Owls Take District Win From Lorenzo

The Silverton Owls battled their way to a 16-0 district win over the Lorenzo Hornets last Friday night. Jay Towe opened the scoring

for the Owls in the second quarter of the ballgame when he ran ten yards to score. Fred Stafford, who has been quarterbacking the club, carried for two extra points.

The Owls scored again in the fourth quarter on a 45-yard run by Emmett Tomlin. Van Breedlove ran into the end zone for the two extra points.

Silverton's passing attack was effective, as Stafford completed two to Dennis Tomlin, two to Max Garrison and one to Emmett Tomlin. Jay Towe intercepted a Lorenzo pass and carried to the Lorenzo 44 yard line shortly before Emmett took off on his touchdown run.

Friday night the Owls will take on the high-flying Petersburg

Buffaloes in a home game that will close the football season. Several of the Owls will don the red and white jerseys for the last time. Jay Towe, a great little halfback, Van Breedlove, the boy who could play on anybody's team, Butch Norris, a real tough lineman, Bill Schott, Louie Strange and Jim Reid, bruising tackles, will turn in their last high school football performances.

Great hopes next year will reside in the lettermen from this year's freshman, sophomore and junior classes. Junior High promises a good backfield prospect in Randy Hughes. Though all the Owls will have to play good ball to make up for the loss of a good group of seniors, it is hoped that Silverton will be a strong contender for the district title next year.

The aim of the Owls this week is to knock off the first place team in the district, the Petersburg Buffaloes. After the win from Lorenzo last week, the Owls are expected to be in top condition and raring to go against the Buffs. The players will appreciate all the support the fans can give them in this important grid clash.

Senior Citizen Housing Loans Authorized

Mr. L. J. Cappleman, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, advised the local County Supervisor, Mr. Donald B. Cruce, that recent legislation amends Title V of the Housing Act of 1949 by adding new provisions which authorize loans and grants for moderate cost housing and related facilities for elderly persons and families in rural areas. It liberalizes some regulations on rural housing loans now being made by Farmers Home Administration and sets up new direct and insured loan programs.

This new legislation will be administered in Briscoe County by USDA's Farmers Home Administration. Rural housing loans are made by this agency to farmers and other families living in rural areas who need improved housing and cannot qualify for credit from other sources.

One new provision will give these people, who are 62 years of age or over, special advantages not available under the earlier loan program. First, they can buy previously-occupied existing housing as well as improve their homes. Second, they can finance the cost of the building site as well as the dwelling with the loan proceeds; other families must own the land on which to build the homes before they can apply for a loan. Third, cosigners may be used by elderly applicants who are deficient in repayment ability. Like rural housing loans now being made by Farmers Home Administration, these direct loans will bear interest at the rate of 4 percent and may be repaid over a period not exceeding 33 years.

3. Many vision changes occur so gradually, over so long a period of time, they are apt to go unnoticed. Regular examinations by qualified vision experts are recommended as the best insurance for correct vision.

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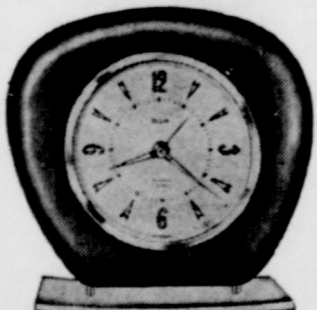

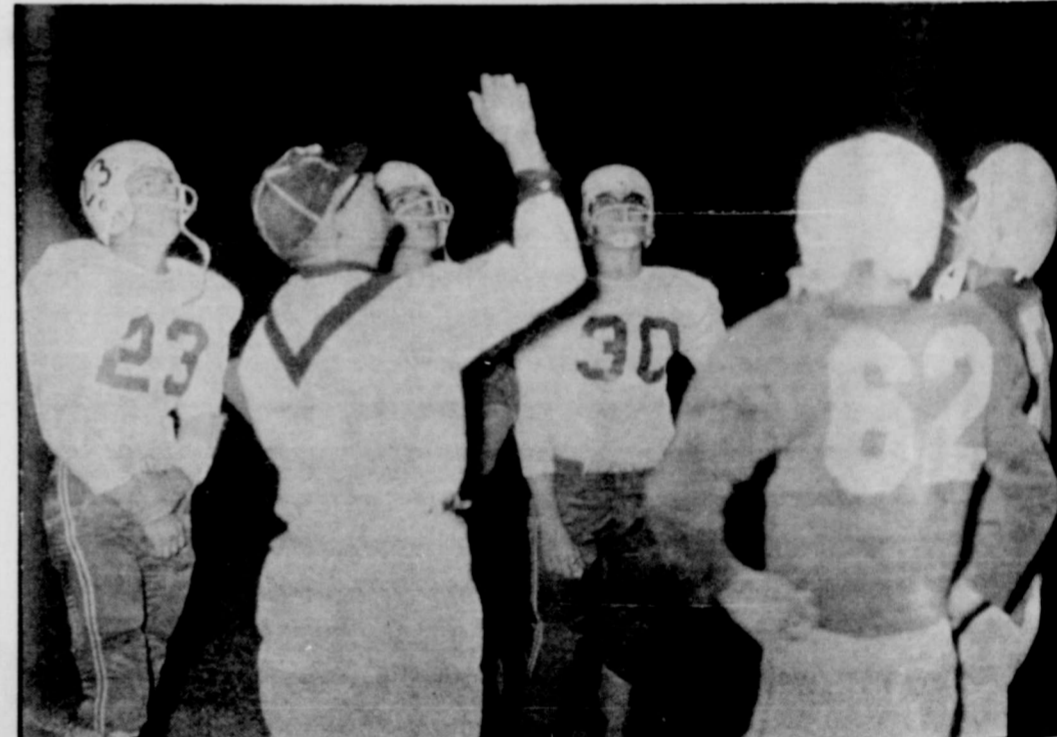

The matter is of public concern because the congressional race in that district between Amarillo's Jack Seale and Congressman Walter Rogers is the direct confrontation between John Birch and a regular Democrat to be seen in these

is a John Birch, who brought a continual parade of Birch spokesmen to Amarillo. Maj. Gen. Edwin Walker, Anderson, editor of Farm and Ranch, Dean Manion, and twice founder of the John Birch Society, Robert Welch.

stated purpose of the John

Birch organization, as stated in the Blue Book, and by the founder, is "less government and more individual responsibility." Few would argue that this is not a fine purpose. We subscribe to it wholeheartedly.

But when the John Birch spokesmen start talking, we see their purpose is to turn America back into an 18th century economy and isolationism.

They hail the Constitution as almost divinely inspired, but conveniently overlook the First amendment for all except those they deem fit to enjoy the privilege of free speech, and the fourteenth and fifteenth amendments, because they seem to conflict with "states rights" as provided for in the Tenth Amendment.

When Gen. Walker and Tom Anderson, both high in the Birch tree, start talking, then we become angry with how they stretch

the noble and generous ideals of patriotism.

Perhaps General Walker was summarily treated after the Old Miss fiasco. He denies that he led the charge of goons against the federal marshals, and says that he didn't see any violence except on the part of the federal agents. But he can't deny that the day before he issued a public statement calling for 10,000 men to join him in Mississippi, and to bring their tents and skillet. If that was a responsible act by a patriot, sworn to defend the Constitution, then we've wasted a lifetime of studying law and citizenship.

And Tom Anderson, a man with a talent for invective, sways thousands with his invective against the United States Supreme Court, the United Nations, and the administration in Washington, whether it be Eisenhower or Kennedy. He wrote recently: "I'm for Ad-

lai and Eleanor marrying, so I can hate 'em as a couple."

He has even a kind word to say for the deposed dictator Batista who led Cuba straight into the hands of Castro by his cruelties and disregard for the hopes of the masses. In this regard Tom Anderson's ability to trace cause and effect goes completely astray. He thinks that the United States, by upholding the corrupt Batista regime, could have saved Cuba from Communism.

He wants the United States to withdraw from the United Nations, and has called for the impeachment, not only of Supreme Court Chief Justice Earl Warren, but the entire court!

Robert Welch, the founder of the Birch movement, has long since regretted his letter stating that Eisenhower was a dedicated agent for the Communist apparatus, but the fact that he once

thought such a thing indicates how little stability there is in an otherwise brilliant mind.

Together these three men — Walker, Anderson and Welch — pose as "God fearing men," dedicated to patriotism and individual responsibility. But they lack the first element of a Christian conscience — humility in the face of the unknown and unknowable. They forget too often that they are not God.

We wonder if Tom Anderson, General Walker and Robert Welch didn't have certain misgivings about what they have been saying for months about Adlai Stevenson and the United Nations, when they witnessed his dramatic confrontation with the Soviet delegate, in which Stevenson firmly pinned the lie on the Russian disclaimer for responsibility of rockets in Cuba. That session of the United Nations, in our opinion, accom-

plished more for the ultimate downfall of Communism than would have 50 divisions of men.

It also demonstrated the unique way the United Nations can play in providing a forum for the unraveling of disputes that might otherwise lead to wholesale slaughter.

We have read the John Birch handbook twice. We have listened to the orations by Robert Welch, and we have read the mass of literature spawned by those who see the world going to a Communist hell because some people feel we should be concerned about the plight of the negro in America.

There is much in the Birch handbook that almost anyone can subscribe to. But it is not from the book that we have become distrustful of the organization. It is from the public pronouncements of the men who speak for it.

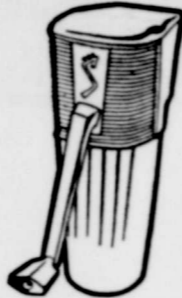

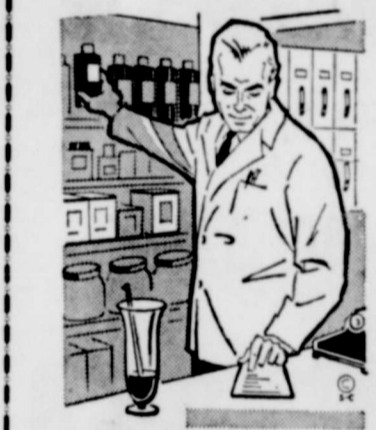
