Christianity interfere with my friendships, love affairs, or conservations. It isn't much of a force in my life. For I'm NOT ready to go to jail, and CERTAINLY NOT BEFORE A FIRING SQUAD! Neither am I ready to let it affect my standard of living; I give only what it "left-over" into the church treasury.

Christianity is only a "social-religion" and as such, should certainly not affect those pleasures I enjoy that are expensive—such as concerts, parties, T-bone steaks, fine homes and new cars. Our lives are dominated by one great overshadowing factor, but it is NOT—I repeat NOT—Christianity. It is the devotion to SELF AND PLEASURE, a code of conduct, a way of life, a devotion to our cause that NO RELIGION CAN TOUCH.

And THIS is the ideology with which we hope to "whip" Communism! Friend, we have something FAR BETTER than Communism, but it will only work when we determine to WORK IT. It's no wonder Communists say, "Christianity won't work." When our is the commitment THEY HAVE, it will work. It worked for the apostles—because they were COMMITTED to the job of WORKING IT.
