average buyer was still considering sun dresses, bermuda shorts and beach apparel.

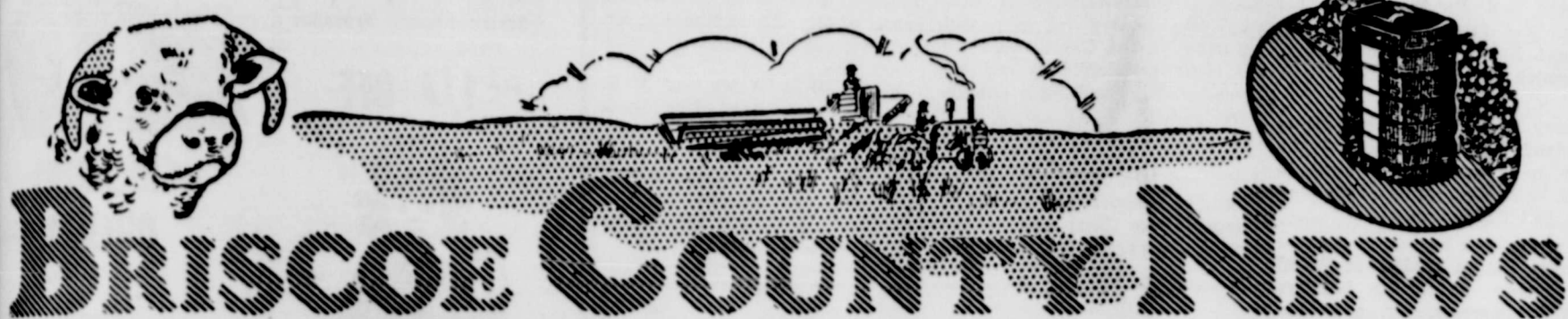

### One Accident Here During October

The Highway Patrol investigated one rural accident in Briscoe County during the month of October according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

The accident accounted for two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$500.00. The rural accident summary for Briscoe County from January through October of 1962, shows a total of 22 crashes. As a result of these, there have been two persons killed and 14 injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$13,480.00.

### RAIN SOAKS SILVERTOWN AREA

Up to two inches of rain soaked the area around Silvertown in the early hours Monday. The official measurement by Grady Martin in Silvertown was .58 of an inch.

Several farmers and ranchers reported three-quarters to an inch in rain gauges at their places. Several who farm along the Tule Canyon reported measurements up to two inches.

An electrical storm accompanied the rain. Only about 500 bales of cotton have been ginned from the crop in Briscoe County on top of the caprock. The crop is late due to late planting and late frost, but the harvest is expected to move get underway in most all fields as soon as it is dry enough.

The Field Service says that the interest of the entire community is important. A "foreign student" club must be organized made up of school personnel, both pupils and teachers, businessmen, club women, housewives, ministers, etc.

People are also needed who are willing to apply for permission to keep the foreign student in their home. Those who keep an exchange student are expected to accept him as a member of their family during the year, but are not to pay his expenses other than board and regular family living expenses.

The amount needed for the project is about \$1,000.00. Of this, \$650.00 will be sent to the AFS

to pay the student's transportation to and from this country. The AFS gives the student \$14.00 per month for incidental expenses. The remainder of the \$1,000.00 is usually needed to buy clothes and other items the pupil needs.

The Student Council is excited about the project, and the promoting of good will between Silvertown and a foreign country. It is the hope of the group that their enthusiasm is shared by the community. Will it be possible to raise \$1,000.00 for this purpose?

## Freeman Explains '63 Wheat Program

The voluntary diversion program for the 1963 wheat crop "gives wheat farmers an opportunity to continue to make needed adjustments in the wheat production level and thus protect the gain made this year under the 1962 wheat stabilization program," Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman said in announcing the special 1963 wheat program.

"The voluntary acreage reduction provisions . . . provide an interim basis to help keep wheat supplies down until the long-range program included in the legislation just passed can be voted on by farmers for the 1964 crop," he declared.

"As a result of the 1962 program, wheat production this year is at the lowest level in five years. This will mean a substantial reduction in wheat carryover stocks."

"The long-range wheat program which is authorized for 1964 and subsequent crops is a major

step toward a permanent solution of the long-time wheat problem."

According to John Montague of the local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, the 1963 wheat stabilization program provides wheat-diversion and additional price-support payments which supplement the marketing quotas and price support previously in effect for the 1963 wheat crop.

The wheat-diversion payments are similar to those in effect for the 1962 wheat crop. They will be made to wheat farmers who reduce their wheat acreage by at least 20 percent and put the diverted acres to an approved conservation use. As in 1962, farmers may receive half of their acreage-diversion payment at the time they sign up to participate in the program.

A new feature for the 1963-crop wheat will be an additional price-support payment of 13 cents per bushel on the normal production of the 1963 wheat acreage of farmers participating in the wheat-diversion program, provided they are also in compliance with their wheat allotment. This is a separate payment from the regular price-support loans and purchase agreements which will be available to growers who comply with their wheat acreage allotments. The regular price support will be based on a national average of \$1.82 per bushel.

Producers should be sure to divert the full acreage for which they sign up in the 1963 wheat stabilization program. A change from the 1962 program provides that if a farmer does not divert the full signed-up acreage, he will not be eligible for price support nor will he receive acreage-diversion or wheat price-support payments.

The sign-up period for the diversion program for winter wheat will continue through December 14, 1962. Farmers are urged to get in touch with the local ASCS office in Silvertown regarding any questions they may have about the program. Farmers are urged to sign up as soon as possible and not wait until the last day.
